2022-23 NEW HEAD COACHES & GENERAL MANAGERS

Notes on the 10 head coaches and two general managers taking new roles into 2022-23.

Head Coaches

An NHL record-tying 10 new head coaches will make their team debut when the 2022-23 regular season opens, equaling 1997-98 for the highest start-of-season total in League history.

Nearly one-third of NHL clubs (10 of 32) will begin 2022-23 with a head coach behind the bench who did not hold the position (interim or permanent) last season: Boston (**Jim Montgomery**), Chicago (**Luke Richardson**), Dallas (**Peter DeBoer**), Detroit (**Derek Lalonde**), Florida (**Paul Maurice**), NY Islanders (**Lane Lambert**), Philadelphia (**John Tortorella**), San Jose (**David Quinn**), Vegas (**Bruce Cassidy**) and Winnipeg (**Rick Bowness**).

They will strive to match the success of the three longest-serving head coaches, who account for five of the past seven championships: **Jon Cooper** (hired in 2012-13 by Tampa Bay), **Mike Sullivan** (hired in 2015-16 by Pittsburgh) and **Jared Bednar** (hired in 2016-17 by Colorado).

The highest number of new head coaches to *make the playoffs* in their first season with a club is eight, which occurred in 1989-90. **John Muckler** was one of nine new head coaches that season and led the Oilers to their fifth Stanley Cup.

Of the 10 new head coaches:

- 5 have served as head coach in the Stanley Cup Final (Peter DeBoer, Paul Maurice, John Tortorella, Bruce Cassidy & Rick Bowness)
- 3 have served as head coach in the Stanley Cup Final since 2016 (Rick Bowness: 2020 w/ DAL, Bruce Cassidy: 2019 w/ BOS, and Peter DeBoer: 2016 w/ SJS)
- 3 have won a Stanley Cup in any role (**Derek Lalonde:** Asst. Coach w/ TBL in 2020 and 2021, **Lane Lambert:** Asst. Coach w/ WSH in 2018, **John Tortorella:** Head Coach w/ TBL in 2004)
- 2 have won the Jack Adams Award (John Tortorella: 2x; Bruce Cassidy: 1x)
- 3 are taking their first NHL head coaching job (Luke Richardson w/ CHI, Derek Lalonde w/ DET, and Lane Lambert w/ NYI)
- 7 have NHL head coaching experience, with a combined 5,550 regular-season games served

The only other season to begin with 10 new head coaches was 1997-98. That season saw Anaheim (Pierre Page), Boston (Pat Burns), Buffalo (Lindy Ruff), Calgary (Brian Sutter), Montreal (Alain Vigneault), Philadelphia (Wayne Cashman), Phoenix (Jim Schoenfeld), Pittsburgh (Kevin Constantine), San Jose (Darryl Sutter) and Washington (Ron Wilson) all begin with a new bench boss. A few notes on how they fared:

- Seven of 10 teams were in a playoff spot at the end of October 1997 (Anaheim, Boston, Montreal, Philadelphia, Phoenix, Pittsburgh & Washington)
- 8 of 10 teams eventually qualified for the 1998 Stanley Cup Playoffs (Boston, Buffalo, Montreal, Philadelphia, Phoenix, Pittsburgh, San Jose and Washington)
- One won the 1997-98 Jack Adams (**Pat Burns** w/ BOS)
- Two reached the Conference Final (Lindy Ruff w/ BUF, Ron Wilson w/ WSH)
- One reached the Stanley Cup Final (Ron Wilson w/ WSH)

General Managers

Two clubs enter 2022-23 with a new general manager, with **Mike Grier** (San Jose) becoming the first Black GM in NHL history and **Chris MacFarland** (Colorado) becoming the sixth GM to take over for a Stanley Cup-winning club.



NEW HEAD COACHES

Notes on the new head coaches in 2022-23:

Jim Montgomery (Boston Bruins)

- * Head coach for the University of Denver from 2013-2018. His tenure included three NCAA championships (2017-18, 2016-17 & 2013-14) and a Spencer Penrose Trophy (Coach of the Year) in 2016-17.
- * In his first season as head coach of the Stars in 2018-19, Montgomery led the team past the First Round of the playoffs for the first time in eight seasons.

Luke Richardson, Chicago Blackhawks

- * Assistant coach for three different franchises: Senators (2008-09 to 2011-12), Islanders (2017-18) and Canadiens (2018-19 to 2021-22).
- * Advanced to 2021 Stanley Cup Final as assistant coach with the Canadiens.
- * Captured the 2016-17 Spengler Cup as head coach of Team Canada.
- * Skated in 1,417 regular-season contests, the 10th most by a defenseman in NHL history.

Peter DeBoer, Dallas Stars

- * NHL head coach in each of the past 15 seasons (FLA, NJD, SJS, VGK, DAL), including 2022-23 only **Peter Laviolette** has a longer active run (21; NYI, CAR, PHI, NSH, WSH).
- * Has reached the Stanley Cup Final in his first season as head coach multiple times, doing so in 2015-16 with the Sharks and 2011-12 with the Devils. He is one of four head coaches in NHL history to achieve the feat, following **Pat Burns** (2002-03 w/ NJD & 1988-89 w/ MTL), **Mike Keenan** (1993-94 w/ NYR & 1984-85 w/ PHI) and **Scotty Bowman** (1991-92 w/ PIT & 1967-68 w/ STL).
- * Has won 13 playoff rounds in his career, the fourth-highest total among active head coaches.
- * Holds a 6-0 record in Game 7s, trailing only **Darryl Sutter** (8) for the most such wins by a head coach in NHL history.

Derek Lalonde, Detroit Red Wings

- * Two-time Stanley Cup champion as assistant coach of the Tampa Bay Lightning (2020 & 2021).
- * Named 2014-15 ECHL Coach of the Year after leading the Toledo Walleye to a 50-15-7 record, the most wins in a season in franchise history.
- * Reconnects with Red Wings general manager **Steve Yzerman** after spending parts of the 2018-19 season together with the Lightning.



Paul Maurice, Florida Panthers

- * Enters 2022-23 with 1,684 regular-season games coached, the fourth most in NHL history.
- * Ranks seventh place on the all-time wins list among head coaches.
- * One of four head coaches to lead multiple franchises to their first-ever Conference Finals (since 1981-82) appearance (CAR in 2001-02; WPG in 2017-18).

Lane Lambert, New York Islanders

- * Spent the past 11 seasons as an associate/assistant coach on Barry Trotz's staff, serving four seasons with the Islanders (2018-19 to 2021-22), four with the Capitals (2014-15 to 2017-18) and three with the Predators (2011-12 to 2013-14).
- * Stanley Cup winner as an assistant coach with the Capitals in 2018.
- * His nephew, **Jimmy Lambert**, signed an ATO with the Islanders' AHL affiliate, the Bridgeport Islanders, on April 18, 2022.
- * His nephew, **Brad Lambert**, was drafted 30th overall by the Jets at the 2022 NHL Entry Draft.
- * Played 18 games with the Rangers in 1986-87 and is one of five Islanders head coaches who previously suited up for the long-time rival Blueshirts.

John Tortorella, Philadelphia Flyers

- * Needs 27 wins for 700 in his career, a milestone hit by only 10 head coaches entering 2022-23.
- * Head coach for the 2004 Stanley Cup-winning Lightning.
- * Five-time finalist and two-time winner of the <u>Jack Adams Award</u> Tortorella is the only active head coach to be named a finalist for the trophy with three different franchises (TBL: 2x; NYR: 1x; CBJ: 2x).

David Quinn, San Jose Sharks

- * Spent three seasons as head coach of the Rangers (2018-19 to 2020-21).
- * Quinn and newly appointed Sharks general manager **Mike Grier** both played college hockey at Boston University Quinn from 1984-88 and Grier from 1993-96.
- * Served as associate coach for Boston University en route to an NCAA championship in 2008-09, a team that featured current Sharks forward **Nick Bonino**.



Bruce Cassidy, Vegas Golden Knights

- * Head coach of the Bruins for at least part of the past six seasons, a tenure that included an appearance in the 2019 Stanley Cup Final.
- * Cassidy was a finalist for the <u>Jack Adams Award</u> in his first full season behind the Bruins bench in 2017-18 before ultimately claiming the trophy two season later (2019-20).
- * Named the third head coach in Golden Knights history.

Rick Bowness, Winnipeg Jets

- * Head coach of the Stars for at least part of the past three seasons, a tenure that included an appearance in the 2020 Stanley Cup Final.
- * First head coach to serve behind the bench for both the current and original Winnipeg Jets he was Jets head coach for 28 games in 1988-89 season.
- * Played 45 regular-season games for the Jets in 1980-81, recording 8-17—25 in that campaign.

NEW GENERAL MANAGERS

Notes on the new general managers in 2022-23:

Chris MacFarland, Colorado Avalanche

- * Assistant GM of the Avalanche for the past seven seasons, winning the Stanley Cup in 2022.
- * Sixth instance in NHL history of the Stanley Cup champions beginning their title-defending season with a new general manager.

Mike Grier, San Jose Sharks

- * Became the first Black general manager in NHL history.
- * Served as a scout for the 2015 Stanley Cup-winning Blackhawks.
- * Played three seasons with the Sharks from 2006-2009, amassing 35-43—78 in 221 regular-season games.
