

A total of <u>24 players will compete in the Canadian Tire PWHL 3-on-3 Showcase</u>, the second such contest to be part of the NHL All-Star Weekend – this year during the inaugural **NHL All-Star Thursday** on Feb. 1 at Scotiabank Arena in Toronto (tickets). Click here for more information on the event and rosters, which include:

- * 20 skaters and 4 goaltenders who have won a combined 46 Olympic and 146 World Championship medals as well as 17 NCAA Division I Championships.
- * 17 of the 18 inaugural PWHL free-agent signings (New York's Micah Zandee-Hart is injured).
- * 7 of the first 12 selections in the first-ever PWHL Draft, including all 6 first round picks.
- * 9 players who competed in the Elite Women's 3-on-3 game at the 2020 NHL All-Star Weekend in St. Louis.

F 26 Kendall Coyne Schofield, PWHL Minnesota (2nd)

- * A three-time Olympic medalist (1 gold, 2 silver) and nine-time World Championship medalist (6 gold, 3 silver), Coyne Schofield won the Patty Kazmaier Award during her senior year at Northeastern (2016). To date, she still holds the record from most career goals (141) in Huskies history.
- * In 2019, Coyne Schofield took the place of injured Avalanche forward **Nathan MacKinnon** in the Fastest Skater event at NHL All-Star Skills in St. Louis, clocking a lap time of 14.346 seconds less than one second shy of the winning time by Oilers forward **Connor McDavid** (13.378). In doing so she became the first female to compete in an NHL All-Star skills event.



* Coyne Schofield also played in the inaugural Elite Women's 3-on-3 game at NHL All-Star in 2020.

F 21 <u>Hilary Knight</u>, PWHL Boston (2nd)

- * Four-time Olympic medalist (1 Gold, 3 Silver) and 13-time World Championship medalists (9 Gold, 4 Silver) with Team USA. Knight's four Olympic medals are tied with **Jenny Potter**, **Angela Ruggiero** and **Julie Chu** for the most by a U.S women's hockey player.
- * First recipient of the 2023 IIHF Female Player of the Year award. Knight captained the 2023 USA Women's World Championship team to victory, marking her ninth gold medal at the event which tied **Danielle Goyette** (CAN) for the most in a career.
- * One of three players signed in free agency by Boston, Knight was announced as captain of the club on Jan. 2 by former Bruins captain **Patrice Bergeron**.

F 11 Alina Müller, PWHL Boston (1st)

- * Müller is a three-time Olympian (2014, 2018 & 2022) and seven-time World Championship participant with Team Switzerland. In 2014, she became the youngest ice hockey player to win an Olympic medal when she helped her country earn bronze at the age of 15.
- * Müller finished among the top 3 finalists for the Patty Kazmaier Award twice (2020 & 2023) and was named among the top 10 finalists for the award five times (2019, 2020, 2021, 2022 & 2023).
- * Boston's first pick (third overall) in the inaugural PWHL Draft.

F 12 Kelly Pannek, PWHL Minnesota (1st)

- * Pannek is a two-time Olympic medalist (1 gold, 1 silver) and five-time World Championship medalist (3 gold, 2 silver) with the United States.
- * Born in Plymouth, Minn., Pannek won back-to-back NCAA national championships with the Minnesota Golden Gophers (2015 & 2016) and signed with her home-state team on Sept. 6, 2023..
- * During her junior season with the Golden Gophers, Pannek ranked first in the nation in assists (43) and second in points (19-43—62 in 39 GP).

F 29 Marie-Philip Poulin, PWHL Montreal (2nd)

- * Poulin is a four-time Olympic medalist (3 gold, 1 silver) and 11-time World Championship medalist (3 gold, 7 silver, 1 bronze).
- * Poulin also known as 'Captain Clutch' is the only player (men's or women's hockey) to score in four Olympic gold medal games. Her four tallies include two game-winners one of which took place in overtime (Sochi, 2014).
- * In 2022, Poulin <u>received the Northern Star Award</u> as Canada's Athlete of the Year and the Bobbie Resenfeld Award as the top female athlete.
- * Poulin tallied the second hat trick in PWHL history on Jan. 10 at New York, four days after PWHL Minnesota forward **Grace Zumwinkle** netted the first (against Montreal).



F 40 Blayre Turnbull, PWHL Toronto (2nd)

- * Turnbull is a two-time Olympic medalist (1 gold, 1 silver) and six-time World Championship medalist (2 gold, 3 silver, 1 bronze).
- * One of three players signed in free agency by Toronto and was named the clubs first captain on Dec. 30th.
- * She played four seasons with the University of Wisconsin Badgers where she served as captain during her senior season and tied for second on the club in goals (15).

D 15 Savannah Harmon, PWHL Ottawa (1st)

- * Harmon became Ottawa's first-ever drafted player after being selected in the First Round (fifth overall) during the inaugural PWHL Draft.
- * A Team USA Olympic medalist (Silver) and three-time World Championship medalist (1 Gold, 2 Silver), Harmon led Team USA defenders in goals (2), assists (5) and points (7) during her 2022 Olympic debut.
- * Named a Patty Kazmaier Award Finalist during the 2017-18 season, Harmon helped Clarkson University claim back-to-back NCAA National Championships (2017 & 2018).

D 5 Megan Keller, PWHL Boston (1st)

- * Keller was named an alternate captain on Boston's first leadership squad after the team signed her as one of its three free agency signings.
- * A decorated player on the national stage, Keller is a two-time Olympic medalist (1 Gold, 1 Silver), seven-time World Championship medalist (5 Gold, 2 Silver) and four-time Four Nations Cup medalist (3 Gold, 1 Silver) with Team USA.
- * Keller was named a Patty Kazmaier finalist in three out of her four years with Boston College, making her just the second defender in history to be a finalist three times.

D 17 Ella Shelton, PWHL New York (1st)

- * After becoming New York's first-ever pick in the PWHL Draft (fourth overall), Shelton went on to score the first goal in PWHL history in a 4-0 W over Toronto on Jan.1, 2024.
- * A Team Canada Olympic medalist (Gold) and three-time World Championship medalist (2 Gold, 1 Silver), Shelton collected 0-3—3 in 7 GP in her 2022 Olympic tournament debut.
- * Shelton attended Clarkson University where she helped the Golden Knights win National titles alongside fellow All-Star, Savannah Harmon, in 2017 & 2018.

D 2 Lee Stecklein, PWHL Minnesota (2nd)

- * Stecklein became one of the first players to join the Minnesota roster when the team signed her during the free agency period.
- * Stecklein is a three-time Olympic medalist (1 Gold, 2 Silver) and eight-time World Championship medalist (6 Gold, 2 Silver) with Team USA. During the 2021 World Championship, Stecklein was named an All-Star and Best Defender of the tournament after collecting the most assists (5) and points (7) among blueliners.
- * Stecklein won the National Championship in three of her four years with Minnesota-Duluth (2013, 2015 & 2016) and captained the team in her final two seasons with the school.



G 35 Ann-Renée Desbiens, PWHL Montreal (2nd)

- * A two-time Olympic medalist (1 gold, 1 silver) and four-time World Championship medalist (2 gold, 2 silver), Desbiens recorded 38 saves in the Olympic gold medal game in 2022 to help Canada defeat the United States.
- * During the preliminary round at the 2022 Olympics, Desbiens recorded 51 saves in Canada's 4-2 win over the United States, the most by a Canadian goaltender (male or female) in an Olympic game.
- * Desbiens had 55 career shutouts with the University of Wisconsin, the most in a career by any collegiate goaltender regardless of gender or division.
- * She stopped 15 of 16 shots faced to win the Elite Women's 3-on-3 game at 2020 NHL All-Star Skills.

G 31 <u>Aerin Frankel</u>, PWHL Boston (1st)

- * Frankel is a three-time Patty Kazmaier top-10 finalist (2020, 2021, 2022) and is tied with **Noora Räty** (2010, 2011 & 2013) and **Chanda Gunn** (2002, 2003 & 2004) for the most top 10 finishes by a goaltender. She is also a three-time Hockey East Goaltender of the Year (2019, 2020 & 2021).
- * Frankel ranks first on Northeastern's all-time list for goaltenders in games played (139), minutes played (8,227), saves (3,349), shutouts (39) and wins (103).

F 25 Alex Carpenter, PWHL New York (2nd)

- * Carpenter is set to make her second NHL All-Star Weekend appearance after playing in the <u>Elite Women's 3-on-3 at 2020 All-Star Skills</u> in St. Louis. Alex's father, **Bobby Carpenter**, skated over 1,100 games in the NHL, winning the Stanley Cup with New Jersey in 1994-95 and representing the Wales Conference All-Stars in 1985.
- * Carpenter ranks among the top 15 in all-time goals, assists and points for the United States at the World Championship. Her six gold medals at the tournament are tied for the fourth most behind **Hilary Knight** (9), **Kacey Bellamy** (8) and **Meghan Duggan** (7).

F 26 Emily Clark, PWHL Ottawa (1st)

- * Clark served as alternate captain in her final year at the University of Wisconsin, helping the club to a 35-4-2 record en route to its first NCAA Championship in eight years.
- * The last three years for Clark have seen her crowned 2022-23 PWHPA champion and Canadian gold medalist in the 2022 Olympics as well as the 2021 and 2022 World Championship.
- * After signing as a free agent with PWHL Ottawa on Sept. 5, 2023, Clark was named an alternate captain.



F 27 <u>Taylor Heise</u>, PWHL Minnesota (1st)

- * Heise (Lake City, Minn.) was the first overall selection in the inaugural PWHL Draft on Sept. 18, 2023. Playing for her home-state team, Heise scored the first goal in franchise history on Jan. 3 against PWHL Boston.
- * In each of her final two years at the University of Minnesota, Heise was named the NCAA (WCHA Women) Offensive Player of the Year in addition to winning the Patty Kazmaier Award for top collegiate female player in 2021-22 and being named a finalist in 2022-23.
- * During the 2021-22 World Championship, in which she took home a silver medal with the United States, Heise was named tournament MVP after concluding the event with the most goals (7), assists (11) and points (18).

F 19 Brianne Jenner, PWHL Ottawa (1st)

- * Jenner was named the first captain for the PWHL Ottawa franchise on Dec. 29, 2023.
- * Jenner has accumulated 13 medals, including five gold, for Team Canada across Olympic and World Championship competitions. During the 2022 Olympics, she tied the single tournament record for goals (9) and was named tournament MVP after helping Canada win gold.

F 20 Sarah Nurse, PWHL Toronto (2nd)

- * From competing in the <u>Elite Women's 3-on-3 game</u> at the 2020 NHL All-Star Weekend in St. Louis, to <u>electrifying the crowd</u> at 2023 NHL All-Star Skills in Sunrise, Fla., Nurse is set to represent PWHL Toronto in her home province at this year's All-Star Weekend.
- * Nurse established an Olympic record in 2022 when she recorded a single-tournament best 18 points across seven games en route to her first Olympic gold medal with Canada.

F 11 Abby Roque, PWHL Minnesota (1st)

- * Roque, who grew up in the Wahnapitae First Nation, became the first Indigenous woman to play for the U.S. Olympic hockey team when she debuted in 2022.
- * In her final year at the University of Wisconsin, Roque was named the NCAA (WCHA Woman) Offensive Player of the Year for the second time in three seasons (also 2017-18).

F 7 <u>Laura Stacey</u>, PWHL Montreal (1st)

- * Stacey, the great-granddaughter of NHL Hall of Famer **King Clancy** and great-niece to NHL alumnus **Terry Clancy**, was one of PWHL Montreal's three free agent signings ahead of their inaugural campaign.
- * On Jan. 2, Stacey scored the game-tying goal for PWHL Montreal with just over five minutes remaining in regulation to force overtime, setting the stage for a Montreal victory in their first game in franchise history.

D 23 Erin Ambrose, PWHL Montreal (1st)

- * Ambrose, the sixth overall selection in the inaugural PWHL Draft, won an Olympic gold medal with Canada in 2022 and is a five-time World Championship medalist (2 gold, 2 silver, 1 bronze).
- * In 2014, Ambrose was a key contributor to Clarkson's first ever national championship. She led all defenders in scoring with 50 points (seven more than any other defender in the country) and was the co-winner of the ECAC Hockev's award for best defensive defender.



D 14 Renata Fast, PWHL Toronto (2nd)

* A two-time Olympic medalist (1 gold, 1 silver) and five-time World Championship medalist (2 gold, 2 silver, 1 bronze), Fast played an important role in Canada's Olympic gold medal win at Beijing in 2022. She recorded 1-4—5 (7 GP) and led the team in time in ice time, averaging 21:32 per game.

* Won a NCAA National Championship with Clarkson in 2014.

*One of three free agency signings by Toronto and was named assistant captain of the club on Dec. 30th.

D 3 <u>Jocelyne Larocque</u>, PWHL Toronto (1st)

* Larocque is a three-time Olympic medalist (2 gold, 1 silver) and 10-time World Championship medalist (3 gold, 6 silver, 1 bronze). At the 2021 World Championship, Larocque assisted on both the tying and overtime goals to help Canada win the goal medal against the United States.

- * Larocque won two NCAA national championships with Minnesota-Duluth (2008 & 2010)
- * Larocque, of Métis heritage, was the national winner for the Tom Longboat Award in 2018 and in 2021 was named Manitoba's Indigenous Female Athlete of the Decade.

G 29 <u>Nicole Hensley</u>, PWHL Minnesota (1st)

- * Hensley was the first goaltender selected in the PWHL Draft when she was chosen 12th overall by PWHL Minnesota. In her first game with the team, Hensley made 33 saves and earned First Star honors as Minnesota defeated Boston 3-2 in their inaugural contest.
- * During the 2021-22 World Championship, Hensley was named Best Goaltender of the tournament as she finished with a 4-1 record with a .930 save percentage and 1.08 goals-against average as the United States earned a silver medal.

G 38 <u>Emerance Maschmeyer</u>, PWHL Ottawa (1st)

- * Maschmeyer signed as a free agent with PWHL Ottawa on Sept. 5, 2023, and got the nod to start for the team in its season-opening game. Maschmeyer made 21 saves, including stopping **Marie-Philip Poulin** on the PWHL's first-ever penalty shot, in an overtime loss to Montreal.
- * Maschmeyer helped Canada win gold at the 2022 Olympics in Beijing when she posted a .957 save percentage and 0.50 goals-against average while going undefeated in two appearances.

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
