ART ROSS TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1947-48, the Art Ross Trophy is presented annually “to the player who leads the League in scoring points at the end of the regular season.”

History

Arthur Howey Ross, former manager-coach of the Boston Bruins, presented the Art Ross Trophy to the NHL in 1948. If two or more players finish the regular season with the same number of points, the trophy is awarded based on the following tiebreakers: 1. Player with the most goals, 2. Player with fewer games played, 3. Player scoring first goal of the season.

2022-23 Winner

Edmonton Oilers center **Connor McDavid** (64-89—153 in 82 GP) registered a career-high 153 points – 25 more than the next-closest player (teammate **Leon Draisaitl**: 52-76—128 in 80 GP) and the most by any NHL player since 1995-96 (**Mario Lemieux**: 69-92—161 in 70 GP w/ PIT) – to win his third straight and fifth overall Art Ross Trophy. He became the sixth player in League history to claim the Art Ross Trophy at least five times, joining **Wayne Gretzky** (10x), **Gordie Howe** (6x), Lemieux (6x), **Phil Esposito** (5x) and **Jaromir Jagr** (5x), and just the second to reach that number in his first eight NHL seasons, after Gretzky (7x). McDavid also became the sixth player in League history to win at least three consecutive Art Ross Trophies and the first to do so since Jagr from 1997-98 through 2000-01 (4x). His 25-point gap was the largest by an Art Ross Trophy winner since 1990-91, when Gretzky (41-122—163 in 78 GP w/ LAK) finished 32 points ahead of **Brett Hull** (86-45—131 in 78 GP w/ STL).

BILL MASTERTON MEMORIAL TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1967-68, the Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy is presented annually “to the player who best exemplifies the qualities of perseverance, sportsmanship and dedication to hockey.”

Voting

Local chapters of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submit nominations for the Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

The Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy was presented by the NHL Writers’ Association in 1968 to commemorate the late **Bill Masterton**, a player with the Minnesota North Stars who exhibited to a high degree the qualities of perseverance, sportsmanship and dedication to hockey and who died on Jan. 15, 1968, as a result of an on-ice injury.

Bill Masterton Memorial Scholarship Fund

A \$2,500 grant from the PHWA is awarded annually to the Bill Masterton Memorial Scholarship Fund, based in Bloomington, Minn., in the name of the trophy winner.

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2022-23 Finalists

Clayton Keller, RW, Arizona Coyotes

Keller suffered a fractured femur during a game versus the San Jose Sharks on March 30, 2022, and underwent six months of rehab to be ready for the start of what became a career season in 2022-23. He appeared in all 82 games and set career highs in goals (37), assists (49) and points (86), matching the highest points total by a Coyotes player since the team moved to Arizona (**Keith Tkachuk**, 52-34—86 in 1996-97). Keller represented the Coyotes at the 2023 NHL All-Star Game and posted 24 points in March, the most ever in a month by a Coyote. “His mental toughness is probably the part I’m most proud of because I know what had to be going through his mind immediately after the injury and the surgery,” [his father, Bryan Keller, told PHNX](#). “He had to wait a couple of days to start physical therapy, but once he was on the walker, he goes, ‘I’ll be skating in six weeks.’ And then once he started skating, he had already set a goal that he would be ready for opening night, which he was.”

Kris Letang, D, Pittsburgh Penguins

Letang persevered through a stroke, the second of his lifetime, and mourning the passing of his father within a span of four weeks during the season. Through it all, he remained a Penguins cornerstone in his 17th season with the team. He ranked 10th among all NHL players in ice time per game (24:51) and recorded 12-29—41 in 64 games. Letang is a Masterton Trophy finalist for the second time, finishing as a runner-up to Minnesota’s **Devan Dubnyk** in 2014-15. “Obviously, there are some tough times, there’s emotional times. But at the end of the day, I always thought that I was going to push through it and be able to go on the other side and be the same or better,” [Letang told The Athletic](#). “I always kind of took pride to be able to bring it every day. That’s how I was raised – never back down from a challenge or to never quit when you’re down.”

Alex Stalock, G, Chicago Blackhawks

Stalock signed as a free agent with the Blackhawks in July 2022, determined to regain an NHL roster spot. The 35-year-old, 11-year NHL veteran had appeared in one League game over the prior two seasons, having been diagnosed with myocarditis after testing positive for COVID-19 in 2019-20. Stalock quickly won over teammates with his off-ice presence and on-ice performance while battling through setbacks ranging from concussions to oculomotor dysfunction, a vision problem that affects the central nervous system. He finished the season at 9-15-2 with a 3.01 goals-against average in 27 games. “The last couple of years have been tough with what I’ve gone through,” [Stalock told the Chicago Sun-Times](#). “Honestly, going through it, were there points where I had doubts in my mind that I would ever play again? Yeah. But at the same time, it’s the way I’m wired that I wouldn’t let that be the end of it.”

CALDER MEMORIAL TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1932-33, the Calder Memorial Trophy is presented annually “to the player selected as the most proficient in his first year of competition.”

Voting

Members of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submit ballots for the Calder Memorial Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

From 1936-37 until his death in 1943, NHL President **Frank Calder** purchased a trophy each year to be given permanently to the League's outstanding rookie. After Calder's death, the NHL presented the Calder Memorial Trophy in his memory.

Eligibility

To be eligible for the Calder Memorial Trophy, a player cannot have played more than 25 games in any single preceding season nor in six or more games in each of any two preceding seasons in any major professional league. Beginning in 1990-91, a player must not have attained his 26th birthday by Sept. 15 of the season in which he is eligible.

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2022-23 Finalists

Matty Beniers, C, Seattle Kraken

Beniers led rookies with 24-33—57 in 80 games to help the Kraken (46-28-8, 100 points) post the largest win (+19) and point (+40) improvements by an NHL franchise from its first to second season. The No. 2 overall pick from the 2021 NHL Draft, the first selection in Seattle history, also ranked among the top rookies in multi-point performances (1st; 18), shooting percentage (1st, minimum: 80 S; 16.2%), plus/minus (1st; +14), goals (t-1st; 24), assists (2nd; 33), game-winning goals (2nd; 4), shots on goal (4th; 148), power-play points (6th; 10), power-play goals (t-6th; 4) and power-play assists (8th; 6). Beniers, who finished second among rookie forwards in total time on ice (1,367:22) and fourth in average time on ice (17:06), was assessed only one penalty to become the fourth different player in League history – rookie or veteran – to skate in at least 80 games in a season and receive two or fewer penalty minutes. The 20-year-old Beniers, the first NHL Awards finalist in Kraken history, is seeking to become the first player from an expansion franchise to win the Calder Trophy within his team's first two seasons since **Peter Stastny** captured the award in 1980-81, the Quebec Nordiques' second campaign.

Owen Power, D, Buffalo Sabres

Power, who played two seasons of college hockey with Beniers at the University of Michigan (2020-21 and 2021-22) and was selected one pick ahead of him in the 2021 NHL Draft, paced rookie defensemen with 4-31—35 across 79 contests. He finished among the top rookies – forwards and defensemen – in assists (3rd; 31), plus/minus (t-3rd; +10), power-play assists (4th; 8), shots on goal (7th; 130) and power-play points (t-9th; 8). Power also led all rookies in both average (23:48) and total (1,880:20) time on ice, the fifth-highest and seventh-highest figures, respectively, since the statistics began being recorded in 1997-98 (minimum: 15 GP). The 20-year-old Power is the Sabres' first Calder Trophy finalist since current teammate and fellow No. 1 overall draft selection **Rasmus Dahlin** placed third in voting in 2018-19. He is vying to become Buffalo's fourth winner of the award, after defenseman **Tyler Myers** (2009-10), goaltender **Tom Barrasso** (1983-84) and center **Gilbert Perreault** (1970-71). Only three franchises that have entered the NHL in the expansion era (since 1967-68) currently have at least four Calder Trophy winners: the Avalanche/Nordiques (6), Flames (5) and Islanders (5).

Stuart Skinner, G, Edmonton Oilers

Skinner, a third-round choice (78th overall) in the 2017 NHL Draft, topped rookie goaltenders in wins (29) and games played (50) while ranking second among qualifying rookies (minimum: 25 GP) in goals-against average (2.75) and save percentage (.914). His 29 victories set an Oilers rookie record, one ahead of **Grant Fuhr's** 28 in 1981-82 (48 GP), and were the most by a rookie on any team since **Matt Murray's** 32 in 2016-17 (49 GP w/ PIT). Ten of Skinner's wins came in March (10-1-1), a single-month Edmonton record for any netminder (rookie or veteran) ahead of the nine previously shared by **Andy Moog** (January 1983: 9-1-2), Fuhr (December 1987: 9-3-1), **Tommy Salo** (March 2003: 9-3-1) and **Mike Smith** (April 2022: 9-0-0). The 24-year-old Skinner, who in February became the second rookie goaltender in Oilers history to play in the All-Star Game (also Fuhr in 1982), is Edmonton's first Calder Trophy finalist since **Connor McDavid** finished third in voting in 2015-16 and is seeking to become the first player in franchise history to take home the award. He also is looking to become first netminder on any team to capture the trophy since **Steve Mason** in 2008-09 (w/ CBJ).

E.J. McGUIRE AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

Description

First awarded in 2014-15, the E.J. McGuire Award of Excellence is presented annually “to the NHL Draft prospect who best exemplifies commitment to excellence through strength of character, competitiveness and athleticism.”

History

After many years of coaching and scouting at various levels of hockey, **E.J. McGuire** joined the NHL’s Central Scouting Bureau in 2002 and assumed day-to-day responsibility for the department in 2005. McGuire spearheaded an operation that provided scouting and evaluation of draft-eligible players to NHL Member Clubs. He led a team of eight full-time and 15 part-time scouts throughout North America. Just as he brought innovation to the coaching profession throughout his career, McGuire was responsible for several advancements in the area of scouting during his nine years at the League, including the development of a new scouting technology system that brought the “art” of scouting to a whole new level. He was instrumental in raising both the effectiveness and profile of the League’s annual scouting combine. McGuire lost his short, but courageous, battle with cancer in April 2011.

FRANK J. SELKE TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1977-78, the Frank J. Selke Trophy is presented annually “to the forward who best excels in the defensive aspects of the game.”

Voting

Members of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submit ballots for the Frank J. Selke Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

The Frank J. Selke Trophy was presented in 1977 by the NHL’s Board of Governors in honor of **Frank J. Selke**, one of the great architects of Montreal and Toronto’s championship teams.

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2022-23 Finalists

Patrice Bergeron, C, Boston Bruins

Bergeron was a standout performer on the record-breaking, 65-win Bruins team that posted the NHL’s lowest team goals-against average (2.12) in nine years. The Boston captain led the NHL in face-off wins (1,043) for the eighth time in his career and posted the top win percentage (61.1%) among the 52 centers that took at least 1,000 draws. He also led all Bruins in the puck possession metric SAT% (59.7), with Boston accounting for 59.7% of all shot attempts 5-on-5 when Bergeron was on the ice. He was on the ice for just 27 even-strength goals-against (78 GP). Bergeron is a Selke Trophy finalist for the 12th straight season, two years longer than the 10 consecutive top-three Hart Trophy finishes by **Wayne Gretzky** (1980 through 1989) as the longest ever for a voted NHL Award. Bergeron’s record five Selke wins (2011-12, 2013-14, 2014-15, 2016-17 and 2021-22) are one more than **Bob Gainey**, who captured the trophy each of the first four years it was awarded (1978-81 w/ MTL).

Nico Hischier, C, New Jersey Devils

Hischier’s contributions helped New Jersey post a 49-point gain over 2021-22 and set franchise records for wins (52) and points (112) in a season. The Devils captain registered a career-best +33 rating and team-leading 64 takeaways as New Jersey lowered its goals-against average from 3.68 in 2021-22, which ranked 29th in the League, to 2.71 in 2022-23 (8th overall). He led all Devils forwards in shorthanded ice time (169:56) on the fourth-ranked penalty-killing unit in the League (82.6%) and set several franchise records in the face-off circle, including total draws (1,654) and wins (891), which both ranked fifth in the NHL. Hischier, selected first overall in the 2017 NHL Draft, is an NHL Awards finalist for the first time. The 24-year-old can become the first No. 1 NHL Draft pick ever to win the Selke. He looks to ascend the winner’s podium three years after compatriot **Roman Josi** of the Nashville Predators (Norris Trophy, 2020) became the first Swiss-born player to win an individual honor at the NHL Awards.

Mitchell Marner, RW, Toronto Maple Leafs

Marner led the NHL in takeaways with 104, becoming one of just seven players to reach the century mark since the statistic was introduced in 1997-98, as the Maple Leafs improved to seventh League-wide in team defense (2.68 goals-against per game). The team had finished 19th overall in 2021-22 at 3.07. Only four NHL forwards received more ice time than Marner, who logged a career-high 1702:06 (21:17 per game). Notable in that ice time was duty on the Maple Leafs’ top penalty-killing unit; he ranked second among Toronto forwards and 13th among all NHL forwards in total shorthanded time (182:59). In the 25 years ice time has been officially tracked, the only players with 99+ points and that amount of total shorthanded time in a season are Marner and **Paul Kariya** (ANA, 1998-99). Marner, a first time NHL Awards finalist, is vying to become the second Maple Leafs player to win the Selke exactly 30 years after franchise legend **Doug Gilmour** (1992-93) became the first.

HART MEMORIAL TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1923-24, the Hart Memorial Trophy is presented annually “to the player adjudged to be the most valuable to his team.”

Voting

Members of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submit ballots for the Hart Memorial Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

The Hart Memorial Trophy was presented by the NHL in 1960 after the original Hart Trophy was retired to the Hockey Hall of Fame. The original Hart Trophy was donated to the League in 1924 by **Dr. David A. Hart**, father of **Cecil Hart**, former manager-coach of the Montreal Canadiens.

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2022-23 Finalists

Connor McDavid, C, Edmonton Oilers

McDavid, who already captured both the [Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy](#) as the NHL’s leading goal scorer and the [Art Ross Trophy](#) as the League’s top point producer, registered career highs in goals (64), assists (89) and points (153) across 82 games to become the fifth different player to outright pace the NHL in all three categories and the first since **Wayne Gretzky** in 1986-87 (62-121—183 in 79 GP w/ EDM). McDavid’s 64 goals were the most by any player since 2007-08 (**Alex Ovechkin**: 65 G in 82 GP w/ WSH), while his 153 points were the highest total since 1995-96 (**Mario Lemieux**: 69-92—161 in 70 GP w/ PIT). He found the scoresheet in 75 of his 82 appearances (91.5%), the highest percentage by any player in a single season (minimum: 50 GP) since Gretzky in 1990-91 (93.6%, 73 of 78 GP w/ LAK), and factored on a League-high 47.1 percent of his team’s total goals (325, excluding shootout-deciding goals). The 26-year-old McDavid also set or matched career highs and ranked among the 2022-23 leaders in power-play assists (1st; 50), power-play points (1st; 71), power-play goals (2nd; 21), game-winning goals (t-2nd; 11), shots on goal (3rd; 352), shorthanded goals (t-3rd; 4) and shorthanded points (t-3rd; 7). A Hart Trophy finalist for the fifth time and already a two-time winner (2020-21 and 2016-17), McDavid is seeking to become the fifth player to take home the award at least three times within his first eight NHL seasons, after Gretzky (8x), **Bobby Clarke** (3x), **Bobby Orr** (3x) and Ovechkin (3x).

David Pastrnak, RW, Boston Bruins

Pastrnak placed second in the League with 61 goals and third with 113 points across 82 contests (61-52—113) to propel Boston to NHL records for [wins](#) (65) and [standings points](#) (135) in a season. He became the second player in franchise history – and first in nearly 50 years – to register a 60-goal campaign, joining **Phil Esposito** (4x, most recently 1974-75: 61 G in 79 GP), and posted the highest point total by a Bruins player since 1992-93 (**Adam Oates**: 45-97—142 in 84 GP). Pastrnak led the NHL by scoring 20.3 percent of Boston’s 301 total goals (excluding shootout-deciding goals), the second time he has accounted for at least 20 percent of the Bruins’ total tallies (following his Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy-winning season of 2019-20: 21.1%). He also finished among the top 2022-23 performers in game-winning goals (1st; 13), shots on goal (1st; 407), hat tricks (t-2nd; 3), power-play goals (t-6th; 18), power-play points (t-8th; 37) and plus/minus (t-9th; +34). The 27-year-old Pastrnak, a first-time NHL Awards finalist, is Boston’s first Hart Trophy finalist since 1989-90, when **Ray Bourque** placed second in voting, and is seeking to become the first Bruin to win the award since 1973-74 (Esposito). The Havirov native also is vying to become the third different Czechia-born player in NHL history to take home the Hart Trophy, after **Dominik Hasek** (2x; Pardubice) and **Jaromir Jagr** (Kladno) combined to win it for three straight seasons from 1996-97 through 1998-99.

Matthew Tkachuk, LW, Florida Panthers

Tkachuk, acquired in a July trade, ranked seventh in the NHL with 40-69—109 in 79 outings to lead the Panthers – who were as many as nine points outside of a postseason spot through games of Dec. 28 (15-16-4) – to their fourth straight playoff berth, a first in franchise history. Sixty-nine of Tkachuk's 109 points came in his 47 appearances after Dec. 28 (25-44—69), [the fourth-highest total in the League over that span](#), as Florida closed the regular season on a 27-16-4 run to claim the final Wild Card spot in the Eastern Conference. Tkachuk, who added MVP honors in front of his hometown fans at the 2023 Honda NHL All-Star Game, became the fourth player in NHL history to record consecutive 100-point campaigns after changing teams during the offseason – a feat last achieved by **Jimmy Carson** (w/ EDM) and **Wayne Gretzky** (w/ LAK) in 1988-89. The 25-year-old Tkachuk, also a first-time NHL Awards finalist, is the third Hart Trophy finalist in Panthers history, after **Pavel Bure** and **John Vanbiesbrouck** placed third in voting in 1999-00 and 1993-94, respectively. The Scottsdale, Ariz., native is looking to become the second straight and third overall U.S.-born and trained player to capture the award, following **Auston Matthews** (San Ramon, Calif.) in 2021-22 and **Patrick Kane** (Buffalo, N.Y.) in 2015-16. Tkachuk also is seeking to become the sixth player in NHL history to win the Hart Trophy in his first season with a new franchise and the first since **Joe Thornton** in 2005-06 (w/ SJS).

JACK ADAMS AWARD

Description

First awarded in 1973-74, the Jack Adams Award is presented annually “to the coach adjudged to have contributed the most to his team’s success.”

Voting

Members of the NHL Broadcasters’ Association submit ballots for the Jack Adams Award at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

The Jack Adams Award was presented by the NHL Broadcasters’ Association in 1974 in honor of the late **Jack Adams**, longtime coach and general manager of the Detroit Red Wings.

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2022-23 Finalists

Dave Hakstol, Seattle Kraken

Hakstol guided Seattle (46-28-8, 100 points) to the team’s first-ever berth in the Stanley Cup Playoffs in just its second season, with the Kraken joining the Vegas Golden Knights and Atlanta Flames (now Calgary Flames) as the only franchises since 1968-69 to start from scratch and reach the postseason within their first two NHL campaigns. Their 19-win and 40-point improvements from their inaugural NHL season to the second were the largest in League history. After ranking 29th in offense in their debut season with 216 goals (shootout-deciding goals included), the Kraken rose to sixth in 2022-23 with 289, a 34% increase. Seattle allowed the NHL’s fourth-fewest shots on goal per game last season (28.9) and were even stingier in Year 2, ranking second League-wide at 27.0. Hakstol is the second Kraken representative voted a 2022-23 NHL Awards finalist, following forward **Matty Beniers** (Calder Trophy).

Jim Montgomery, Boston Bruins

In his first season behind the bench for the Bruins (65-12-5, 135 points), Montgomery oversaw a Presidents’ Trophy-winning campaign that rewrote the NHL record book. Perched atop the Atlantic Division from start to finish – just the fourth team in the NHL’s modern era (since 1943-44) to lead wire-to-wire – the Bruins set NHL records for most wins (65) and points (135), including a League-record 14-game home winning streak from the start of a season (Oct. 15 to Dec. 3) and the unprecedented feat of five winning streaks of 7+ games in a season. Boston had a +128 goal differential (including shootout-deciding goals), the highest by any team since 1995-96 (Detroit, +144). Montgomery is a Jack Adams finalist for the first time and is vying to become the fifth Bruins bench boss to capture the award, joining **Don Cherry** (1975-76), **Pat Burns** (1997-98), **Claude Julien** (2008-09) and **Bruce Cassidy** (2019-20).

Lindy Ruff, New Jersey Devils

Ruff led the Devils (52-22-8, 112 points) to franchise records for wins and points en route to third place in the NHL overall standings, the team’s highest placement since finishing third overall in 2000-01. They posted a 49-point improvement over 2021-22, the largest year-over-year gain since the League implemented an 82-game schedule in 1995-96. The team tallied 291 goals (including goals for shootout wins), its highest total since 2000-01 (295), and its average of 34.4 shots on goal per game was the highest in franchise history. Ruff, who completed his 22nd NHL regular season fifth on the all-time coaching list for games (1,713) and wins (834), is a Jack Adams finalist for the fourth time representing his third NHL team. He captured the award with the Buffalo Sabres in 2005-06, finished second in voting with the Sabres in 2006-07 and third with the Dallas Stars in 2015-16. He aims to become the second winner in Devils franchise history, following **Jacques Lemaire** in 1993-94.

JAMES NORRIS MEMORIAL TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1953-54, the James Norris Memorial Trophy is presented annually “to the defense player who demonstrates throughout the season the greatest all-round ability in the position.”

Voting

Members of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submit ballots for the James Norris Memorial Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

The James Norris Memorial Trophy was presented in 1953 by the four children of the late **James Norris** in memory of the former owner-president of the Detroit Red Wings.

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2022-23 Finalists

Adam Fox, New York Rangers

Fox finished eighth among defensemen with 12-60—72 in 82 games to guide New York to 107 standings points, the seventh-most in the team's 96-year history. He became the second Rangers blueliner to register consecutive 70-point seasons, following **Brian Leetch** (2x, most recently 1995-96 and 1996-97), as well as the second-fastest defenseman in franchise history, behind Leetch (211 GP), to accumulate 200 career points (241 GP on Jan. 1 at FLA). The 25-year-old Fox also placed among the leading 2022-23 blueliners in takeaways (t-1st; 88), power-play assists (4th; 28), assists (t-4th; 60), game-winning goals (t-4th; 5), power-play points (7th; 29), total time on ice (7th; 1,998:58), plus/minus (t-11th; +28), average time on ice (13th; 24:23), shooting percentage (15th; 7.5%) and goals (t-17th; 12). Fox, who in 2020-21 became the second defenseman in League history – after **Bobby Orr** (1967-68 w/ BOS) – to win the Norris Trophy [within his first two NHL campaigns](#), is seeking to again follow Orr (3x) as the second player to capture the award multiple times within his first four seasons.

Erik Karlsson, San Jose Sharks

Karlsson, the sixth different defenseman in NHL history and first since **Brian Leetch** in 1991-92 (w/ NYR) to record [a 100-point season](#), topped blueliners with 25-76—101 across 82 games. He became the eighth different player in the League's expansion era (since 1967-68) to outright lead defensemen in goals, assists and points within a single campaign, a feat last achieved by **Mike Green** in 2009-10 (w/ WSH). Karlsson also set an NHL record for blueliners by factoring on 43.35 percent of San Jose's total goals (101 of 233, excluding shootout-deciding goals), eclipsing **Bobby Orr** in 1969-70 (43.32% w/ BOS). The 33-year-old Karlsson, who previously won the Norris Trophy twice with the Ottawa Senators (2011-12 and 2014-15), is vying to become the fourth defenseman to take home the award with multiple teams, following **Chris Chelios** (CHI and MTL), **Paul Coffey** (DET and EDM) and **Doug Harvey** (MTL and NYR). He also is looking to become the second player to go eight-plus years between Norris Trophy wins, a feat previously achieved by Coffey (9 years, 1985-86 w/ EDM and 1994-95 w/ DET).

Cale Makar, Colorado Avalanche

Makar, the reigning Norris Trophy winner, ranked second among defensemen with an average of 1.10 points per game, totaling 17-49—66 in 60 appearances. He became the first player in Avalanche history to pace the League in average time on ice (26:23), also finishing among the top blueliners in game-winning goals (t-2nd; 6), overtime goals (t-2nd; 2), goals (6th; 17), power-play points (6th; 30), power-play goals (t-6th; 5), points (9th; 66), assists (11th; 49) and takeaways (t-15th; 50). Makar became the quickest defenseman in NHL history to reach [the 200-point milestone](#), doing so in his 195th contest (Nov. 21 at DAL), and ended the season with 65-181—246 overall – the most points by any blueliner through his first 238 career games. The 24-year-old Makar, who like Fox is seeking his second Norris Trophy in his fourth NHL season, is a finalist for the third straight year after placing second in voting in 2020-21. Only three other players in League history have been a Norris Trophy finalist at least three times in their first four campaigns: **Bobby Orr** (4x), **Brad Park** (3x) and **Denis Potvin** (3x).

JIM GREGORY GENERAL MANAGER OF THE YEAR AWARD

Voting

NHL general managers and a panel of League executives, print and broadcast media vote for the Jim Gregory General Manager of the Year Award at the conclusion of the Second Round of the Stanley Cup Playoffs, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

The NHL General Manager of the Year Award first was presented in 2009-10. It was renamed in 2019-20 in honor of **Jim Gregory**, the 2007 Hockey Hall of Fame inductee who served as Toronto Maple Leafs general manager and a League executive for four decades.

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2022-23 Finalists

The winner of the Jim Gregory General Manager of the Year Award will be revealed on Wednesday, June 28, during the first round of the 2023 Upper Deck NHL Draft in Nashville (7 p.m. ET, ESPN, SN, TVAS).

Jim Nill, Dallas Stars

Under Nill's direction the Stars (47-21-14) posted 108 points, their highest total since 2015-16, and advanced to the Western Conference Final for the second time in four seasons. Nill's biggest offseason move was signing head coach **Peter DeBoer**, who in May joined **Scotty Bowman** as the second head coach in NHL history to guide four franchises to the Conference Finals/Semifinals (NJD, SJS, VGK and DAL). Nill also inked left wing **Mason Marchment** and defenseman **Colin Miller** during the offseason; extended the contracts of goaltender **Jake Oettinger** and left wing **Jason Robertson**; and traded for right wing **Evgenii Dadonov**, center **Max Domi** and defenseman **Nils Lundkvist**. Several of Nill's Dallas draft picks made key contributions during their run to the Conference Finals, including leading scorer **Roope Hintz** (No. 49 overall in 2015); a trio of franchise-altering picks from 2017: defenseman **Miro Heiskanen** (No. 3), Oettinger (No. 26) and Robertson (No. 39); and Game 7 hero **Wyatt Johnston** (No. 23 in 2021). Nill, who in April marked his 10th anniversary as Stars GM, is a Jim Gregory finalist for the third time after finishing third in voting in both 2015-16 and 2019-20, the latter when the team last advanced to the Stanley Cup Final.

Don Sweeney, Boston Bruins

Sweeney oversaw a Bruins team (65-12-5, 135 points) that rewrote the NHL's record book this season. Under 2022-23 Jack Adams Award finalist **Jim Montgomery**, an offseason Sweeney hire, Boston sat atop the Atlantic Division from start to finish – becoming just the fourth team in the League's modern era (since 1943-44) to lead wire-to-wire. The Bruins set NHL records for single-season wins (65) and points (135), including a League-record 14-game home winning streak from the start of the campaign. Boston also had a +128 goal differential (including shootout-deciding goals), the highest by any team since 1995-96 (DET, +144). The eighth-year Bruins GM bolstered his roster by re-signing center **Patrice Bergeron**, bringing back free agent center **David Krejci** and trading for center **Pavel Zacha** during the offseason. He then acquired right wing **Garnet Hathaway** and defenseman **Dmitry Orlov** (from WSH) as well as left wing **Tyler Bertuzzi** (from DET) prior to the 2023 NHL Trade Deadline and signed right wing **David Pastrnak** (who had 61 goals and 113 points in 2022-23) to an eight-year extension. A previous winner in 2018-19, Sweeney is vying to join **Lou Lamoriello** (2019-20 and 2020-21) as the second GM to capture the Jim Gregory multiple times since it first was awarded in 2009-10.

Bill Zito, Florida Panthers

The Panthers (42-32-8, 92 points) advanced to the Stanley Cup Final for the first time since 1995-96, continuing the upward trajectory that has defined Zito's three years in South Florida. Building on the success of the 2021-22 team, which captured the Presidents' Trophy behind a franchise-record 58 wins and 122 points, Zito began a pivotal offseason by signing head coach **Paul Maurice**, who completed 2022-23 sixth on the NHL's all-time coaching wins list (817) in 25 total seasons behind the bench. Exactly a month later Zito made a blockbuster trade to acquire and extend left wing **Matthew Tkachuk**, who went on to rank seventh in the NHL with 40-69—109 during the regular season, capture MVP honors in front his hometown fans at the 2023 Honda NHL All-Star Game, be voted a finalist for the Hart Memorial Trophy and serve as a catalyst during the team's run to the Stanley Cup Final. Zito made several other significant offseason moves, including signing free agents **Nick Cousins**, **Alex Lyon**, **Eric Staal**, **Marc Staal** and **Colin White**. A Jim Gregory finalist for the second time in his first three years (a feat achieved by only one other GM: **Marc Bergevin**), Zito is seeking his first win after finishing third in voting following his first season at the helm of the team (2020-21).

KING CLANCY MEMORIAL TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1987-88, the King Clancy Memorial Trophy is presented annually “to the player who best exemplifies leadership qualities on and off the ice and has made a noteworthy humanitarian contribution in his community.”

Voting

Each NHL team submits a nominee for the King Clancy Memorial Trophy. The three finalists and ultimate winner are selected by a committee of senior NHL executives led by Commissioner **Gary Bettman** and Deputy Commissioner **Bill Daly**.

The selection committee applies the following criteria in determining the finalists and winner of the award:

- * Clear and measurable positive impact on the community
- * Investment of time and resources
- * Commitment to a particular cause or community
- * Commitment to the League’s community initiatives
- * Creativity of programming
- * Use of influence; engagement of others

History

The King Clancy Memorial Trophy was presented in 1988 by the NHL’s Board of Governors in honor of **Frank “King” Clancy**, a beloved figure in the League for decades as a player, referee, coach, manager and goodwill ambassador. A three-time Stanley Cup champion and 1958 inductee to the Hockey Hall of Fame, Clancy was voted as one of the 100 Greatest NHL Players during the League’s Centennial Celebration in 2017.

Charitable Donations

The King Clancy Memorial Trophy winner receives a \$25,000 donation from the National Hockey League Foundation to benefit a charity or charities of his choice. The two runners-up each receive a \$5,000 donation from the National Hockey League Foundation to benefit a charity or charities of their choice.

Backlund, who was drafted by the Flames in 2007 and has spent his entire NHL career in Calgary, has used his platform as a professional athlete to bring attention to many worthy causes. He supports the [ALS Society of Alberta](#) in honor of his mother-in-law, who succumbed to the disease when his wife, **Frida**, was just 19 years old. It also is of importance for Backlund as Flames Assistant General Manager **Chris Snow** has been battling ALS for the last four years. Backlund and his spouse have raised more than \$400,000 for the nonprofit and have welcomed nearly 100 families affected by ALS to home games. As an ambassador for both [Kids Cancer Care](#) and [Special Olympics Calgary](#), Backlund – who had a childhood friend diagnosed with cancer and another who was born with Down syndrome – has invited an additional 500 guests to attend Flames games and meet with him afterward. Most recently, Backlund and his wife partnered with Parachutes for Pets to create [Lily’s Legacy](#), named after their dog who passed away in 2021. This first-of-its-kind program allows children in foster care to keep their pets while they are transitioning into care. “I’ve always been inspired by people who help others that struggle,” Backlund explained. “I am aware that I have been given the opportunity to live a privileged life and know that a small gesture from me can mean the world to other people.”

Anders Lee, LW, New York Islanders

Lee, who has served as the Islanders' captain since 2018, is a fixture in the local community and at team fundraising events. He became a "Jambassador" for [Jam Kancer in the Kan](#), a foundation that helps individuals and families battling cancer, after watching a speech by and later befriending 15-year-old cancer patient **Fenov Pierre-Louis** in 2016. Inspired by Pierre-Louis' words, Lee hosted his first "Kancer Jam" event – which raises money while playing the game Kan Jam – less than a year later. Prior to Lee's involvement, the nonprofit had generated a total of \$130,000 in its first two years of existence. The fundraising total now stands at more than \$2 million, with support from various NHL players. Pierre-Louis passed away from the disease in 2018, but Lee continues his friend's legacy both through "Kancer Jams" and by funding academic scholarships in his honor. "His friendship is something I'll never forget and I'll cherish every day that we had," Lee said. "Now we get to honor him as we continue to do this foundation event and do our best to not only help kids with cancer, but their families [too] and try to find a cure for this disease." Lee since has expanded his efforts by inviting families affected by cancer to Islanders games and assisting those struggling financially during the holiday season.

Darnell Nurse, D, Edmonton Oilers

Nurse, a finalist for the second straight season, has been active in several community initiatives focused on diversity and inclusion through the power of sports. As an ambassador for [Free Play for Kids](#), he helps provide marginalized children – many of whom are refugees, new Canadians or Indigenous youth – with the opportunity to play sports in a safe, accessible and inclusive environment. Nurse also serves as an ambassador for [Right To Play](#), which aims to protect, educate and empower children to rise above adversity through sports. "As a professional athlete, a Canadian, a father and the son of an immigrant, I truly believe that it is up to me to use my position and platform to help others like me," Nurse shared. "Like standing up for my teammates on the ice, I am here for the kids who need me – that's what is important to me and that will never change." Nurse expanded his humanitarianism by creating the [Darnell Nurse Excellence Scholarship](#) in 2021, teaming up with his alma mater in Hamilton, Ont., to award two scholarships each year to deserving students pursuing post-secondary aspirations. He also has been a prominent youth mentor, sponsored players in the Greater Toronto Hockey League (GTHL), and supported food banks and various healthcare initiatives during the pandemic.

LADY BYNG MEMORIAL TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1924-25, the Lady Byng Memorial Trophy is presented annually “to the player adjudged to have exhibited the best type of sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct combined with a high standard of playing ability.”

Voting

Members of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submit ballots for the Lady Byng Memorial Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

Lady Byng, wife of Canada’s Governor General at the time, presented the Lady Byng Trophy during the 1924-25 season. After **Frank Boucher** of the New York Rangers won the award seven times in eight seasons, he was given the trophy to keep and Lady Byng donated another trophy in 1936. After Lady Byng’s death in 1949, the NHL presented a new trophy, changing the name to the Lady Byng Memorial Trophy.

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2022-23 Finalists

Jack Hughes, C, New Jersey Devils

Hughes ranked 12th in the NHL with 43-56—99 – a franchise record and 43-point increase over his previous career high (26-30—56 in 2021-22) – to propel the Devils to a 49-point improvement in the standings, the largest year-over-year gain since the League implemented an 82-game schedule in 1995-96. The No. 1 overall pick from the 2019 NHL Draft, who played in 78 contests, also set personal bests and finished among the League leaders in shots on goal (5th; 336), goals (8th; 43) and takeaways (t-27th; 60) while receiving just six penalty minutes, tied for the second-fewest among the NHL’s top 100 scorers. The now 22-year-old Hughes is the second player in franchise history voted a finalist for the Lady Byng Trophy, following **Zach Parise** (3rd in 2008-09), and is seeking to become the third player in League history to capture the award at age 21 or younger (*age as of final day of regular season*; after **Wayne Gretzky** and **Paul Kariya**).

Anze Kopitar, C, Los Angeles Kings

Kopitar topped the Kings with 28-46—74 to guide the team to a 47-win and 104-point campaign, its second-best in both categories after 2015-16 (48) and 1974-75 (105), respectively. The Los Angeles captain led his team in scoring for a fifth straight season and 15th time overall, the third-most in League history behind **Wayne Gretzky** (19x w/ EDM, LAK and NYR) and **Gordie Howe** (17x w/ DET). Kopitar, who ranked 10th among NHL forwards in total time on ice (1,664:47) while playing in all 82 games, was assessed just four penalty minutes – the fewest among the League’s top 100 scorers. He also placed fourth in the NHL in face-off wins (899) and 13th in face-off winning percentage (55.9%), the latter the third-highest rate of his 17-season career. The 35-year-old Kopitar, a third-time finalist, is vying to capture his second Lady Byng Trophy after winning the award in 2015-16 and finishing third in voting in 2014-15.

Brayden Point, C, Tampa Bay Lightning

Point registered the most productive offensive season of his seven-year career, ranking among the League leaders in shooting percentage (2nd; 21.7%), power-play goals (t-3rd; 20), goals (5th; 51), game-winning goals (t-5th; 9), even-strength goals (t-7th; 31), even-strength points (t-11th; 65) and points (14th; 95). He became the third player in Lightning history to record a 50-goal campaign, following **Steven Stamkos** (2x, 2011-12 and 2009-10) and **Vincent Lecavalier** (2006-07). Point, who also played in all 82 games, did so while receiving just two penalties for a total of seven penalty minutes – the fewest of his career. The 27-year-old Point, a first-time finalist for any NHL Award, is seeking to become the third Tampa Bay player to win the Lady Byng Trophy, after **Martin St. Louis** (3x, most recently in 2012-13) and **Brad Richards** (2003-04).

MARK MESSIER NHL LEADERSHIP AWARD

Description

History

Presented in honor of one of hockey’s great leaders, the Mark Messier NHL Leadership Award was first handed out in 2006-07.

MAURICE “ROCKET” RICHARD TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1998-99, the Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy is presented annually “to the player finishing the regular season as the League’s goal-scoring leader.”

History

A gift to the NHL from the Montreal Canadiens in 1999, the Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy honors one of the game’s greatest stars. During his 18-year career with the Canadiens from 1942-43 through 1959-60, Richard was the first player in NHL history to score 50 goals in a season and 500 in his career. He played on eight Stanley Cup champion teams and led the League in goals five times.

2022-23 Winner

Edmonton Oilers center **Connor McDavid** (64-89—153 in 82 GP) scored 64 goals, three clear of his nearest competition (**David Pastrnak**: 61 G in 82 GP w/ BOS) and the most by any player since 2007-08 (**Alex Ovechkin**: 65 G in 82 GP w/ WSH), to claim his first career Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy. McDavid became the first player in Oilers history to capture the award and the third Edmonton player to top the League in goals, after **Wayne Gretzky** (5x, most recently in 1986-87) and **Jari Kurri** (1985-86). McDavid’s goal-scoring prowess included a career-high seven-game goal streak from Nov. 28 – Dec. 9 (9 G) as well as a five-game multi-goal streak from Feb. 21 – March 1 (10 G), the fifth such instance in NHL history and first since 1992-93 (**Alexander Mogilny**: 5 GP w/ BUF). McDavid reached the 50-goal milestone in his 61st contest (Feb. 27 vs. BOS), the fastest by any player since 1995-96, and the 60-goal mark in his 72nd outing (March 22 vs. ARI), also the fastest by any player since 1995-96.

PRESIDENTS' TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1985-86, the Presidents' Trophy is presented annually "to the team finishing the regular season with the best overall record."

History

The NHL's Board of Governors presented the Presidents' Trophy in 1985-86 to recognize the team with the top regular-season record.

2022-23 Winner

The Boston Bruins (65-12-5, 135 points) set NHL records for wins and points in a season to claim their fourth Presidents' Trophy (first awarded in 1985-86) and finish atop the League standings for the 15th time in franchise history. Boston earned its 63rd victory on April 9 at PHI to surpass the 1995-96 Detroit Red Wings and 2018-19 Tampa Bay Lightning (both w/ 62) for the most in NHL history. The Bruins then secured their 133rd point on April 11 vs. WSH to leapfrog the 1976-77 Montreal Canadiens (132) for the most in League history. Boston became the fourth team in the NHL's modern era (since 1943-44) to sit atop its division standings for the entire season, following the 1977-78 Canadiens (Norris), 1984-85 Edmonton Oilers (Smythe) and 2008-09 San Jose Sharks (Pacific). Their historic campaign was sparked by a 14-game season-opening winning streak at TD Garden, the longest such run in League history. The Bruins also became the first team in NHL history to post at least three road winning streaks of seven or more games in a season.

TED LINDSAY AWARD

Description

First awarded in 1970-71 (as the Lester B. Pearson Award), the Ted Lindsay Award is presented annually “to the most outstanding player as voted by fellow members of the NHLPA.”

History

The Ted Lindsay Award is the only NHL Trophy voted on by the players themselves, carrying on the tradition established by the Lester B. Pearson Award in 1970-71. Reintroduced in 2009-10, the Ted Lindsay Award honors its namesake, a Hockey Hall of Famer known for his skill, tenacity, leadership and role in establishing the NHLPA.

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2022-23 Finalists

Erik Karlsson, D, San Jose Sharks

Karlsson played in all 82 games for the San Jose Sharks during the 2022-23 regular season. The native of Landsbro, Sweden, led all defencemen with 25 goals and 76 assists for 101 points to become the first Swedish-born defenseman – and only the sixth different defenseman in NHL history – to reach the 100-point mark. He set a career high in goals, assists and points, which placed him 11th in League scoring. Karlsson’s 76 assists were good for a share of third among all skaters and matched the points output of the next highest-scoring defenseman. He also led all defensemen in even-strength points (74) and even-strength goals (20). Karlsson skated in the second-most total minutes of ice time (2,100:26) among all NHL skaters and he averaged the fifth-highest time on ice per game played (25:37). This is the second-consecutive season that a defenseman has been voted a finalist for the TLA, following **Roman Josi** last season. Karlsson is looking to become only the second defenseman (**Bobby Orr**, 1974-75) to receive the TLA.

Connor McDavid, C, Edmonton Oilers

McDavid played in all 82 regular-season games for the Edmonton Oilers, while he led the Oilers to a second-place finish in the Pacific Division. The 26-year-old forward from Newmarket, Ont., won his fifth Art Ross Trophy by leading the League with 153 points – 30 points more than his career high set last season. McDavid became the sixth different player in NHL history to score 150 points in a single season. He scored 64 goals to win his first Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy and paced all skaters with 89 assists – setting new career highs. McDavid led the League in power-play points (71) and time on ice per game played among forwards (22:23), tied for first in primary assists (60), and he placed third in shots (352), even-strength goals (39) and even-strength points (75). A three-time TLA recipient (2016-17, 2017-18, 2020-21) and six-time finalist (also 2018-19, 2021-22), McDavid is seeking his fourth TLA to join only two other players to achieve the feat – **Wayne Gretzky** (five-time recipient) and **Mario Lemieux** (four-time recipient).

David Pastrnak, RW, Boston Bruins

Pastrnak played in all 82 games for the Boston Bruins and helped the team set a new NHL record with 65 regular-season wins and 135 points. The native of Havírov, Czechia, scored 61 goals, 52 assists and 113 points to set new career-high totals. Pastrnak is only the second different Czech-born player (**Jaromir Jagr**, 1995-96) in NHL history to score 60 goals, and he also became the first Bruins player to reach the mark in 48 years (**Phil Esposito**, 1974-75). He tied for third in League scoring and placed second in goals for the season. He led all skaters in shots (407), game-winning goals (13), and he tied for first in overtime goals (4) – all new career highs. Pastrnak also led all skaters in even-strength goals (43), and he finished second in even-strength points (76). As a first-time TLA finalist and the first Bruins finalist in 20 years (**Joe Thornton**, 2002-03), Pastrnak is looking to become only the third different Bruins player (Esposito, 1970-71, 1973-74; **Bobby Orr**, 1974-75) to receive the award.

VEZINA TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1926-27, the Vezina Trophy is presented annually “to the goaltender adjudged to be the best at his position.” Before the 1981-82 season, the goaltender(s) of the team allowing the fewest number of goals during the regular season – the current criteria for the William M. Jennings Trophy – won the Vezina Trophy.

Voting

The general managers of the NHL’s 31 teams submit ballots for the Vezina Trophy at the conclusion of the regular season, with the top three vote-getters designated as finalists.

History

Leo Dandurand, **Louis Letourneau** and **Joe Cattarinich**, former owners of the Montreal Canadiens, presented the trophy to the NHL in 1926-27 in memory of **Georges Vezina**, the outstanding Canadiens goaltender who collapsed during a game on Nov. 28, 1925, and died of tuberculosis a few months later.

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2022-23 Finalists

Connor Hellebuyck, Winnipeg Jets

Hellebuyck (37-25-2, 2.49 goals-against average, .920 save percentage, four shutouts) backstopped the Jets to a berth in the Stanley Cup Playoffs for the fifth time in the past six years on the strength of his League-leading starts (64) and percentage of team wins (37 of 46, 80.4%). He recorded a save percentage over .900 in 43 starts, the highest such figure among all NHL goaltenders. He played both ends of a League-high (tie) five back-to-backs, all coming in the final half of the season, with a .930 save percentage in the second half of those sets. He ranked second in the NHL in total saves (1,807) and third in shots faced (1,964), with both figures tops among goaltenders on playoff teams. In his 10 games facing 40-or-more shots, he posted an 8-1-1 record and .950 save percentage, allowing two goals or fewer seven times. Hellebuyck is a Vezina Trophy finalist for the third time. He finished second in voting to Nashville’s **Pekka Rinne** in 2017-18 and became the franchise’s first-ever recipient in 2019-20.

Ilya Sorokin, New York Islanders

Sorokin (31-22-7, 2.34 goals-against average, .924 save percentage) posted a League-leading six shutouts in his career-high 62 appearances, helping the Islanders capture the first Wild Card playoff spot in the Eastern Conference. He allowed one goal or fewer in 21 of his 60 starts. The third-year Islander ranked near the top of the League in several categories (minimum: 25 GP), including games (tie-third), save percentage (third), goals-against average (sixth), saves (sixth, 1,699) and wins (ninth). Sorokin is the first Islanders goaltender to record 30 wins in a season since **Jaroslav Halak** (38) in 2014-15 and one of five Islanders to achieve the feat in franchise history, joining Halak, **Chris Osgood** (2001-02), **Rick DiPietro** (2005-06, 2006-07) and **Billy Smith** (1981-82). Sorokin is a first-time Vezina Trophy finalist and is vying to join Smith (1981-82) as the second player in Islanders history to capture the honor.

Linus Ullmark, Boston Bruins

Ullmark (40-6-1 in 49 GP) and teammate **Jeremy Swayman** won the William M. Jennings Trophy as the goaltenders on the team allowing the fewest regular-season goals (177), backstopping the Bruins to their historic 65-win, 135-point campaign. Ullmark led the NHL in wins (tie-40), goals-against average (1.89) and save percentage (.938), becoming the eighth goaltender in League history to lead the NHL in all three categories and the first since Montreal’s **Carey Price** in 2014-15. Ullmark became the fastest goaltender in NHL history to reach 40 wins, doing so in his 49th and final game of the season; tied a Bruins record for wins in a season (**Pete Peeters**: 63 GP in 1982-83); and allowed two or fewer goals in 36 of his 49 appearances (73.5%). Ullmark, a first-time NHL Awards finalist, is vying to become the fourth Bruins goaltender to win the Vezina under the current selection criteria (since 1981-82), joining Peeters (1982-83), **Tim Thomas** (2008-09, 2010-11) and **Tuukka Rask** (2013-14).

WILLIAM M. JENNINGS TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1981-82, the William M. Jennings Trophy is presented annually “to the goaltender(s) having played a minimum of 25 games for the team(s) with the fewest goals scored against it during the regular season.”

History

The William M. Jennings Trophy was presented in 1981-82 by the NHL’s Board of Governors in honor of the late **William M. Jennings**, longtime governor and president of the New York Rangers and one of the great builders of hockey in the United States.

Until the 1980-81 season, the Vezina Trophy was awarded to the goaltender(s) of the team(s) allowing the fewest number of goals during the regular season.

2022-23 Winners

The Boston Bruins tandem of **Linus Ullmark** (40-6-1, 1.89 GAA, .938 SV%, 2 SO in 49 GP) and **Jeremy Swayman** (24-6-4, 2.27 GAA, .920 SV%, 4 SO in 37 GP) combined to win the 2022-23 William M. Jennings Trophy. Boston yielded a League-low 177 goals (including shootout-deciding goals) to finish ahead of its nearest competition, the Carolina Hurricanes (213), by 36 goals – the largest gap between the top two teams in goals against since 1990-91, when the Chicago Blackhawks (211) allowed 38 fewer goals than the Montreal Canadiens (249). Ullmark (40) and Swayman (24) collected 64 of the Bruins’ record-setting 65 victories to help the team earn its fourth Jennings Trophy, adding to wins in 2019-20 (**Tuukka Rask** and **Jaroslav Halak**), 2008-09 (**Tim Thomas** and **Manny Fernandez**) and 1989-90 (**Andy Moog** and **Rejean Lemelin**). Boston became the fourth team to claim the Jennings Trophy at least four times, joining the Canadiens (6x), Blackhawks (5x) and New Jersey Devils (5x). The Bruins also became the first team in NHL history to feature both a 40-win and a 20-win goaltender in a single season.

WILLIE O'REE COMMUNITY HERO AWARD PRESENTED BY MASSMUTUAL

Description

First awarded in 2017-18, the Willie O'Ree Community Hero Award is presented annually "to an individual who – through the game of hockey – has positively impacted his or her community, culture or society." New for 2022-23, there will be two winners: one in the U.S. and one in Canada, with the Willie O'Ree Community Hero Award in Canada presented by Hyundai.

Voting

Fans submit candidates for the Willie O'Ree Community Hero Award, with **Willie O'Ree** – in consultation with the NHL – narrowing the field to three finalists. The finalists, and ultimate winner, are determined by fan vote and weighted votes from Willie O'Ree, the NHL and MassMutual.

History

The Willie O'Ree Community Hero Award honors former NHL forward **Willie O'Ree**, who on Jan. 18, 1958, became the first black player to compete in the League. O'Ree, who lost sight in his right eye at a young age, went on to play professional hockey for 21 years. His perseverance is unrivaled, and his impact on the game and the lives of young players still is felt today. For more than two decades, O'Ree has served as the NHL's Diversity Ambassador, traveling across North America to schools and hockey programs to share his story and experiences as well as to promote messages of inclusion, dedication and confidence. O'Ree has used hockey as a platform to build character and teach life skills, and has used his influence to foster positive values through the sport.

2022-23 Winner (Canada)

Dean Smith of Halifax, N.S., won the 2022-23 Willie O'Ree Community Hero Award presented by Hyundai. Smith is a Halifax lawyer with a passion for sharing his love for hockey by creating safe and welcoming spaces for everyone to enjoy the game. He served as Chair of Hockey Nova Scotia's Diversity and Inclusion Task Force, and now sits on the Board of Directors as their Chair of Diversity and Inclusion. Smith also serves as Secretary to the Black Ice Hockey and Sports Hall of Fame Society, a not-for-profit highlighting and celebrating Black achievement in sport. He has dedicated himself to creating systemic change in hockey and is the driving force behind Hockey Nova Scotia's Halifax-based Black Youth Ice Hockey Program, which strives to increase diversity in the game by introducing the sport to more than 30 young Black Nova Scotians each season with several graduates of the program advancing to elite levels of the sport in the province. Smith also helped lead Hockey Nova Scotia's #StrongerTogether campaign with Recreation Facilities Association of Nova Scotia by partnering with arenas across the province and was an integral part of the organizing committee that launched the Halifax Hockey Summit.

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2022-23 Finalists (U.S.)

Jason McCrimmon (Detroit, Mich.)

McCrimmon is the President and Founder of Detroit Ice Dreams Youth Hockey Association, a nonprofit youth hockey organization that minimizes the barriers that prevent underrepresented communities from access to ice hockey. In addition to on-ice programming, McCrimmon gives back through turkey giveaways, care packages for the homeless, adopt a family for Christmas, and provides backpacks filled with school supplies to children in need. McCrimmon is also the Associate Head Coach, GM, and Owner of the USPHL's Motor City Gamblers Junior A team. Motor City has sent numerous players to the collegiate level to further their career on and off the ice. As a retired player, Jason has played and excelled at every level, including amateur, collegiate, professional, and as a coach (2014 MWJHL coach of the year). He is also part of the NHLCA BIPOC Coaches Program as the Detroit Red Wings Youth Ambassador. Watch a video about McCrimmon's community impact [here](#).

Karen Ota-O'Brien (Coconut Creek, Fla.)

Ota-O'Brien is founder of the South Florida Women's Hockey Program, the Lucky Pucks Hockey Club and co-founder and current President of the Florida Women's Hockey League (FWHL). The FWHL is made up of women's ice hockey organizations from across Florida, where players of all skill levels come together to play the sport. After starting the Lucky Pucks Hockey Club with one team comprised of 12 women, Karen helped grow the FWHL to 14 teams with over 350 participants from across the state. The Lucky Pucks Club alone makes up 4 teams with over 80 participants in the FWHL. Another contributor to South Florida's female growth in hockey has been the Girls Night Out League that Ota-O'Brien created – weekly skates open to girls and women of all levels to play ice hockey. Karen has worked faithfully for almost three decades to establish women's hockey in Florida, creating a community where women of all ages and backgrounds feel safe, included and empowered on and off the ice. Marty Richardson (Littleton, Colo.)

Richardson is founder of Dawg Nation Hockey Foundation, a Colorado non-profit dedicated to giving back to hockey families across the U.S. and Canada who have been impacted by hardship. Funds for families are raised through hockey tournaments, golf outings, and crowdsourcing organized by Dawg Nation. Richardson, known as "the Dawg Father" or "Cappy" to his community, has helped a wide variety of people facing hardships – cancer patients, burn victims, people who've lost limbs, people with traumatic brain injuries, people who have lost cognitive function, survivors of car crashes, and others. In 2022, the foundation donated \$900,000 (USD) to hockey families going through tough times, and since 2011, the foundation has given more than \$4 million to hockey players and families in need. The premier event for Dawg Nation is the Dawg Bowl – a hockey tournament that they have hosted every year since being founded. Within this event there's also a "Survivor Game" which brings together people from all walks of life who have gone through or are going through life-threatening ailments and life-changing circumstances. CLARENCE S. CAMPBELL BOWL

Description

First awarded in 1967-68, the Clarence S. Campbell Bowl is presented annually “to the Western Conference team that advances to the Stanley Cup Final.” In 2020-21, it was given to the winner of the Montreal Canadiens-Vegas Golden Knights Stanley Cup Semifinals series.

History

The Clarence S. Campbell Bowl was presented by the NHL’s Member Clubs in 1968 for perpetual competition by the League in recognition of the services of **Clarence S. Campbell**, NHL President from 1946-77. From 1967-68 through 1973-74, the trophy was awarded to the regular-season champion of the West Division. Beginning in 1974-75, it was presented to the regular-season winner of the conference bearing the name of the trophy. From 1981-82 to 1992-93, the trophy was given to the playoff champion in the Campbell Conference. Since 1993-94, the trophy has been awarded to the playoff champion in the Western Conference. The trophy itself is a hallmark piece made of sterling silver that was crafted by a British silversmith in 1878.

2022-23 Winner

The Vegas Golden Knights won their second Clarence S. Campbell Bowl and advanced to the Stanley Cup Final for the first time since 2017-18, their inaugural season, by defeating the Winnipeg Jets in the First Round (4-1), the Edmonton Oilers in the Second Round (4-2) and the Dallas Stars in the Conference Finals (4-2). They became the eighth franchise in NHL history, and third in the past 90 years, to make at least two Stanley Cup Final appearances within their first six seasons. The only others to achieve that feat during the expansion era (since 1967-68): the Oilers and St. Louis Blues, both with three trips to the Stanley Cup Final in their first six campaigns.

CONN SMYTHE TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1964-65, the Conn Smythe Trophy is presented annually “to the most valuable player for his team in the playoffs.”

Voting

A panel of the Professional Hockey Writers Association submits ballots for the Conn Smythe Trophy at the conclusion of the Stanley Cup Playoffs.

History

The Conn Smythe Trophy was presented by Maple Leaf Gardens Limited in 1964 to honor **Conn Smythe**, the former coach, manager, president and owner-governor of the Toronto Maple Leafs.

2022-23 Winner

Vegas Golden Knights right wing **Jonathan Marchessault** (13-12—25 in 22 GP), who shared the League lead in goals and ranked second in points during the 2023 Stanley Cup Playoffs, captured the Conn Smythe Trophy. Marchessault became the seventh undrafted player – among those to debut since NHL’s first draft in 1963 – to win the award and first since **Wayne Gretzky** in 1988 (w/ EDM). The prior list: Gretzky (2x), **Bobby Orr** (2x), **Bernie Parent** (2x), **Yvan Cournoyer**, **Roger Crozier** and **Serge Savard**. Marchessault, who also led the League with a +17 rating, scored all 13 of his goals over a 13-game span from Game 3 of the Second Round to Game 3 of the Stanley Cup Final – the only player in franchise history to score as many goals in that timeframe either in the regular season or playoffs. He finished the postseason on a 10-game point streak (8-7—15) – the longest in franchise history (regular season or playoffs) – that spanned the last five games of the Conference Finals and all five games of the Stanley Cup Final. Marchessault provided timely offense, scoring 10 goals that either gave Vegas a lead (6) or tied the game (4). He also came up clutch with series on the line, registering 5-3—8 across the Golden Knights’ six potential series-clinching games (including a hat trick and the series-winning goal in Game 6 of R2 at EDM).

PRINCE OF WALES TROPHY

Description

First awarded in 1925-26, the Prince of Wales Trophy is presented annually “to the Eastern Conference team that advances to the Stanley Cup Final.” In 2020-21, it was given to the winner of the Tampa Bay Lightning-New York Islanders Stanley Cup Semifinals series.

History

His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, donated the trophy to the NHL in 1925. It originally was awarded to the winner of the first game played in Madison Square Garden on Dec. 15, 1925 (MTL 3 at NYA 1). It then was awarded to the NHL playoff champion in 1925-26 and 1926-27. From 1927-28 through 1937-38, the award was presented to the regular-season champion of the American Division of the NHL. (The team finishing first in the Canadian Division received the O'Brien Trophy during these years.) From 1938-39, when the NHL reverted to one section, to 1966-67, it was presented to the team winning the NHL regular-season championship. With expansion in 1967-68, it again became a divisional trophy, awarded to the regular-season champions of the East Division through the 1973-74 season. Beginning in 1974-75, it was awarded to the regular-season winner of the conference bearing the name of the trophy. From 1981-82 to 1992-93, the trophy was presented to the playoff champion in the Wales Conference. Since 1993-94, the trophy has been presented to the playoff champion in the Eastern Conference.

2022-23 Winner

The Florida Panthers, who qualified for the postseason as the second Wild Card in the Eastern Conference and lowest seed among all 16 playoff entrants, won their second Prince of Wales Trophy and first in 27 years by defeating three of the top four teams from the regular season. They rallied from a 3-1 series deficit to eliminate the No. 1 overall Boston Bruins – who set NHL records for wins and points in a season – in the First Round (4-3), ousted the No. 4 overall Toronto Maple Leafs in the Second Round (4-1) and swept the No. 2 overall Carolina Hurricanes in the Conference Finals. The Panthers became the third team in League history to eliminate three of the top four teams from the regular season, following the 1968-69 Montreal Canadiens and 1979-80 New York Islanders. Florida also became the third lowest-seeded playoff team in the expansion era (since 1967-68) to reach the Stanley Cup Final, after the 2016-17 Nashville Predators and 2020-21 Canadiens.

STANLEY CUP

Description

The most revered trophy in all of sports, the Stanley Cup is awarded annually to the National Hockey League champion. Also the oldest trophy in North American professional sports, the Stanley Cup has changed in size and shape over the years. The current version of the trophy is made of silver and nickel alloy, is almost 3 feet tall and weighs nearly 35 pounds.

History

The Stanley Cup – the oldest trophy competed for by professional athletes in North America – was donated by **Frederick Arthur**, Lord Stanley of Preston and son of the Earl of Derby, in 1893. Lord Stanley purchased the trophy for 10 guineas (\$50 at the time) for presentation to the amateur hockey champions of Canada. Since 1906, when Canadian teams began to openly pay their players, the Stanley Cup has been the symbol of professional hockey supremacy. It has been contested only by NHL teams since 1926-27 and has been under the exclusive control of the NHL since 1947.

2022-23 Winner

Eight days shy of the seven-year anniversary of Las Vegas officially receiving an NHL franchise and 2,076 days after the team's first regular-season game, the Vegas Golden Knights became Stanley Cup champions. The Golden Knights clinched their first title with a 9-3 victory over the Florida Panthers in Game 5 of the Stanley Cup Final, the southernmost championship series in League history. Vegas, playing its sixth season, became the second-fastest franchise in the NHL's modern era (since 1943-44) to win the Stanley Cup, a mark only bested by the Edmonton Oilers (5th season in 1983-84). Six players who played for the Golden Knights during their inaugural campaign were on the Stanley Cup-winning squad: **William Carrier, William Karlsson, Jonathan Marchessault, Brayden McNabb, Reilly Smith** and **Shea Theodore**. All six also skated with the team in its five-game loss to the Washington Capitals in the 2018 Stanley Cup Final.
