Rosters as of Feb. 8, 2026

- * All 32 NHL teams have at least one 2026 Olympian on their roster.
- * Breakdown of 2026 Olympians (300 total players): 147 current NHL players, 13 players on NHL reserve lists (not currently in the NHL) and 140 players without a current NHL affiliation.
- * Additionally, 188 of the 300 Olympians boast NHL experience (minimum: 1 GP in the regular season or playoffs). A total of 179 players were selected in the NHL Draft, including 84 first-round picks and nine No. 1 overall selections.
- * There are 79 players with previous Olympics experience (including 24 current NHL players).
- * The Florida Panthers have the most players on 2026 Olympic rosters (10), while the Tampa Bay Lightning are represented across the most Olympic teams (7).
- * The United States has the largest representation of different NHL teams (18). The most players from one NHL team on an Olympics roster is four – by the Dallas Stars on Finland and the Minnesota Wild on Sweden.
- * There are 38 Stanley Cup winners among the 300 Olympians (55 total wins). Also included among the 2026 Olympic rosters are six Hart Memorial Trophy winners (9 total wins), six James Norris Memorial Trophy winners (9 total wins), six Calder Memorial Trophy winners, five Ted Lindsay Award winners (10 total wins), five Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy winners (8 total wins), five Conn Smythe Trophy winners (6 total wins), three Art Ross Trophy winners (8 total wins), three Lady Byng Memorial Trophy winners (4 total wins), three William M. Jennings Trophy winners (5 total wins) and one Vezina Trophy winner (3 total wins).
- * There are 22 previous Olympic medal winners on 2026 rosters (24 total medals), including three gold medal winners (5 total golds), seven silver medal winners and 12 bronze medal winners. *This measures all Olympic Winter Games, regardless of NHL participation.* The only players with multiple Olympic medals are Canada teammates **Sidney Crosby** (PIT) and **Drew Doughty** (LAK) – both won gold in 2010 and 2014.
- * There is one 2026 Olympian who already is a member of the “Triple Gold Club” – meaning he has won at least one Stanley Cup, one Olympic gold medal and one World Championship gold medal (Crosby). Thirteen players are in contention to join the “Triple Gold Club” at the Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina 2026 (full breakdown on [page 23](#)).
- * Eight rookies are positioned to represent an NHL team in Milano Cortina: Denmark’s **Oscar Fisker Molgaard** (SEA), Finland’s **Oliver Kapanen** (MTL), Germany’s **Josh Samanski** (EDM), Latvia’s **Arturs Silovs** (PIT) and **Sandis Vilmanis** (FLA), Slovakia’s **Dalibor Dvorsky** (STL) and **Pavol Regenda** (SJS), and Sweden’s **Jesper Wallstedt** (MIN). Czechia’s **David Spacek** (MIN) has played in the NHL this season, but his final game before the Olympic break was in the AHL.
- * There are 15 current NHL captains on 2026 Olympic rosters: five on the United States, four on Canada, three on Sweden, two on Switzerland and one on Czechia.

History of NHL Participation at the Olympic Winter Games

* On Oct. 2, 1995, the NHL, NHLPA and IIHF reached an agreement that ultimately sent NHL players to the Olympic Winter Games for the first time (the 1998 event in Nagano, Japan). Including Milano Cortina, the NHL regular season has paused for players to attend six total Olympic Winter Games (2026, 2014, 2010, 2006, 2002 and 1998).

* Four players participated in each of the first five Olympic Winter Games involving the NHL: **Daniel Alfredsson** (Sweden), **Jaromir Jagr** (Czechia), **Teemu Selanne** (Finland) and **Kimmo Timonen** (Finland).

* NHL players have represented 18 different countries at the six Olympic Winter Games involving the League: Austria, Belarus, Canada, Czechia, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Kazakhstan, Latvia, Norway, Russia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine and the United States.

* A breakdown of NHL player representation for each of the six Olympic Winter Games with League participation:

- 2026: 147 NHL players (32 of 32 NHL teams)
- 2014: 148 NHL players (30 of 30 NHL teams)
- 2010: 139 NHL players (30 of 30 NHL teams)
- 2006: 151 NHL players (29 of 30 NHL teams)
- 2002: 144 NHL players (27 of 30 NHL teams)
- 1998: 117 NHL players (26 of 26 NHL teams)

* The most players from one NHL team named to rosters for a single Olympic Winter Games is 11, by the Detroit Red Wings in 2002 (**Chris Chelios**, **Pavel Datsyuk**, **Sergei Fedorov**, **Dominik Hasek**, **Tomas Holmstrom**, **Brett Hull**, **Igor Larionov**, **Nicklas Lidstrom**, **Fredrik Olausson**, **Brendan Shanahan** and **Steve Yzerman**).

* Eight players have won Olympic gold and the Stanley Cup in the same season: Shanahan and Yzerman in 2002 (Canada/DET); **Duncan Keith**, **Brent Seabrook** and **Jonathan Toews** in 2010 (Canada/CHI); and **Jeff Carter** and **Drew Doughty** in 2014 (Canada/LAK). The other was **Ken Morrow** in 1980, winning gold with the United States as part of the “Miracle on Ice” team before making his NHL debut less than a week later (March 1, 1980) and lifting the Stanley Cup that spring with the New York Islanders.

* According to the IIHF, there currently are 30 players who are part of the “Triple Gold Club” – meaning they have won at least one Olympic gold medal, one Stanley Cup and one World Championship gold medal. The full breakdown is available on [page 23](#).

* A total of 25 players with NHL experience have served as their country’s flag bearer for either the Opening or Closing Ceremony of the Olympic Winter Games. Four of those 25 have done so while representing an NHL team: **Zdeno Chara** (Slovakia/BOS) at the 2014 Opening Ceremony in Sochi, Russia, and **Leon Draisaitl** (Germany/EDM), **Nino Niederreiter** (Switzerland/WPG) and **David Pastrnak** (Czechia/BOS) at the 2026 Opening Ceremony in Milano Cortina, Italy.

OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES MILANO CORTINA 2026 TOURNAMENT FORMAT

The Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina 2026 will operate in a similar format to the tournaments in 2022, 2018, 2014 and 2010.

The 12 participating countries, seeded in three groups of four teams, will play a round robin (Preliminary Round) within their respective group – totaling 18 games (3 per team). The teams and groups were seeded according to the 2023 IIHF Men's World Ranking.

At the end of the Preliminary Round, all 12 teams will be ranked according to criteria listed below. This ranking will be used for seeding the teams in the final round as well as calculating the final rankings at the conclusion of the tournament.

The final round will feature four games in the Qualification Playoffs, four Quarterfinals, two Semifinals, one Bronze Medal Game and one Gold Medal Game.

Seeding Criteria

The below criteria will be used, in the order presented, to determine the rankings (1-12) following completion of the Preliminary Round:

- Higher position within group
- Most points
- Greater goal differential
- Most goals for
- Better 2023 IIHF World Ranking

After the Preliminary Round, teams 1-4 will receive byes into the Quarterfinals (where they will be designated as the home teams). The teams ranked 5-12 will play in the Qualification Playoffs with the following matchups:

- 5 vs. 12
- 6 vs. 11
- 7 vs. 10
- 8 vs. 9

The four winning teams from the Qualification Playoffs will advance to the Quarterfinals. The four losing teams from the Qualification Playoffs will be ranked 9 through 12, according to their ranking from the Preliminary Round.

The Quarterfinals will be played with the following matchups:

- 1 vs. Winner of 8/9
- 2 vs. Winner of 7/10
- 3 vs. Winner of 6/11
- 4 vs. Winner of 5/12

The four winning teams from the Quarterfinals will advance to the Semifinals. The four losing teams from the Quarterfinals will be ranked 5 through 8, according to their ranking from the Preliminary Round.

The Semifinals will be played with the highest-seeded team playing the lowest-seeded team (from the Preliminary Round rankings). The other teams will meet in the second matchup.

The two winning teams from the Semifinals will face off in the Gold Medal Game, while the two losing teams from the Semifinals will play in the Bronze Medal Game.

The team with the higher Preliminary Round ranking will be the home team in both the Gold Medal and Bronze Medal Games.

Three-Point System During Preliminary Round

For all games during the Preliminary Round, points shall be awarded as follows:

- 3 points for a team that wins in regulation
- 2 points for a team that wins in overtime or a shootout
- 1 point for a team that loses in overtime or a shootout
- 0 points for a team that loses in regulation

Overtime Format During Preliminary Round

If a game is tied at the end of regulation during the Preliminary Round, a five-minute overtime period will be played – at 3-on-3 strength – following a three-minute intermission.

The teams will not change ends for the overtime period.

The game will end if a goal is scored during the overtime period. If no goal is scored, the teams will take part in a shootout (details listed below).

Overtime Format for Playoff Games

If a game is tied at the end of regulation during the final round (Qualification Playoffs, Quarterfinals, Semifinals or Bronze Medal Game), a 10-minute overtime will be played – at 3-on-3 strength – following a three-minute intermission. The teams will not change ends for the overtime period. The game will end if a goal is scored during the overtime period. If no goal is scored, the teams will take part in a shootout (details listed below).

If the Gold Medal Game is tied at the end of regulation, 20-minute overtime periods will be played – at 3-on-3 strength – until a goal is scored. There will be 18-minute intermissions between each overtime period.

Shootout Procedure

The following shootout procedure will be utilized when no goal is scored during overtime (excluding the Gold Medal Game):

- Five different shooters from each team will take alternate shots, until a decisive goal is scored.
- If the game still is tied after five shots by each team, the shootout will continue – with a reversed shooting order. The same or new players can take the tiebreaker shots.
- The same player also can be used for each shot by a team in the tiebreaker shootout (i.e., after the first five shootout attempts).
- Only the decisive goal will count in the result of the game.
- Shots will be taken at both ends of the ice.
- A coin toss will determine which team takes the first shot, with the winner of the toss deciding whether his team shoots first or second.
- Any player whose penalty was not over at the conclusion of overtime cannot participate in the shootout and must stay in the penalty box or in the dressing room.
- The goaltenders will defend the same goal as in the overtime period. Each team can change its goaltender after each shootout attempt.

Tiebreaking Formula

The tiebreaker for two teams with the same number of standings points will be the game between the two teams, with the winner of the head-to-head matchup taking precedence.

Due to the fact that the three-point system does not allow a game to end in a tie, the following tiebreaking procedure is applicable when three or more teams are tied in standings points.

These tiebreakers, designed to create a sub-group among tied teams, will continue to be used until only two or none of the teams remain tied. In the case of two tied teams remaining, the head-to-head game between the two then would be the determining tiebreaker. In the case of none of the teams being tied, the criteria specified in the respective step applies.

- **Step 1:** Taking into consideration the games between each of the tied teams, a sub-group will be created applying the points awarded in the direct games among the tied teams from which the teams then are ranked accordingly.
- **Step 2:** Should three or more teams still remain tied in points, then the better goal differential in the direct games among the tied teams will be decisive.
- **Step 3:** Should three or more teams still remain tied in points and goal differential, then the highest number of goals scored by these teams in their direct games will be decisive.
- **Step 4:** Should three or more teams still remain tied in points, goal differential and goals scored, then the results between each of the three teams and the closest best-ranked team outside the sub-group will be applied. In this case, the tied team with the best result (1. points, 2. goal differential, 3. more goals scored) against the closest best-ranked team will take precedence.
- **Step 5:** Should the teams still remain tied, then the results between each of the three teams and the next-highest best-ranked team outside the sub-group will be applied.
- **Step 6:** Should the teams still remain tied after these five steps have been exercised, then sport considerations will be applied and the teams will be ranked by their positions coming into the championship (seeding).

In the case where two teams are tied and they have not yet played against each other, and in the case where three or more teams are tied and not all mutual games have been played within the sub-group, the following criteria will be used to break the tie: 1. fewest number of games played, 2. greatest goal differential in all games, 3. highest number of goals for in all games, 4. highest tournament seeding entering the tournament.

Roster Size

The maximum number of players allowed on each roster is 22 skaters and three goaltenders (25 total).

For each game, any team may dress 20 skaters and two goaltenders (22 total).

GOLD MEDALIST: CANADA

With Sidney Crosby (Pittsburgh Penguins) as captain of a Canadian squad that returned 11 players from its 2010 gold medal team, the reigning Olympic champions got off to a stronger start than their past showings by winning all three round-robin contests to finish first in Group B.

While their roster included each of the NHL's top three scorers from the 2013-14 season entering the event – Crosby, Ryan Getzlaf (Anaheim Ducks) and John Tavares (New York Islanders) – it was the goaltending performance of Carey Price (Montréal Canadiens) that powered Canada to their second straight Olympic gold medal and third in five events involving NHL players.

Price went a perfect 5-0-0 in the tournament – following up on a feat teammate Roberto Luongo (Vancouver Canucks) achieved four years prior – and posted back-to-back shutouts to end the event, blanking the United States (31 saves) and Sweden (24 saves) in the semifinals and gold medal game, respectively. It marked the first time in any Olympics that a men's goaltender earned a shutout in both the semifinals and gold medal game.

Overall, Canada recorded three shutouts – two by Price and one by Luongo – and outscored opponents 17-3 across six games.

Defensemen Drew Doughty (Los Angeles Kings) and Shea Weber (Nashville Predators) shared Canada's scoring lead with six points apiece. Doughty and Weber also combined for half of the nation's game-winning goals, with Doughty notching two in the round robin and Weber scoring the decider late in the third period of the quarterfinals against Latvia – a narrow 2-1 decision thanks to a 55-save effort by Latvia's Kristers Gudlevskis (Tampa Bay Lightning). Doughty would go on to lead NHL defensemen in scoring during the 2014 Stanley Cup Playoffs, adding a second Stanley Cup to his résumé less than four months after claiming his second Olympic gold.

Jamie Benn (Dallas Stars) and Jonathan Toews (Chicago Blackhawks) provided the other game-winners for Canada, including the lone marker in their semifinal victory against the United States (Benn) and the gold medal-clinching tally versus Sweden (Toews).

GOLD MEDALIST: CANADA

The second Olympic Winter Games in North America featuring NHL players produced another Canada-United States gold medal game, with the host Canadians treating fans to a thrilling finish that involved a multi-goal rally by the Americans and a famed “Golden Goal” in overtime by Sidney Crosby (Pittsburgh Penguins).

Canada pulled ahead 2-0 before the halfway mark of the second period, but Patrick Kane (Chicago Blackhawks) set up two U.S. goals – including the tying marker by Zach Parise (New Jersey Devils) with 25 seconds remaining in regulation.

After a barrage of action to begin overtime, Crosby clinched the gold medal on home soil after taking a pass from Jarome Iginla (Calgary Flames) and icing the game at 7:40 of the extra period. Crosby, who finished his first Olympics tournament with 3-3—6 as well as game-deciding shootout goal, became the first player in any Olympics to score an overtime goal in the gold medal game.

Canada’s gold medal win avenged an earlier defeat to the United States, as the Americans earned first place in Group A with a 5-3 victory to close out the round robin in what proved to be the final appearance for Martin Brodeur (New Jersey Devils) with Canada. That loss forced the Canadians to play a must-win game against Germany in the qualification playoffs, where the offense found its stride and Roberto Luongo (Vancouver Canucks) took over in net.

The Canadians fired 81 shots on goal across two games against Germany and Russia, with 18 players collecting points to help them outscore opponents 15-5 and clinch a spot in the semifinals. Luongo, playing in his home NHL arena, got the nod as Canada’s starter for every elimination game – posting a 2.18 goals-against average and .917 save percentage over those four contests while holding tournament scoring leaders Marian Hossa (Chicago Blackhawks) and Pavol Demitra (Vancouver Canucks) off the scoresheet in a semifinal victory against Slovakia.

Jonathan Toews (Chicago Blackhawks) led Canada with 1-7—8, notching at least one assist in each of his first five contests before registering his first goal of the tournament to open the scoring in the gold medal game. Less than four months later, Toews again would find success in Vancouver by posting 4-8—12 against the Canucks in the 2010 Conference Semifinals – the highest single-series point total by a Blackhawks player in 33 years – en route to claiming his first Stanley Cup. Toews also won the Conn Smythe Trophy after leading Chicago in playoff scoring, edging teammate and United States foe Kane – who delivered overtime heroics of his own with the Stanley Cup-clinching goal.

GOLD MEDALIST: SWEDEN

Boasting a roster that featured a future Hockey Hall of Famer at every position, Sweden overcame a challenging round robin to secure their second Olympic gold medal – with the highest-scoring NHL defenseman in the country's history notching the tournament-clinching goal against rival Finland.

Sweden's star-studded lineup received key contributions from all positions throughout the event, notably in the final 20 minutes of the gold medal game when defenseman Nicklas Lidstrom (Detroit Red Wings) scored a go-ahead goal – off assists by fellow future Hockey Hall of Famers Mats Sundin (Toronto Maple Leafs) and Peter Forsberg (Philadelphia Flyers) – as Henrik Lundqvist (New York Rangers) stopped all 12 shots he faced in the third period to secure the victory.

Lidstrom led all defensemen in scoring during the tournament (2-4—6) and would go on to do the same during the 2005-06 NHL season (16-64—80) en route to earning his fourth James Norris Memorial Trophy.

Forsberg topped Sweden with six assists and helped deliver Olympic gold for a second time. Twelve years earlier, he notched the tournament-clinching goal in a shootout at the 1994 Olympic Winter Games in Lillehammer, Norway – producing a moment immortalized on a postage stamp in Sweden. A year later, Forsberg won the Calder Memorial Trophy to kickstart his NHL career.

After sitting out the tournament opener against Kazakhstan, Lundqvist entered the Swedish net against NHL rookie Alex Ovechkin (Washington Capitals) and Russia. Though he suffered his only defeat in that contest, Lundqvist went 5-0-0 the rest of the way – limiting tournament scoring leaders Teemu Selanne (Mighty Ducks of Anaheim) and Saku Koivu (Montréal Canadiens) to a combined one assist in the gold medal game. Lundqvist's first Olympics came amid his first NHL season, as he carried a 25-7-6 record into the event and later finished fourth in Calder Memorial Trophy voting.

After being shut out twice during their five-game round robin that led to a third-place finish in Group B, the Tre Kronor outscored opponents 13-5 across their quarterfinal and semifinal matchups – with Daniel Alfredsson (Ottawa Senators) notching half of his team-leading 10 points in those two contests.

GOLD MEDALIST: CANADA

A star-studded showdown between Canada and the United States ended a 50-year wait for Olympic gold in the first Winter Games with NHL players contested on North American soil.

With Mario Lemieux (Pittsburgh Penguins) as captain and Wayne Gretzky as executive director, Canada returned 12 members from their 1998 roster – including Joe Sakic (Colorado Avalanche), who missed the last two contests in Nagano. Sakic, the NHL's reigning Hart Memorial Trophy winner and captain of the 2000-01 Stanley Cup champions, delivered in the clutch by notching four of his team-leading seven points in the gold medal game.

Canada overcame adversity to claim their first Olympic gold medal since 1952, securing only one win across three games during the round robin. After an opening loss to Sweden – and eventual tournament scoring leader Mats Sundin (Toronto Maple Leafs) – the Canadians turned to Martin Brodeur (New Jersey Devils) in goal. The NHL's eventual all-time wins leader proved ready for the task, going undefeated (4-0-1) as Canada's starter the rest of the tournament.

After being out of the lineup for Canada's 3-2 victory against Germany, Lemieux scored twice in the round-robin finale but needed a late tying goal from Joe Nieuwendyk (Dallas Stars) to help salvage a tie against Czechia in a rematch of the 1998 semifinals.

That lined up a date with Finland in the quarterfinals, with Lemieux assisting on the winning goal by Steve Yzerman (Detroit Red Wings) to set up a surprise semifinal matchup with Belarus – who earlier in the day eliminated Sweden from contention despite only having one NHL player on their roster: Ruslan Salei (Mighty Ducks of Anaheim). Salei helped Belarus keep it close in the early portion of their game against Canada, notching a tying goal midway through the first period, but the Canadian squad and their roster of more than a dozen future Hockey Hall of Famers responded with six unanswered goals to clinch a spot in the final.

The gold medal game between rivals started well for the hosts as Tony Amonte (Chicago Blackhawks) – the championship-clinching goal-scorer at the 1996 World Cup of Hockey – gave the United States an early lead before Canada tied the contest with a goal by Paul Kariya (Mighty Ducks of Anaheim), notable for the fact that Lemieux instinctively allowed the pass from Chris Pronger (St. Louis Blues) to go between his legs and find Kariya's stick.

Sakic then took charge, notching points on each of Canada's next four goals: two assists on goals by Jarome Iginla (Calgary Flames) and two goals of his own. Sakic's first tally was a tiebreaking goal late in the second period that stood as the gold medal clincher, while his second came with 80 seconds left in regulation – delivering an unforgettable call by play-by-play broadcaster Bob Cole: "Gee-ooo-oooh Sakic! That makes it 5-2 Canada! Surely that's going to be it!"

GOLD MEDALIST: CZECHIA

With NHL players participating in the Olympic Winter Games for the first time, the League's reigning MVP – Dominik Hasek (Buffalo Sabres) – propelled his country to a historic finish as Czechia claimed their first Olympic gold medal.

In the midst of an NHL season in which he would go on to repeat as the winner of the Hart Memorial Trophy, Lester B. Pearson Award (now the Ted Lindsay Award) and Vezina Trophy, Hasek led the tournament in wins (5), goals-against average (0.97), save percentage (.961) and shutouts (2) – yielding only two goals in the medal round (3 GP), capped by a 1-0 shutout in the final against Russia.

Czechia leaned on their star goaltender throughout, capturing gold despite not having a player among the top 10 in tournament scoring. Jaromir Jagr (Pittsburgh Penguins) shared the team lead with 1-4—5, alongside Pavel Patara (2-3—5).

Czechia posted a 2-1-0 record in round-robin play, but a 2-1 loss to Russia in their last game dropped them to second place in Group C – setting up a quarterfinal showdown with the United States, victors of the 1996 World Cup of Hockey 17 months prior. Hasek delivered 38 saves and Jagr tallied 1-1—2, including the primary assist on the tying goal and the eventual game-winner 58 seconds later, to ignite the Czechs' comeback win.

That victory set up a semifinal matchup with Canada, whose lineup featured more than a dozen future Hockey Hall of Famers, including Wayne Gretzky (New York Rangers) and Patrick Roy (Colorado Avalanche). Czechia took a 1-0 lead midway through the third period, but Canada tied the contest with 63 seconds remaining in regulation before the game ultimately went to a shootout. Hasek stopped all five shooters in the tiebreaker, and Robert Reichel (New York Islanders) scored the lone goal to advance Czechia to the final.

Hasek delivered his second shutout of the tournament in the gold medal game, a 20-save effort in which he held tournament goals leader Pavel Bure (Vancouver Canucks) off the scoresheet to help Czechia avenge their earlier loss to Russia and secure Olympic gold. Defenseman Petr Svoboda (Philadelphia Flyers) notched the lone goal in the 1-0 victory for the Czechs, with the efforts of Hasek proving to be the difference for a squad that scored just two goals in regulation/overtime across the semifinals and gold medal game.
