



The League's biggest stars will be welcomed to South Florida once again when the Panthers host the **2023 Honda NHL All-Star Weekend** at FLA Live Arena in Sunrise, Fla., 20 years after the event first was held in Sunrise.

The weekend opens with the **2023 NHL All-Star Skills presented by DraftKings Sportsbook** on Friday, Feb. 3 (7 p.m. ET, ESPN, ESPN+, Sportsnet, TVAS) followed by the **2023 Honda NHL All-Star Game** on Saturday, Feb. 4 (3 p.m. ET, ABC, ESPN+, CBC, Sportsnet, TVAS).

* This will mark the 67th NHL All-Star Game in NHL history and seventh under the three-on-three format, introduced in 2016. Prior to the first official NHL All-Star Game in 1947, three benefit games were played: the "Ace" Bailey Benefit Game in 1934, Howie Morenz Memorial Game in 1937 and Babe Siebert Memorial Game in 1939.

* This will mark the second time the Panthers and South Florida host NHL All-Star activities, as the Panthers previously hosted the NHL All-Star Game in 2003.

F 16 Aleksander Barkov, FLA (2nd)

* Barkov is set to play in his second career NHL All-Star Game, following an appearance at AMALIE Arena in 2018.

* On Jan. 28, Barkov (234-366—600 in 638 GP) became the [ninth Finnish-born player in NHL history](#) to reach the 600-point milestone. He needs 14 points to surpass **Jonathan Huberdeau** (198-415—613 in 671 GP) for sole possession of the [most in franchise history](#).

* Owns an active 11-game point streak dating to Jan. 10 (5-12—17), which marks the longest of his NHL career and just six contests shy of matching the [franchise record](#).

D 26 Rasmus Dahlin, BUF (2nd)

* Dahlin (14-41—55 in 49 GP), who is set to make his second NHL All-Star Game appearance in as many years, ranks second among defensemen for [goals](#) and [points](#) this season behind **Erik Karlsson** (16-50—66 in 51 GP). His 41 assists are the [third most among blueliners](#) behind Karlsson and **Josh Morrissey** (10-43—53 in 52 GP).

* Reached 50 points in his 43rd game this season and became the second-fastest defenseman in franchise history to hit the mark, behind **John Van Boxmeer** (41 GP in 1981-82).

* Set to become the seventh blueliner in franchise history appear in an NHL All-Star Game multiple times, following **Mike Ramsey** (4x), **Phil Housley** (3x), **Brian Campbell** (2x), **Jerry Korab** (2x), **Jim Schoenfeld** (2x) and **Alexei Zhitnik** (2x).

F 86 Nikita Kucherov, TBL (4th)

* Has recorded 5-2—7 across his previous three NHL All-Star Game appearances, including a hat trick for Team Atlantic in their opening contest in 2018 (in front of his home fans in Tampa Bay). That was the first hat trick ever recorded under the three-on-three All-Star format.

* Leads all NHL skaters in assists and tied for third in points with 19-53—72 this season (48 GP). That total includes an 11-game point streak from Oct. 15 – Nov. 8 (6-14—20 in 11 GP).

* Kucherov is a two-time Stanley Cup champion (2019-20 & 2020-21) who has also won the Hart Trophy, Art Ross Trophy and Ted Lindsay Award (all in 2018-19).

* On Dec. 13, Kucherov became the fastest player in Lightning history to reach the 400-assist milestone (590 GP) – one of five players to reach the benchmark [with the club](#).

F 71 Dylan Larkin, DET (3rd)

* Larkin has the most overtime goals (7) and points (16) among Red Wings players since three-on-three OT was introduced in 2015-16.

* Larkin, in his third season as Red Wings captain, trails only four players on the [franchise's all-time overtime goals](#) list: **Sergei Fedorov**, **Brendan Shanahan**, **Steve Yzerman** and **Pavel Datsyuk**.

* Larkin had four overtime goals under the three-on-three format in 2018-19, the [most in a single season in Red Wings history](#).

F 16 Mitchell Marner, TOR (2nd)

* Marner is set to make his second All-Star Game appearance after skating at the 2020 event in St. Louis.

* Set a Toronto [franchise record](#) with a 23-game point streak earlier this season, becoming the third active NHL player with a run of at least that length (also **Patrick Kane**: 26 GP in 2015-16 and **Sidney Crosby**: 25 GP in 2010-11). Marner is the only player with a point streak of 20+ games this season.

* Marner (467 GP on Jan. 7) became the second-fastest player in Maple Leafs history to accumulate 500 points with the franchise – he trailed only teammate **Auston Matthews** who hit the mark in his 445th contest Jan. 3.

F 88 David Pastrnak, BOS (3rd)

* Pastrnak has totaled 4-4—8 in his two NHL All-Star Game appearances (3 GP), both under the 3-on-3 format. He notched two assists in a [semifinal loss in 2019](#) at SAP Center in San Jose and then collected 4-2—6 during the 2020 event at Enterprise Center in St. Louis to claim MVP honors.

* In 2020, Pastrnak became the first player from Czechia to be named All-Star MVP. Additionally, he became the fourth Bruins player awarded the honor, following **Bobby Orr** (1972), **Ray Bourque** (1996) and **Bill Guerin** (2001). Pastrnak is one of two players headed to Sunrise who has claimed the honor (also **Sidney Crosby** in 2019).

* Pastrnak is one of six players to score a hat trick under the 3-on-3 All-Star format, doing so in the [2020 Semifinal](#) against the Metropolitan Division. Two of the other five also did so while representing the Atlantic Division (**Nikita Kucherov** in 2018 and **Anthony Duclair** in 2020).

* Pastrnak (4-4—8 in 3 GP) is tied with **Victor Hedman** (3-5—8 in 4 GP) and **Jack Eichel** (2-6—8 in 5 GP) for the most points with the Atlantic Division at the All-Star Game. Pastrnak also trails only **Nikita Kucherov** (5), who will be his teammate once again in Sunrise (also 2019), for the most goals for the Atlantic under the 3-on-3 format.

F 14 Nick Suzuki, MTL (2nd)

* Suzuki (also 2022), 23, is set to become the first Canadiens *skater* in the NHL's expansion era (since 1967-68) to make multiple NHL All-Star Game appearances before age 24 – goaltender **Carey Price** (2009 at age 21, 2011 at age 23) is the only Montreal player to do so in that span.

* Suzuki became the youngest captain in Canadiens history when he was given the “C” ahead of the 2022-23 season at age 23. The distinction was previously held by **Sylvio Mantha** who was named captain at age 24 ahead of the 1926-27 campaign.

* At age 21, Suzuki led the Canadiens with 16 points during their run to the 2021 Stanley Cup Final.

F 7 Brady Tkachuk, OTT (3rd)

* Tkachuk is set to become the third Senators player to make at least three NHL All-Star Game appearances, following **Daniel Alfredsson** (6x) and **Erik Karlsson** (5x).

* This is Tkachuk's third NHL All-Star Game after he played at the 2020 event in his hometown of St. Louis – where he joined his brother, **Matthew** (soon to be a 2x NHL All-Star), and father, **Keith** (a 5x NHL All-Star), on stage for the first-ever Gatorade NHL Shooting Stars – and took part in the 2022 festivities in Vegas.

* The Tkachuks are among a group of four father-son combos who each skated in multiple NHL All-Star Games; **Gordie** (23x) and **Mark Howe** (4x), **Bobby** (12x) and **Brett Hull** (8x), and **Bill** (2x) and **Kevin Dineen** (2x) are the others. If **Matthew Tkachuk** skates in the 2023 game, the Tkachuks will become the first family to have a father and *multiple* sons each with more than one NHL All-Star Game appearance.

* He leads the Senators in [assists](#) and [points](#) this season, his second as captain. In 2021-22, he became the youngest ever to wear the “C” for the franchise.

* On Dec. 2, Tkachuk scored his 100th NHL goal in his 300th career game to become the [sixth-fastest in franchise history](#) to reach the 100-goal milestone.

F 19 Matthew Tkachuk, FLA (2nd)

* This is the second time in as many NHL All-Star appearances that Tkachuk will have a special connection to the host city. His first appearance in 2020 was in St. Louis, where he grew up, and the 2023 event will be hosted in South Florida by his new club, the Panthers.

* If Matthew skates in the 2023 game, the Tkachuks will become the first family to have a father and *multiple* sons each with more than one NHL All-Star Game appearance. His father **Keith** (5x) and brother **Brady** (3x, including 2023) already are among a group of four father-son combos who each skated in multiple NHL All-Star Games; **Gordie** (23x) and **Mark Howe** (4x), **Bobby** (12x) and **Brett Hull** (8x), and **Bill** (2x) and **Kevin Dineen** (2x) are the others.

* Tkachuk leads the Panthers in [assists](#) and [points](#) this season, topping the NHL for points by players on new teams in 2022-23.

* On Jan. 3, Tkachuk scored his first hat trick in a Panthers uniform. He also tallied his 20th goal for the club that night in just his 36th game, becoming the second-fastest to reach the benchmark with the franchise (behind **Pavel Bure**: 20 GP from 1998-99 – 1999-00).

G 35 Linus Ullmark, BOS (1st)

* Leads all NHL goaltenders in wins (26), goals-against average (1.90) and save percentage (.937).

* Earned his 20th win of 2022-23 in just his 24th appearance, matching **Andrei Vasilevskiy** (24 GP in 2020-21) and **Andrew Hammond** (24 GP in 2014-15) for the second-fewest games to 20 wins in a season trailing only former Bruins goaltender **Tiny Thompson** (23 GP in 1929-30).

* Won [eight consecutive home games](#) from Oct. 17 – Nov. 17, 2022 (8-0-0, 1.60 GAA, .947 SV%).

G 88 Andrei Vasilevskiy, TBL (5th)

* Vasilevskiy, who has played in each of the past four NHL All-Star Games, is set to overtake **Vincent Lecavalier** (4) for the third-most appearances in Lightning history, behind only **Steven Stamkos** (7) and **Martin St. Louis** (6). Teammate **Nikita Kucherov** will join Vasilevskiy in Sunrise for his fourth career appearance.

* Vasilevskiy (6 GP over 4 years) is set to become the [second goaltender to make five](#) NHL All-Star Game appearances since the 3-on-3 format was introduced in 2016, following **Braden Holtby** (7 GP in 5 years). Vasilevskiy will tie (and could surpass) Holtby for the most games played under the 3-on-3 All-Star format.

* Overall, Vasilevskiy will become the [18th goaltender in League history](#) to appear in five or more All-Star Games – a list topped by **Glenn Hall** (13). Using a minimum of one game played during the 2022-23 NHL season as a measure, Vasilevskiy is the only *active* goaltender with as many All-Star appearances.

* Vasilevskiy will become the 10th goaltender in NHL history to make at least five consecutive All-Star Game appearances and the fourth to do so since the start of the 1990s, following **Martin Brodeur** (6 from 1996 to 2001), **Patrick Roy** (5 from 1990 to 1994) and **Braden Holtby** (5 from 2016 to 2020).

* Vasilevskiy helped the Atlantic Division win the [Dunkin' Save Streak](#) competition during Skills in 2022.

F 87 Sidney Crosby, PIT (5th)

* Crosby is set to become the fifth Penguins player to play in the All-Star Game at least five times, following **Mario Lemieux** (10x), **Jaromir Jagr** (6x), **Kris Letang** (6x) and **Paul Coffey** (5x).

* Crosby was named NHL [All-Star Game MVP](#) in 2019, his most recent appearance, after compiling 4-4—8 across the two games – including multiple goals in each outing – to lead the Metropolitan Division to its second NHL All-Star title under the three-on-three format

* Crosby is one of six NHL players to capture the All-Star MVP, Hart Trophy *and* Conn Smythe Trophy in his career, with **Jean Beliveau**, **Bobby Orr**, **Wayne Gretzky**, **Mario Lemieux** and **Joe Sakic** the others on that list.

* Crosby (6-6—12 in 5 GP) is tied with **Roman Josi** (3-9—12 in 6 GP) and **Johnny Gaudreau** (5-7—12 in 8 GP) for the [second-most points](#) All-Star Game format, behind **Connor McDavid** (2-11—13 in 8 GP).

* Crosby (2-3—5) and Islanders forward **Mathew Barzal** (2-3—5) each recorded five points in the 2019 Final, still the [highest single-game total](#) recorded under the three-on-three format.

* Crosby leads the Penguins in [goals](#), [assists](#) and [points](#) and is on pace for 40+ goals and 100+ points.

D 23 Adam Fox, NYR (1st)

* Fox can become the first Rangers defenseman to play in an NHL All-Star Game since **Ryan McDonagh** made consecutive appearances for the Metropolitan Division in 2016 and 2017.

* Fox ranks [third in team scoring](#) this season with 48 points (10-38—48), trailing only **Mika Zibanejad** (22-27—49) and fellow 2023 All-Star **Artemi Panarin** (12-38—50). A Norris Trophy finalist in each of the past two seasons, including winning the award in 2020-21, Fox ranks fourth in [scoring among defensemen](#) so far in 2022-23.

* On New Year's Day, Fox (241 GP) became the second-fastest defenseman in Rangers history to record [200 NHL points](#), behind **Brian Leetch** (211 GP). Leetch represented New York at the All-Star Game a club-record nine times.

* On March 25, 2021, Fox matched a [franchise record for assists in a game by a defenseman](#) by posting five helpers to equal the benchmark set by **Brian Leetch** in 1994-95. That performance also allowed Fox to tie the [Rangers record for points in a game by a blueliner](#), one Leetch also was the first to achieve.

F 13 Johnny Gaudreau, CBJ (7th)

* Gaudreau is one of three players among the group of 44 headed to Sunrise who is set to make at least his seventh career NHL All-Star Game appearance (also **Alex Ovechkin**: 8; and **Erik Karlsson**: 7).

* Gaudreau (Salem, N.J.) and **Bobby Ryan** (Cherry Hill, N.J.) are the only players born in New Jersey to skate in an NHL All-Star Game.

* Gaudreau has 5-7—12 under the three-on-three All-Star Game format (8 GP) which is tied for the second most points since its inception in 2016; he trails only **Connor McDavid** (2-11—13 in 8 GP) and is tied with **Sidney Crosby** (6-6—12 in 5 GP) and **Roman Josi** (3-9—12 in 6 GP).

* In his first season with the Blue Jackets, Gaudreau leads the club in [goals](#) (tied), [assists](#) and [points](#).

* Tied for second in the NHL in overtime points since three-on-three OT was introduced in 2015-16 (12-16—28).

F 13 Kevin Hayes, PHI (1st)

* Leads all Flyers players in assists (30) in 2022-23 and ranks second on the team in points (45).

* Posted a season-opening five-game point streak from Oct. 13-22, 2022 (1-7—8 in 5 GP).

* Ranks tied for first on the Flyers in power-play points (6-9—15 in 50 GP), which is a new career high besting the total from his 2018-19 campaign split between the Rangers and Jets (3-8—11 in 71 GP).

F 86 Jack Hughes, NJD (2nd)

* Hughes, 21, can become the second player in Devils franchise history to make multiple NHL All-Star Game appearances at age 21 or younger – he would join **Kirk Muller** (19 years, 4 days in 1985; 19 years, 361 days in 1986).

* Hughes (2022) and his brother **Quinn Hughes** (2020), who both were born in Orlando, are the only Florida-born players to skate in an NHL All-Star Game.

* Hughes leads the Devils in three-on-three overtime goals (3) and points (12) since his debut in 2019-20.

* Hughes (46 GP on Jan. 22) became the third-fastest player in Devils/Rockies/Scouts franchise history to reach the 30-goal mark, behind **Paul Gardner** (44 GP in 1977-78 w/ CLR) and **Claude Lemieux** (45 GP in 1991-92 w/ NJD). Hughes became the first Florida-born 30-goal scorer in NHL history.

F 29 Brock Nelson, NYI (1st)

* Nelson is tied for the team leads in goals (15) in 2022-23 and is on pace to record his second consecutive 30-goal campaign after a career-high 37 tallies in 2021-22.

* Sits one goal shy of becoming the eighth player in Islanders history to record [seven 20-goal seasons](#) with the franchise.

* Ranks 11th on the [Islanders all-time goals list](#) with 224 and sits two power-play markers shy of becoming the 11th skater to net 50 [career power-play goals with the franchise](#).

F 8 Alex Ovechkin, WSH (8th)

* Ovechkin (8, including 2023) has the most All-Star Game appearances among the group of 44 players headed to Sunrise. The only other active NHL player with as many appearances is **Patrick Kane** (9).

* On Dec. 13, Ovechkin joined **Wayne Gretzky** and **Gordie Howe** as the third player in NHL history to score [800 regular-season goals](#). On Dec. 23, he [surpassed Howe](#) for second place [all-time](#).

* Ovechkin has seven career goals in the NHL All-Star Game (2-2—4 in two *appearances* under [three-on-three format](#) and 5-6—11 in five appearances under [five-on-five format](#)), one of 13 players with as many goals under [any format](#). That places Ovechkin behind both Gretzky (13-12—25 in 18 GP) – the record holder alongside **Mario Lemieux** – and Howe (10-9—19 in 23 GP) for career All-Star goals (regardless of format). Only three active players have as many [career All-Star goals](#) as Ovechkin.

* In 2022-23, Ovechkin became the third player in NHL history to record at least 18 [consecutive 20-goal seasons](#) and tied the League record for most [career 30-goal seasons](#). He is on pace to set a new NHL benchmark for most [career 40-goal](#) and [50-goal campaigns](#).

F 10 Artemi Panarin, NYR (1st)

* Panarin is one of two undrafted players to be named to the 2023 Honda NHL All-Star Game, joining Golden Knights goaltender **Logan Thompson** (Pacific) who was part of the [first 32 players announced Jan. 5](#). The 2022 All-Star Game was the last to feature multiple undrafted players, in goaltender **Cam Talbot** and forward **Jonathan Marchessault**.

* Panarin needs one goal for 200 in his NHL career, with 199-420—619 in 557 games to date. He is on track to become the fastest undrafted player to reach the 200-goal milestone since **Steve Thomas** hit the mark while playing with the Islanders on Feb. 3, 1993 (511 GP).

* On Dec. 8, 2022, Panarin registered his 600th NHL point while skating in his 536th career game – the fifth fastest active player to reach the milestone behind **Connor McDavid** (421 GP), **Sidney Crosby** (430 GP), **Alex Ovechkin** (464 GP) and **Evgeni Malkin** (490 GP) – all of whom were first-round NHL Draft picks. Panarin also hit the 400-assist mark this season, the [fifth-fastest undrafted player to do so](#).

* Panarin has 83-216—299 since signing as a free agent with the Rangers before the 2019-20 season (235 GP), putting him among the top five point-producers in the NHL [over that span](#).

G 31 Igor Shesterkin, NYR (1st)

* Ranks among the top-10 goaltenders this season in wins (21; t-5th) and goals-against average (2.45; t-9th).

* Posted a six-game win streak from Dec. 5-18, 2022 (6-0-0, 1.80 GAA, .939 SV%).

* In 2021-22, Shesterkin became the third Rangers goaltender to win the Vezina Trophy under the current selection criteria (since 1981-82), joining **Henrik Lundqvist** (2011-12) and **John Vanbiesbrouck** (1985-86) after leading all goaltenders in goals-against average (2.07) and save percentage (.935).

G 30 Ilya Sorokin, NYI (1st)

* Sorokin will become the fifth Islanders goaltender to play in an NHL All-Star Game and first to do so under the 3-on-3 format. He will follow **Glenn Resch** (1976 & 1977), **Billy Smith** (1978), **Rick DiPietro** (2008) and **Jaroslav Halak** (2015).

* Sorokin (.924) ranks third in the NHL in [save percentage since the start of last season](#) (min. 50 GP), behind Metropolitan Division teammate **Igor Shesterkin** (.928) and Atlantic Division All-Star **Linus Ullmark** (.926).

* In just his third NHL season, Sorokin (14) already ranks fourth (tied) in Islanders history [for career shutouts](#) (a club now in its 50th season). His climb up that list was aided by a [franchise record-tying](#) seven shutouts during the 2021-22 season.

F 37 Andrei Svechnikov, CAR (1st)

* Ranks third among Hurricanes skaters for [goals](#) and [points](#) in 2022-23 (19-23—42 in 51 GP). He became the first Hurricanes player to record [multiple hat tricks in a single season](#) since **Jeff Skinner** in 2015-16 – **Sebastian Aho** has also accomplished the feat since Svechnikov.

* Reached the 100-goal milestone on Nov. 10, at 22 years, 229 days of age – the sixth-youngest to reach the milestone among players to make their NHL debut with the Hurricanes/Whalers franchise.

* Carolina's second overall pick in the 2018 NHL Draft, Svechnikov [leads all members of his draft class](#) in career points (108-143—251 in 334 GP).

F 29 Leon Draisaitl, EDM (4th)

* Draisaitl is set to make his fourth NHL All-Star Game appearance, all under the three-on-three format, following trips to San Jose (2019), St. Louis (2020) and Las Vegas (2022). He collected six of his seven career All-Star points at the 2020 event when he helped the Pacific Division win its third All-Star title.

* Draisaitl tallied 3-1—4 in the [2020 Semifinal](#) against the Central Division (alongside Pacific Division teammate **Tomas Hertl**, who set a [3-on-3 record with four goals](#)), the most recent All-Star contest to feature a hat trick. He accounts for one of the six hat tricks under the 3-on-3 format.

* After setting and matching career highs for goals (55) and points (110) in 2021-22, Draisaitl is on track to establish new personal single-season benchmarks for assists and points this season. With 29-47—76 through 48 games, Draisaitl is contributing at a rate that would see him finish with 50-80—130 over a full 82-game season.

* Draisaitl sits 24 points shy of his fourth [career 100-point season](#) – a feat achieved by only three active players: **Sidney Crosby** (6), **Connor McDavid** (5) and **Alex Ovechkin** (4).

* Draisaitl (Cologne, Germany) is the only *German national* to make multiple NHL All-Star Game appearances (also 2019, 2020, 2022). He is one of six *German-born* players to skate in the event, following **Walt Tkaczuk** (1970), **Willie Huber** (1983), **Uwe Krupp** (1991), **Marco Sturm** (1999) and **Dany Heatley** (2003, 2007, 2009). Draisaitl has more career NHL goals, assists and points than any *German born-and-trained* player in history.

F 22 Kevin Fiala, LAK (1st)

* Fiala leads the Kings in scoring with 18-35—53 in his first season with the franchise (53 GP). He can become the first player in over 20 years to lead the Kings in scoring at season's end in his first campaign in Los Angeles. The most recent: **Jason Allison** in 2001-02.

* On Nov. 14, Fiala became the [fourth Swiss-born player](#) in NHL history to reach 300 career NHL points.

* In 2021-22, his final season with Minnesota before being traded to Los Angeles this past summer, Fiala posted single-season career highs in goals (33), assists (52) and points (85).

F 53 Bo Horvat, NYI (2nd)

* Horvat will return to the NHL All-Star Game for the first time since his debut in 2017 when he tallied 2-2—4 across two 3-on-3 games to help the Pacific Division reach the championship contest for the second time in as many years under the format.

* Horvat will join **Elias Pettersson**, who was named to his third NHL All-Star Game as part of the first 32 selected Jan. 5, as the second Canucks player to make multiple appearances *under the 3-on-3 format*.

* Horvat (31-23—54 in 49 GP) sits one goal shy of matching his single-season career high set in 2021-22 (31 G in 70 GP); he also needs 13 points for a new personal best.

* On Jan. 14, the Canucks captain became the first Vancouver player with [consecutive 30-goal seasons](#) since **Daniel Sedin** (2 from 2010-11 – 2011-12). Horvat reached 30 goals in his 42nd game of the season, the fourth-fewest contests by a Canucks player behind **Pavel Bure** (35 GP in 1992-93), **Alexander Mogilny** (36 GP in 1995-96) and **Markus Naslund** (41 GP in 2002-03) – all of whom played in the All-Star Game that season.



* Horvat was traded to the Islanders for **Anthony Beauvillier**, **Aatu Raty** and a conditional first-round pick in 2023 NHL Draft on Jan. 30.

F 91 Nazem Kadri, CGY (2nd)

* During his [day with the Stanley Cup](#) last summer, Kadri made a stop at the London Muslim Mosque, the one he attended while growing up in London. It is believed to be the first time the Stanley Cup has [visited a mosque](#).

* In his first season with Calgary after winning his first Stanley Cup in 2022 with Colorado. He made his Flames debut on Oct. 13 against the Avalanche – [one of three players](#) in the past 17 years to make his team debut against a club with whom he had won the Stanley Cup the prior season.

* In 2021-22, Kadri finished among the top 20 in points for the first time in his NHL career after posting personal bests in both assists (59) and points (87).

D 65 Erik Karlsson, SJS (7th)

* Karlsson is one of three players set to make at least his seventh career NHL All-Star Game appearance (also **Alex Ovechkin**: 8; and **Johnny Gaudreau**: 7).

* Karlsson (16-50—66 in 51 GP) is well on his way to setting single-season franchise records for [assists](#) (current record: 67) and [points](#) (current record: 83) by a defenseman and to becoming the third different San Jose blueliner with [20+ goals in a campaign](#).

* Karlsson is on pace for 25+ goals, 80+ assists and 100+ points. The only defensemen in NHL history to achieve [all three of those feats in the same season](#) are **Bobby Orr** (5x) and **Paul Coffey** (4x).

* Karlsson recorded a 14 -game point streak (2-20—22 Dec. 3, 2022- Jan. 6), which stands as a [Sharks franchise record for any player](#) (defenseman or forward). He is one of two defensemen in NHL history to have the outright lead for a franchise's longest point streak (also **Brian Leetch**: 17 GP in 1991-92 w/ NYR).

* Karlsson also recorded a 14-game assist streak, another [franchise record for any player](#). He became the [fifth defenseman in NHL history to record an assist streak](#) of 14 or more games, equalling Phil Housley (14 GP in 1992-93) for the longest run by a blueliner in the past 30 years.

* On Jan. 1, Karlsson became the [eighth defenseman in NHL history](#) to record 40 assists in a season in fewer than 40 games.

* On Dec. 29, Karlsson became the [fourth different defenseman in NHL history](#) – and first since **Al MacInnis** in 1990-91 – to hit 50 points in a season in 37 games or fewer.

F 97 Connor McDavid, EDM (6th)

* McDavid is set to make his sixth NHL All-Star Game appearance, which would tie **Jari Kurri**, **Kevin Lowe** and **Grant Fuhr** for second-most in franchise history behind the eight by both **Wayne Gretzky** and **Mark Messier**.

* So far in 2022-23, McDavid has set career highs for [longest goal streak](#) (7 GP) and [longest assist streak](#) (10 GP) and equaled a personal best for [longest point streak](#) (17 GP). He is on pace to compile 60+ goals, 80+ assists and 150+ points – [only four different players in League history](#) have hit each of those marks during the same season.

* McDavid could become the seventh player in NHL history – and fourth in the League's expansion era (since 1967-68) – to finish a campaign as the leader in goals, assists and points (outright or tied). Only **Wayne Gretzky** (5x; last: 1986-87), **Mario Lemieux** (2x; last: 1995-96), **Gordie Howe** (2x; last: 1952-53), **Phil Esposito** (1972-73), **Howie Morenz** (1927-28) and **Newsy Lalonde** (1918-19) have achieved the feat to date.

* McDavid hit the [40-goal mark](#) in just 48 games this season, making him the player to achieve the feat since **Pavel Bure** (48 GP in 1999-00). McDavid then reached the 90-point mark in his 50th contest, tying his career high for fewest games to hit the plateau (also 50 GP in 2020-21).

* McDavid has five [100-point seasons](#) and is within striking distance of a sixth, a number achieved by only one active player: **Sidney Crosby** (6). McDavid is set to become the 16th player in League history with at least six seasons of 100+ points.

* McDavid started the season by scoring a hat trick and four points to become the [sixth-fastest in League history to reach the 700-point milestone](#). He now is on track to become the fifth-fastest in NHL history to reach the *800-point milestone*.

* McDavid's trophy case includes four Art Ross Trophies, three Ted Lindsay Awards and a pair of Hart Trophy wins.

* Paces the NHL in overtime goals and points since three-on-three OT was introduced in 2015-16 (14-15—29).

F 40 Elias Pettersson, VAN (3rd)

* Pettersson is set to become the sixth Canucks player to play in the All-Star Game at least three times, following **Markus Naslund** (5x), **Pavel Bure** (4x), **Ed Jovanovski** (3x), **Daniel Sedin** (3x) and **Henrik Sedin** (3x).

* Pettersson made his NHL All-Star Game debut in 2019 as a rookie. He became the third rookie in Canucks history to skate in an All-Star Game, following **Dale Tallon** (1971) and **Brock Boeser** (2018), with **Quinn Hughes** (2020) since adding his name to that list. He helped make Vancouver the first team in the expansion era (since 1967-68) and third in All-Star history to be represented by a rookie in three consecutive seasons.

* Pettersson leads the Canucks in [points](#) in 2022-23 and can record the first [100-point season by a Vancouver player](#) since **Daniel Sedin** in 2010-11 (currently on pace for 99).

G 74 Stuart Skinner, EDM (1st)

* Skinner is set to become the second rookie (any position) to represent the Oilers in an NHL All-Star Game, following 19-year-old **Grant Fuhr** in 1982. Skinner (13-10-3 in 28 GP) is [tied for second in wins among rookies this season](#) and third-most by an [Oilers rookie in a single season](#) – Fuhr set the record with 28 during his All-Star campaign in 1981-82. Fuhr entered the 1982 All-Star Game as the rookie leader with 20 wins at the time.

* The 2023 NHL All-Star Game is set to become the first in League history in which multiple rookie goaltenders play (for any team), with Skinner joining fellow Pacific Division netminder and rookie **Logan Thompson** of Vegas.

* Only 14 rookie goaltenders in NHL history have played in an All-Star Game, with Skinner and Thompson of Vegas set to raise that total to 16. Over the past 22 years, only two rookie netminders have appeared in an NHL All-Star Game: Anaheim's **John Gibson** (2 GP in 2015-16) and San Jose's **Evgeni Nabokov** (2000-01).

* Of the 14 rookie goaltenders to play in an NHL All-Star Game, three did so while representing the reigning Stanley Cup champion (under a previous format). All rookie goaltenders to play in an All-Star Game are listed [at the bottom of this document](#).

F 20 Chandler Stephenson, VGK (1st)

* Stephenson, who set to make his first career NHL All-Star Game appearance, leads the Golden Knights for both [assists](#) (33) and [points](#) (44) in 51 games this season.

* Won a Stanley Cup with the Capitals in 2018 and appeared in all five of Washington's games during the Final versus Vegas, which he joined via trade on Dec. 3, 2019.

* Stephenson (54-111—165 in 222 GP) ranks third in points among Golden Knights players [since his team debut on Dec. 3, 2019](#), behind **Jonathan Marchessault** (80-91—171 in 213 GP) and **Mark Stone** (57-111—168 in 171 GP).

F 19 Troy Terry, ANA (2nd)

* Terry (Denver, Colo.) is one of three Colorado-born players to skate in an NHL All-Star Game; with his appearance last year he joined fellow Denverites **Ben Bishop** (2016) and **Jacob Slavin** (2020).

* Terry leads the Ducks in [assists](#) and is tied for the most [points](#) (tied) in 2022-23 after setting career highs in each of those categories last season (37-30—67 in 75 GP).

* Terry posted a 16-game point streak last season which fell three games shy of the [franchise record](#).

G 36 Logan Thompson, VGK (1st)

* Leads all rookies and is tied for ninth in the NHL with 19 wins in 2022-23 (19-13-3, 2.69 GAA, .913 SV%, 2 SO).

* An undrafted goaltender, Thompson can become the third rookie netminder in the last 22 years to appear in an NHL All-Star Game following Anaheim's **John Gibson** (2015-16) and San Jose's **Evgeni Nabokov** (2000-01). This can become the third consecutive All-Star Game to feature an undrafted goaltender after **Cam Talbot** represented Minnesota in 2022 and **David Rittich** represented Calgary in 2020. The last time multiple undrafted goaltenders played in the same NHL All-Star Game was 2017 (**Martin Jones** and **Sergei Bobrovsky**).

* Thompson can become the second Golden Knights goaltender to appear in an NHL All-Star Game following **Marc-Andre Fleury** (2018 and 2019).

All-Star appearance in brackets (including 2023)

G 37 Connor Hellebuyck, WPG (3rd)

* Hellebuyck is set to make his third NHL All-Star Game appearance after representing the Jets and the Central Division in 2018 and 2020. The only goaltender to represent the Jets/Thrashers franchise in an All-Star Game, Hellebuyck is set to tie **Ilya Kovalchuk** (3, all w/ ATL) and **Dustin Byfuglien** (3; 1 w/ ATL, 2 w/ WPG) for the most All-Star appearances in franchise history. The original Jets (now the Arizona Coyotes) never had a goaltender play in an All-Star Game.

* Hellebuyck will become the sixth goaltender to play [at least three years under the three-on-three All-Star format](#), following **Braden Holtby** (5), **Andrei Vasilevskiy** (5, including 2023), **John Gibson** (3), **Pekka Rinne** (3) and **Devan Dubnyk** (3).

* Hellebuyck is the Jets/Thrashers franchise leader in [games played](#) and has contested nearly half of the club's regular-season games since they relocated to Winnipeg in 2011-12 (48%). He also tops the franchise lists for career [wins](#) and [shutouts](#).

D 4 Seth Jones, CHI (4th)

* This is set to be Jones' fourth NHL All-Star Game appearance, all under the three-on-three format. That will tie him with **Kris Letang**, **Brent Burns**, **Drew Doughty** and **Roman Josi** for the second-most All-Star appearances *since 2016* among defensemen, behind **Erik Karlsson** who is expected to contest his fifth contest in that span.

* Overall, Jones is among a group of 11 players who are set to make at least their fourth *career* NHL All-Star Game appearance in 2023. The others: **Alex Ovechkin** (8), **Johnny Gaudreau** (7), **Erik Karlsson** (7), **Connor McDavid** (6), **Sidney Crosby** (5), **Andrei Vasilevskiy** (5), **Leon Draisaitl** (4), **Nikita Kucherov** (4), **Nathan MacKinnon** (4) and **Vladimir Tarasenko** (4).

* Paces NHL defensemen in overtime points since three-on-three OT was introduced in 2015-16 (9-16—25). That is sixth among all NHL skaters in that span behind **Connor McDavid** (14-15—29), **Johnny Gaudreau** (12-16—28), **Leon Draisaitl** (11-17—28), **Patrick Kane** (8-20—28) and **Artemi Panarin** (8-20—28).

F 97 Kirill Kaprizov, MIN (2nd)

* Kaprizov is set to become the first Wild *skater* to play in *consecutive* NHL All-Star Games. Overall, he will be the fifth player to represent Minnesota at the event more than once, following goaltender **Devan Dubnyk** (3x; 2016, 2017 & 2019), forwards **Eric Staal** (2x; 2018 & 2020) and **Marian Gaborik** (2x; 2003 & 2008) as well as defenseman **Ryan Suter** (2x; 2015 & 2017).

* So far in 2022-23, Kaprizov has set career highs for [longest goal streak](#) (7 GP) and [longest assist streak](#) (9 GP) and equaled a personal best for [longest point streak](#) (14 GP). He is on pace to compile [40+ goals, 50+ assists and 100+ points](#) for a *second straight season* – a feat achieved by only three active players (**Alex Ovechkin**, **Connor McDavid** and **Leon Draisaitl**).

* In 2021-22, Kaprizov posted the first [100-point season](#) in Wild history and set franchise records for goals (47) and assists (61) in a single campaign. That followed the 2020-21 season in which he [won the Calder Memorial Trophy](#) after leading NHL rookies in [goals](#) (27) and [points](#) (51) – franchise records for Wild rookies in each category despite an abbreviated campaign.

* On Dec. 18, Kaprizov became the [fourth-fastest active player](#) to reach 200 career points (167 GP), behind only **Sidney Crosby** (142 GP), **Alex Ovechkin** (165 GP) and **Evgeni Malkin** (166 GP).

* Kaprizov has 5-4—9 under the three-on-three overtime format, including a goal in his first career game. [At the time](#), he was the third player in NHL history to net an overtime goal in his League debut.

F 9 Clayton Keller, ARI (3rd)

* Keller (Chesterfield, Mo.) is one of two Missouri-born players to skate in an NHL All-Star Game, after five-time All-Star forward **Pat LaFontaine** (St. Louis, Mo.).

* Keller (also 2019 & 2022) can become the third Coyotes player to appear in at least three NHL All-Star Games since the club relocated to Arizona in 1996-97 – he would join forward **Keith Tkachuk** (3x; 1997, 1998 & 1999) and defenseman **Teppo Numminen** (3x; 1999, 2000 & 2001).

* Keller leads the Coyotes in [goals](#), [assists](#) and [points](#) this season. On Dec. 11, Keller netted his first NHL hat trick and posted the [ninth hat trick in franchise history that was completed in overtime](#).

* Keller was a [Calder Memorial Trophy](#) finalist in 2017-18 after finishing [second in rookie scoring](#) with 65 points. He is the only Coyotes player to be a top-three finalist for the award (since relocation in 1996-97).

F 29 Nathan MacKinnon, COL (4th)

* MacKinnon is set to play in his fourth career NHL All-Star Game, following appearances in 2017, 2018 and 2020. He also attended the 2019 event in San Jose but [did not participate in Skills or play in the 3-on-3 games due to injury](#). MacKinnon's absence from Skills led to one of the most memorable moments in the history of the Fastest Skater competition as he was replaced by **Kendall Coyne Schofield** who became the [first woman to participate in the event](#).

* MacKinnon can become the sixth player in franchise history play in four or more career All-Star Games, following **Joe Sakic** (12), **Peter Stastny** (6), **Patrick Roy** (5), **Michel Goulet** (5) and **Peter Forsberg** (5). Sakic made seven of his 12 appearances from 1995-96 onward, the most by an *Avalanche* player (each of the five by Roy and Forsberg were since the club began play in Colorado).

* MacKinnon (1.46), who has missed 11 *Avalanche* games this season due to injury, owns the fourth-highest points-per-game rate among all players in 2022-23, trailing only Pacific Division All-Stars **Connor McDavid** (1.84) and **Leon Draisaitl** (1.58) and Atlantic Division All-Star **Nikita Kucherov** (1.50).

* MacKinnon (255-447—702 in 675 GP) required the [sixth player in Avalanche/Nordiques history](#) to accumulate 700 points with the franchise. He became the fifth-fastest active skater to reach the milestone – only **Connor McDavid** (488 GP), **Sidney Crosby** (497 GP), **Alex Ovechkin** (579 GP) and **Evgeni Malkin** (580 GP) have done so in fewer than 695 games among that cohort.

D 8 Cale Makar, COL (2nd)

* Makar is set to become the third defenseman in *Avalanche/Nordiques* franchise history to skate in multiple NHL All-Star Games – only **Rob Blake** (3x; 2002, 2003 & 2004) and **Sandis Ozolinsh** (3x; 1997, 1998 & 2000) have done so.

* On Nov. 21, Makar became the fastest defenseman in NHL history to reach 200 career points (195 GP), besting the previous mark of 207 contests set by **Sergei Zubov**.

* Makar ranks among the top six in [goals](#), [assists](#) and [points](#) among defensemen since 2019-20 when he made his NHL regular-season debut.

D 44 Josh Morrissey, WPG (1st)

* Ranks second among all defensemen in assists (43) and third for points (53) in 2022-23 and is tied for first among blueliners with five game-winning goals.

* Morrissey has already established new career highs for assists and points in a single season and also reached the 200-career point milestone in 2022-23.

* He set Jets/Thrashers franchise records for [longest point streak by a defenseman](#) (11 GP) and [longest assist streak](#) by any player (11 GP) in 2022-23.

F 96 Mikko Rantanen, COL (2nd)

* Rantanen is set to make his second All-Star Game appearance after collecting 4-2—6 across two games during the 3-on-3 event in 2019. He posted 2-1—3 in both the semifinal and final that year

* Rantanen's six All-Star points rank tied for second among all players to skate in *only one year* under the 3-on-3 format, behind teammate **Gabriel Landeskog** who had 4-3—7 in 2019 (alongside Rantanen with the Central Division). The two tied for the most goals that year, equaling event MVP **Sidney Crosby** who also had four.

* On Jan. 18, Rantanen (43 GP) became the fastest *Avalanche* player to hit 30 goals in a season, besting the previous Colorado benchmark of 44 games set by **Joe Sakic** in 1995-96 (the franchise's first season in Denver).

* Rantanen hit the 30-goal mark for the fourth time in his career (and for the third straight season). He became the seventh player to accumulate at least four [30-goal seasons for the Avalanche/Nordiques](#) and the sixth to post [at least three in a row](#). He equaled Sakic and **Nathan MacKinnon** for the longest stretch of consecutive 30-goal seasons since the club relocated to Colorado in 1995-96.

F 21 Jason Robertson, DAL (1st)

* Ranks among the top-five in goals (33; t-5th) and points (66; t-6th) in 2022-23.

* Recorded an 18-game point streak from Oct. 27 – Dec. 4, which is the second longest by any player in 2022-23 and the second-longest by any player in [Stars/North Stars franchise history](#). Also posted a six-game goal streak from Oct. 27 – Nov. 8 (7-5—12 in 6 GP).

* Has recorded multiple points in 20 of 51 games played in 2022-23, tied for seventh in the NHL behind only **Connor McDavid** (26), **Leon Draisaitl** (22), **Matthew Tkachuk** (22), **Jack Hughes** (22), **Nikita Kucherov** (21) and **David Pastrnak** (21).

G 74 Juuse Saros, NSH (2nd)

* Saros was the only goaltender named Jan. 5 that had NHL All-Star Game experience.

* Saros (also 2022) is set to follow **Pekka Rinne** (3x; 2016, 2018 & 2019) as the second goaltender to represent the Predators in more than one All-Star Game. **Tomas Vokoun** (2004) is the only other Nashville netminder to skate in an NHL All-Star Game.

* Saros posted a career-high 38 wins in 2021-22 to finish one back of the League lead behind two Florida-based netminders: **Andrei Vasilevskiy** of the Lightning and **Sergei Bobrovsky** of the Panthers tied for the most with 39 apiece. Saros' win count was the fourth highest in [franchise history](#) behind a trio of 40+ win seasons by Rinne.

* In his final outing before the 2022 NHL All-Star Game – his first appearance – Saros recorded his 100th NHL win to become the third goaltender to accumulate as many [victories with Nashville](#).

F 91 Vladimir Tarasenko, STL (4th)

* Tarasenko can become the sixth Blues player to play in the All-Star Game at least four times, following **Brett Hull** (7x), **Garry Unger** (7x), **Al MacInnis** (6x), **Barclay Plager** (4x) and **Chris Pronger** (4x).

* Tarasenko has made two of his three career NHL All-Star Game appearances under the three-on-three format (2016 and 2017). He is one of five players headed to Sunrise that has skated in a five-on-five All-Star Game (2015), with **Alex Ovechkin** (5x), **Erik Karlsson** (2x), **Sidney Crosby** (1x) and **Johnny Gaudreau** (1x) being the others.

* Tarasenko (262) ranks seventh in terms of career goals among the group of 44 players headed to Sunrise, trailing only **Alex Ovechkin** (812), **Sidney Crosby** (541), **Leon Draisaitl** (283), **Connor McDavid** (280), **David Pastrnak** (278) and **Nikita Kucherov** (265).
