* The **Tampa Bay Lightning** have the most players selected (10).

* The **Tampa Bay Lightning** also are represented across the most Olympic rosters (7).

* **Team USA** has the largest representation of NHL teams (18). The most players from one NHL team on an Olympic roster is 4 – the **Dallas Stars** on **Team Finland** and **Minnesota Wild** on **Team Sweden**.

* **39 Stanley Cup** winners (57 total wins), **6 Hart Trophy** winners (9 total wins), **6 Norris Trophy** winners (9 total wins), **6 Calder Trophy** winners, **5 Ted Lindsay Award** winners (10 total wins), **4 Conn Smythe Trophy** winners (5 total wins), **3 Art Ross Trophy** winners (8 total wins) and **1 Vezina Trophy** winner (3 total wins).

* **23 Olympic medal winners** (any color; 25 total medals), including 3 gold medal winners (5 total gold), 7 silver medal winners (7 total silver) and 13 bronze medal winners (13 total bronze). This measures all Olympics. The only players with multiple Olympics medals are Team Canada teammates **Sidney Crosby** (PIT) and **Drew Doughty** (LAK) – both won gold in 2010 and 2014.

* **1** player who is part of the “Triple Gold Club” – meaning they have won at least one Olympic gold medal, one Stanley Cup and one World Championship gold medal (**Sidney Crosby**, PIT/Team Canada).

* **13** players are in **contention to join “Triple Gold Club” at Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina 2026** (5 on **Team Canada**, 3 on **Team Czechia**, 3 on **Team Sweden** and 2 on **Team Finland**).

* **8** rookies who have played in the NHL since full rosters were announced: **Pavol Regenda** (SJS) and **Dalibor Dvorsky** (STL) on Team Slovakia, **Arturs Silovs** (PIT) and **Sandis Vilmanis** (FLA) on Team Latvia, **David Spacek** (MIN) on Team Czechia, **Oliver Kapanen** (MTL) on Team Finland, **Josh Samanski** (EDM) on Team Germany and **Jesper Wallstedt** (MIN) on Team Sweden. Forward **Oscar Fisker Molgaard** of Team Denmark has played as a rookie with the Kraken this season but was in the AHL when named to the Olympic roster and last played an NHL game in November.

* **15** current NHL captains (5 on **Team USA**, 4 on **Team Canada**, 3 on **Team Sweden**, 2 on **Team Switzerland** and 1 on **Team Czechia**).

#NHLSTATS YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE THE OLYMPICS

“[Did You Know?](#)” facts drawn from the new Olympics section of Records.NHL.com, plus additional #NHLStats ahead of the Olympic Winter Games Milano Cortina 2026:

Most Players from One NHL Team: Entering 2026, the most players from one NHL team named to rosters for a single Olympic Winter Games is 11, by the Detroit Red Wings in 2002 (**Chris Chelios, Pavel Datsyuk, Sergei Fedorov, Dominik Hasek, Tomas Holmstrom, Brett Hull, Igor Larionov, Nicklas Lidstrom, Fredrik Olausson, Brendan Shanahan and Steve Yzerman**).

Youngest NHL Players at the Olympics: A teenager has never played for Team Canada or Team USA at Olympics involving NHL players. Among nations participating at the 2026 Olympics, only two have had a teenager play for them at the five previous tournaments: **Aleksander Barkov** and **Olli Määttä** for Team Finland in 2014, as well as **Marco Sturm** (1998) and **Christian Ehrhoff** (2002) for Team Germany. There are currently two teenagers on Olympic rosters for 2026 – **Alberts Smits**, 18, of Team Latvia and **Macklin Celebrini** (SJS), 19, of Team Canada.

NHL Rookies at the Olympics: NHL rookies have played at all five previous Olympic Winter Games with NHL players, including 13 in 2014 (min. 1 GP in 2013-14 regular season). Among the 12 countries participating this year, eight have previously had an NHL rookie on their Olympic roster (CZE, FIN, GER, LAT, SUI, SVK, SWE).

Oldest NHL Players at the Olympics: Nine players age 40 or older have played at Olympics involving NHL players, including **Chris Chelios** (USA) who did so in both 2002 (age 40) and 2006 (age 44) and is the oldest ever to skate in those Games.

NHL Players by Year: A breakdown of NHL player representation for each of the first five Olympic Winter Games with League participation: 117 NHL players in 1998 (26 of 26 NHL teams), 144 NHL players in 2002 (27 of 30 NHL teams), 151 NHL players in 2006 (29 of 30 NHL teams), 139 NHL players in 2010 (30 of 30 NHL teams) and 148 NHL players in 2014 (30 of 30 NHL teams).

Gold Medal and Stanley Cup in Same Season: *All time, [eight players](#)* have won Olympic gold and the Stanley Cup in the same season. *In the five previous Olympics involving NHL players*, there have been 18 players to *play in* both the gold medal game and Stanley Cup Final in the same season.

Stanley Cup Followed by Olympic Gold: Nine players won the Stanley Cup and then in the next NHL season captured Olympic gold, including **Sidney Crosby** (PIT; Team Canada) who won the Cup in 2008-09 and Olympic gold in 2010.

The “Triple Gold Club”: According to the IIHF, there are 30 players who are part of the “Triple Gold Club” – meaning they have won at least one Olympic gold medal, one Stanley Cup and one World Championship gold medal, including **Sidney Crosby** (PIT; Team Canada).

Olympic Gold Medals by Country: For Olympics involving NHL players, Team Canada leads in [gold medals](#) (3), while Team Finland tops the [overall medal standings](#) (4).

NHL Leaders at the Olympic Break: The NHL points leader at the Olympic break has gone on to win the Art Ross Trophy twice: **Sidney Crosby** (CAN) in 2013-14 and **Jarome Iginla** (CAN) in 2001-02. The NHL goals leader at the Olympic break has finished the season as the leader four times.

Countries Represented by NHL Players: Entering 2026, NHL players have represented 16 different countries at the first five Olympic Winter Games involving the League: Austria, Belarus, Canada, Czechia, Finland, Germany, Kazakhstan, Latvia, Norway, Russia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Sweden, Switzerland, Ukraine and the United States. Three countries participating in 2026 have yet to have a player representing an NHL team at the Olympics: France, Denmark and Italy.

NHL Players as Olympic Flag Bearers: A total of 19 players with NHL experience have served as their country's flag bearer for either the Opening or Closing Ceremony of the Olympic Winter Games, but only one has done so while representing an NHL team: **Zdeno Chara** of the Bruins carried Team Slovakia's flag at the 2014 Opening Ceremony in Sochi, Russia.

Current NHLers at the 2018 and 2022 Olympics: A total of 11 current NHL players named to 2026 Olympic rosters participated in the 2018 or 2022 Olympics.

* **Macklin Celebriini** (SJS), 19, can become the youngest player to play for Team Canada at Olympics involving NHL players. The only NHL players to represent Team Canada at the Olympics at age 21 or younger (age at debut) are defenseman **Drew Doughty** in 2010 (20 years, 70 days), as well as forwards **Rick Nash** in 2006 (21 years, 244 days), **Jonathan Toews** in 2010 (21 years, 293 days) and **Simon Gagne** in 2002 (21 years, 351 days).

* **Sidney Crosby** (PIT), 38, is set to become third player age 38-plus to skate for Team Canada at Olympics involving NHL players, following **Martin St. Louis** in 2014 (38 years, 250 days at oldest) and **Al MacInnis** in 2002 (38 years, 228 days at oldest).

* Overall, Team Canada has four players age 35-plus on its roster – **Sidney Crosby** (PIT), 38; **Brad Marchand** (FLA), 37; **Drew Doughty** (LAK), 36; and **Darcy Kuemper** (LAK), 35 – which is the second time the country has done so at Olympics involving NHL players (also 4 in 2002).

* All three goaltenders have won the Stanley Cup, a first for Team Canada at the Olympics.

* **Nick Suzuki** (MTL) is set to become the first Canadiens captain to represent Team Canada at the Olympics or NHL International Tournament. **Bob Gainey** (1981 Canada Cup) and **Vincent Damphousse** (1996 World Cup of Hockey) both wore the “C” for Montreal in the same season as skating in an NHL International Tournament, but the events happened before they claimed captaincy.

* Team Canada returns 19 players from its 4 Nations Face-Off roster, including tournament MVP **Nathan MacKinnon** (COL), championship-clinching overtime goal scorer **Connor McDavid** (EDM), starting goaltender **Jordan Binnington** (STL) and captain **Sidney Crosby** (PIT).

* The only players who were not with Team Canada at the 4 Nations Face-Off are forwards **Macklin Celebriini** (SJS), **Bo Horvat** (NYI), **Nick Suzuki** (MTL) and **Tom Wilson** (WSH), as well as goaltenders **Darcy Kuemper** (LAK) and **Logan Thompson** (WSH).

* When the roster was announced, three players named to Team Canada [made up the top three in NHL scoring](#): **Connor McDavid**, **Nathan MacKinnon** and **Macklin Celebriini**. [In 2014](#), Team Canada entered the Olympics with each of the NHL's top three scorers.

* Team Canada's roster includes four current NHL captains: **Sidney Crosby** (PIT), **Connor McDavid** (EDM), **Mark Stone** (VGK) and **Nick Suzuki** (MTL).

* Four players are seeking their first medal/championship with Team Canada at a major international tournament (incl. OLY, WC, WJC, WCH/4N): **Macklin Celebriini** (SJS), **Bo Horvat** (NYI), **Nick Suzuki** (MTL) and **Tom Wilson** (WSH) – though all four medaled at either an under-17 or under-18 event. For Wilson, the medal at the 2011 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge (with Canda Ontario) was his only time representing Team Canada.

* Team Canada has played 164:19 since its last goal against in Olympic competition involving NHL players – **Lauris Darzins** scored for Team Latvia at 15:41 of the first period in the 2014 Quarterfinals, with **Carey Price** and Team Canada then going on to finish the tournament with [back-to-back shutouts](#).

- * 19 players on Team Czechia won a gold medal on home soil at the 2024 World Championship, including eight current NHLers – highlighted by **Martin Necas** (COL) and **David Pastrnak** (BOS), the top two scorers from the country [so far this season](#). The other current NHLers who won gold that year: **Lukas Dostal** (ANA), **Radko Gudas** (ANA), **Pavel Zacha** (BOS), **Ondrej Palat** (NYI), **Karel Vejmelka** (UTA) and **David Kampf** (VAN).
- * The four current NHL players on Team Czechia that did not win gold in 2024 are **Radek Faksa** (DAL), **Dan Vladar** (PHI), **Filip Hronek** (VAN) and **Tomas Hertl** (VGK). Hronek and Hertl won bronze together at the 2022 World Championship, while Faksa and Vladar seek their first medal with the country at the under-20 level or above.
- * **David Pastrnak** (BOS) recently passed **Patrik Elias** for the [second-most goals](#) in NHL history by a Czechia-born player, behind **Jaromir Jagr**; Pastrnak also ranks third among that group in [points](#). Pastrnak (2019-20) is one of two Czechia-born players in NHL history to win the Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy or finish as the League leader in goals (also **Milan Hejduk** in 2002-03). His 61-goal campaign in 2022-23 fell one shy of the single-season record for a Czech player (Jagr: 62 in 1995-96).
- * **David Pastrnak** (BOS) had an unforgettable sliding celebration on home soil in Prague after scoring what stood as the gold medal-clinching goal against Team Switzerland at the 2024 World Championship – Team Czechia’s first title at the event since 2010.
- * **Radko Gudas** (ANA) is the only current Czech captain in the NHL and one of seven from the country to wear the “C” for an NHL team, along with **Jaromir Jagr** (PIT & NYR), **Patrik Elias** (NJD), **Filip Kuba** (MIN), **Bobby Holik** (ATL), **Jaroslav Spacek** (BUF) and **Milan Hejduk** (COL). Gudas, who will play with Spacek’s son in Milan, is set to participate in the Olympic Winter Games for the second time after skating in three contests in 2014. His father, **Leo**, played at the 1992 Olympics and was drafted by the Flames in 1990. Gudas wore an “A” for Czechia at the 2024 World Championship when they won the gold medal on home soil, pacing the team in time on ice during the clinching game.
- * **Ondrej Palat** (NYI) has 51 career playoff goals, the [second-most all-time](#) by a Czechia-born player behind **Jaromir Jagr** (78). Palat also is [one of four Czechs all-time](#) with at least 100 career playoff points. This will be Palat’s second Olympic Winter Games (4 GP in 2014) as he seeks to medal with his country for the second time following gold on home soil at the 2024 World Championship (3-3-6 in 10 GP).
- * **Lukas Dostal** (ANA) backstopped Team Czechia to a gold medal at the 2024 World Championship, when he posted a 6-2-0 record including a 31-save shutout against Team Switzerland in the gold medal game. He was named Best Goaltender – the first Czech to receive the honor since **Tomas Vokoun** in 2005 – and to the tournament All-Star Team. Dostal scored a “goalie goal” in the AHL in 2021-22.
- * The youngest player on the roster **David Spacek** (MIN), who made his NHL debut Jan. 15. Born in Columbus, Ohio, when his father, **Jaroslav Spacek**, played for the Blue Jackets, Spacek will celebrate his 23rd birthday Feb. 18, 2026 (the day of the quarterfinals). Jaroslav played for the Czech Republic at each of the first three Olympics with NHL players ([1998](#), [2002](#) & [2006](#)) – winning the first such gold medal – and ranks tied for third for [games played for the country at those Games](#) (behind only **Jaromir Jagr** and **Tomas Kaberle**).

- * 12 players named to Team Denmark have played in the NHL, including current NHLers **Lars Eller** (OTT), **Nikolaj Ehlers** (CAR), **Oliver Bjorkstrand** (TBL), **Frederik Andersen** (CAR) and **Jonas Rondbjerg** (VGK).
- * **Nikolaj Ehlers** (CAR) and **Frederik Andersen** (CAR) are the third set of Hurricanes teammates to represent the same Olympic team and first since 2010 (**Joni Pitkanen** and **Tuomo Ruutu** w/ FIN). The other instance was in 2006: **Erik Cole**, **Bret Hedican** and **Doug Weight** with Team USA.
- * **Nikolaj Ehlers** (CAR) now tops the all-time NHL lists for [goals](#), [points](#) and [assists](#) by Danish players after surpassing **Frans Nielsen** on the latter chart earlier in 2025-26. Ehlers led all players in goals (5) and points (9) during the 2021 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification tournament – including a goal in the clinching game – to help Denmark secure its first-ever trip to the Olympic Winter Games (2022). His eight career 20-goal seasons in the NHL are the most among all Danish players. He scored three times in four games at the 2025 World Championship, including a tying goal in the final three minutes of regulation to rally Denmark past Canada in the quarterfinals (en route to their best-ever finish at the event, fourth place).
- * **Frederik Andersen** (CAR) is a two-time William M. Jennings Trophy winner who posted a 3-0-0 record at the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification to help Team Denmark secure a spot at the Olympic Winter Games for the second time (also 2022). The only Danish goaltender in League history to play at least 50 games (and [one of two](#) from the country all time along with **Mads Søgaard**, OTT), Andersen was [drafted twice](#) before making his way to North America to embark on his NHL career.
- * **Lars Eller** (OTT) is the only Danish Stanley Cup champion in NHL history – securing that feat in 2018 by scoring the Cup-clinching goal for Washington. He is all-time leader in games played among Danish players in both the regular season and playoffs, while ranking second in career regular-season goals and third in assists and points among that cohort. He shared the team lead with four points at the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification tournament to help Denmark secure its second Olympics berth (also 2022).
- * **Oliver Bjorkstrand** (TBL) tied for second in goals during the 2021 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification tournament to help Denmark secure its first-ever trip to the Olympic Winter Games (2022). Björkstrand has been a recipient of top accolades in many leagues, including AHL playoff MVP honors in 2016.
- * **Mads Søgaard** (OTT) is the highest-drafted Danish goaltender in NHL history – Ottawa selected him in the second round of the 2019 NHL Draft (No. 37). Standing at 6'7", Søgaard is among a group of five tied atop the list of [tallest goaltenders in NHL history](#). He was in the AHL when named to the roster but has since been called up and played in the NHL.
- * **Jonas Rondbjerg** (VGK) was the sixth draft pick in Golden Knights history (No. 65 in 2017) and an SHL champion in Sweden's top league. He was part of Denmark's fourth-place entry at the 2025 World Championship and helped the nation secure its spot at the Olympic Winter Games, scoring once in three games at the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification.
- * **Oscar Fisker Molgaard** is one of eight Danish players selected among the first two rounds of the NHL Draft (No. 52 in 2023 by SEA) and appeared in his first two NHL games in 2025-26, registering an

assist in his League debut. Fisker Molgaard helped Team Denmark win gold at the 2025 World Junior Championship Division 1A, securing the country's promotion to the 2026 World Junior Championship. He also represented his country at the 2025 World Championship, where he recorded 1-6—7 in 10 GP as a 20-year-old in the top men's tournament.

* Among the first six players named to Team Denmark's roster, **Jesper Jensen Aabo** is one of 14 returnees from the country's only other Olympic appearance (2022). Jensen Aabo captained Team Denmark at the 2025 World Championship, helping secure its best finish ever at the event (fourth). He has played for Denmark at each of the past 14 World Championships for a total of 92 games.

* Three players with NHL experience were part of Team Denmark at the 2022 Olympics: forwards **Patrick Russell** and **Nicklas Jensen**, as well as defenseman **Oliver Lauridsen**. Russell was teammates with **Connor McDavid** (Team Canada) and **Leon Draisaitl** (Team Germany) for each of his three NHL seasons. Jensen, [one of four Danish players](#) selected in the first round of the NHL Draft (No. 29 in 2011), played for the Canucks (2012-13 to 2014-15) and Rangers (2016-17), while Lauridsen was drafted by (No. 196 in 2009) and skated with the Flyers (2012-13 & 2014-15).

* The other Team Denmark players who have played in the NHL are **Alexander True** and **Joachim Blichfeld**, who both played for the Sharks in 2019-20 and 2020-21 (as well as in the AHL both seasons). True also played for the Kraken (2021-22), as well as three seasons of junior hockey with the Seattle Thunderbirds in the WHL, helping the team win a WHL championship in 2016-17 while averaging over a point per game in the postseason (12-10—22 in 20 GP). He is the cousin of Team Denmark teammate **Nikolaj Ehlers**. True has represented his country at the World Championship three times (2021, 2024 & 2025) and through qualifying rounds for each of the last two Olympics.

* **Nick Olesen** was named to the All-Star Team at the 2025 World Championship after posting 5-7—12 (10 GP), tied for sixth in tournament scoring.

- * Team Finland returns 19 of 23 players from its 4 Nations Face-Off roster, including all three goaltenders. The six new faces are defensemen **Miro Heiskanen** (DAL) and **Rasmus Ristolainen** (PHI) – who were on the 4 Nations roster but missed the tournament due to injury – and **Mikko Lehtonen**, along with forwards **Oliver Kapanen** (MTL), **Eeli Tolvanen** (SEA) and **Joel Kiviranta** (COL).
- * The five players with Olympic experience are **Miro Heiskanen** (DAL), **Eeli Tolvanen** (SEA), **Mikael Granlund** (ANA), **Olli Maatta** (UTA) and **Mikko Lehtonen**. Of note, **Aleksander Barkov** played at the [2014 Olympics](#) and was originally named to Team Finland but was not listed on the most recent roster due to injury.
- * **Mikael Granlund** (ANA) and **Olli Maatta** (UTA) are two of three Olympic medal winners on Team Finland, winning bronze in [2014](#). The other is **Mikko Lehtonen** who claimed gold at the 2022 Olympics.
- * **Miro Heiskanen** (DAL) and **Eeli Tolvanen** (SEA) were teammates at the 2018 Olympics, with Tolvanen securing a spot on the tournament All-Star team after tying for second in scoring (3-6-9 in 5 GP). Heiskanen, who had one goal in five games at the 2018 Olympics, completed a rare trifecta in international play in 2018 by representing his country at the World Junior Championship, Olympics and World Championship in the same season (all as an 18-year-old).
- * **Mikko Lehtonen** played all his 26 NHL games during the 2020-21 season and is now in his fourth campaign with the ZSC Lions in the Switzerland's National League. He served as Finland's captain at the 2025 World Championship after winning his second straight NL championship with Zurich.
- * All but three players on Team Finland's roster (22 of 25) have won at least one Stanley Cup and/or a gold medal at either the Olympics, World Championship or World Junior Championship. The three players seeking their first are **Oliver Kapanen** (MTL), **Erik Haula** (MIN) and **Nikolas Matinpaloo** (OTT).
- * **Oliver Kapanen** (MTL) is the 11th NHL rookie to play for Team Finland, joining a list that includes **Aleksander Barkov** (2014), **Olli Määttä** (2014), **Mikko Koivu** (2006) and **Jussi Jokinen** (2006).
- * Team Finland has four medals at [Olympics involving NHL players](#) (1 silver, 3 bronze), the most of any country.
- * Team Finland includes four members of the Stars: **Mikko Rantanen**, **Miro Heiskanen**, **Esa Lindell** and **Roope Hintz**. This will be the second time Dallas sends four players to the Olympics as part of Team Finland, following 2006 (**Niklas Hagman**, **Jussi Jokinen**, **Niko Kapanen** and **Jere Lehtinen**). Across the previous five such tournaments, there have been nine instances of one NHL team having at least four players on the same Olympic team with Detroit the only club to have more than four (5 w/ SWE in 2006 and 6 w/ SWE in 2014).
- * **Mikko Rantanen** (DAL) is one of four [players from Finland with 300 NHL goals](#), alongside **Teemu Selanne** (684), **Jari Kurri** (601) and **Olli Jokinen** (321), with **Sebastian Aho** (CAR) only one away from joining that list.

- * Four players on Team France have NHL experience including **Alexandre Texier** (MTL) – their only active NHLer and one of three players *born in France* to ever play for the Canadiens (also **Xavier Ouellet** and **Cristobal Huet**). Texier is set to become the first player to *represent an NHL team on Team France at the Olympics* – none came from the League in either 1998 or 2002.
- * Team France has had two players *with NHL experience* during its two previous appearances at Olympics involving NHL players – but never in the same season as the Games. In 1998, **Philippe Bozon** made his third trip to the Olympics and first since playing 144 NHL games with the Blues across four seasons (1991-92 to 1994-95). In 2002, **Cristobal Huet** played in three games before embarking on an NHL career that spanned from 2002-03 to 2009-10 (272 GP).
- * In addition to **Alexandre Texier** (MTL), the other Team France players with NHL experience are **Pierre-Édouard Bellemare**, **Yohann Auvitu** and **Stéphane Da Costa**.
- * On Jan. 8, 2026, **Alexandre Texier** (MTL) became the [second French player in NHL history](#) to score a hat trick, following **Antoine Roussel** (Feb. 18, 2017).
- * **Alexandre Texier** (MTL) led the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification in goals (3; tied) and points (6) and skated with them at the 2025 World Championship (0-3—3 in 5 GP). Overall, he has played for France at five World Championships and at the Olympic qualifiers twice.
- * **Pierre-Édouard Bellemare** has the most NHL games (700) and second most NHL points (138) among French nationals, trailing only **Antoine Roussel** on the [scoring list](#). Bellemare last played in the NHL in 2023-24, when he had seven points in 40 games for the Kraken. He has played in the World Championships 12 times, the Olympic qualifiers six times and skated for Team Europe at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.
- * **Yohann Auvitu** has 58 games of NHL experience (5-8—13) with the Devils and Oilers, last playing in the League in 2017-18.
- * **Stéphane Da Costa** has 47 games of NHL experience (7-4—11) over four seasons with the Senators from 2010-11 to 2013-14.
- * All-time, 14 *French nationals* ([13 skaters](#), [1 goaltender](#)) have played in the NHL. The number is the same for players *born in France* (13 skaters, 1 goaltender).
- * **Antoine Keller** was born more than two years after Team France last participated in the men's hockey tournament at the Olympics. The 21-year-old is the only other Team France player that is part of an NHL organization. Keller was selected 206th overall by the Capitals in the 2023 NHL Draft, the second French goaltender ever chosen – eight picks earlier than **Cristobal Huet** went in 2001 (No. 214 by LAK).
- * **Philippe Bozon** is the father of Team France forward **Kevin Bozon**. The elder Bozon played in four Olympics overall including each of the first two tournaments involving NHL players when he paced Team France in scoring each time (5-2—7 [in 1998](#) and 3-3—6 [in 2002](#)), averaging 1.63 points-per-game. A member of the IIHF Hall of Fame (2008), Bozon tallied 14-9—23 overall in his Olympic career (21 GP) which also includes appearances in 1988 and 1992.

* 11 players named to Team Germany have played in the NHL, including **Leon Draisaitl** (EDM) – the [highest-scoring German player in NHL history](#), with more than double the points of the next highest scorer.

* **Leon Draisaitl** (EDM) has played in the Stanley Cup Final in two straight years and in 2024-25 posted his fourth consecutive and sixth career 100-point season (and fourth 50-goal campaign). Draisaitl was part of the German roster that helped the team qualify for the 2018 Olympic Winter Games, sharing the tournament lead with five points at the 2017 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification. He is seeking his first international medal, following appearances at the World Championship (5x), World Junior Championship (2x), Under-18 World Championship (2x) and 2016 World Cup of Hockey (with Team Europe). His father, **Peter**, participated in the Olympic Winter Games in 1988, 1992 and [1998](#).

* **Leon Draisaitl** (EDM) is the only German player to win the Maurice "Rocket" Richard Trophy (2024-25), the Art Ross Trophy, Ted Lindsay Award and Hart Memorial Trophy – securing the last three in 2019-20. The only other German nationals to win an NHL individual award are Olympic teammate **Moritz Seider** (2021-22 Calder Trophy), **Olie Kolzig** (1999-00 Vezina Trophy, 2000-01 NHL Foundation Player Award & 2005-06 King Clancy Memorial Trophy) and **Thomas Greiss** (2018-19 William M. Jennings Trophy).

* **Moritz Seider** (DET) is the only German defenseman ever picked in Round 1 of the NHL Draft (No. 6 in 2019; based on nationality). In 2023, he helped Germany to its first-ever final at the World Championship, securing a silver medal. In a dramatic overtime win against USA in the semifinals at that tournament, Seider was on the ice for all four German goals and finished the contest with a plus-two rating and a game-high 27:04 of ice time.

* **Tim Stützle** (OTT) is already the fourth-highest German scorer in NHL history (for [goals](#) and [points](#)). Stützle and **Leon Draisaitl** (EDM) are the only German nationals to record at least three consecutive 70-point NHL seasons. Stützle (No. 3 in 2020) also has his name next to Draisaitl (No. 3 in 2014) as the highest-selected German nationals in NHL Draft history. At the 2021 World Junior Championship, Stützle captained Germany to the playoff round – a first for the country at that event – and collected 5-5—10 in five games to secure Best Forward honors.

* **Philipp Grubauer** (SEA) is the only German goaltender to win the Stanley Cup (2018 WSH) and one of five players from the country to win overall (based on nationality), following Olympic teammate **Nico Sturm** (MIN; 2x), as well as **Tom Kuhnhackl** (2x), **Dennis Seidenberg** and **Uwe Krupp**. Grubauer ranks second in NHL history for games played and wins among German goaltenders, behind **Olie Kolzig** on each list, and is one of three [German nationals](#) to earn an NHL win. Grubauer had a perfect 3-0-0 record at the 2017 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification to help Germany earn qualification in the 2018 Olympic Winter Games.

* **Nico Sturm** (MIN) is the only German national to win the Stanley Cup with multiple clubs (2022 COL & 2025 FLA; **Tom Kuhnhackl** is the only other two-time winner from Germany, claiming both with PIT). Sturm played a key role in securing a silver medal at the 2023 World Championship, sharing the team lead with six goals and notching an assist in Germany's dramatic semifinal win against USA.

* Three members of Team Germany's silver medal entry at the 2018 Olympics return: former NHLer **Dominik Kahun**, as well as defensemen **Moritz Müller** and **Jonas Müller**. All three of those players

also played at the 2022 Olympics, alongside **Mathias Niederberger**, **Tobias Rieder**, **Frederik Tiffels** and **Fabio Wagner**.

* **Dominik Kahun** had one assist in the 2018 Olympic semifinals against Team Canada and a goal in the gold medal game, then made his NHL debut the next season with Chicago. Kahun was traded twice in the NHL, including once in exchange for Team Finland defenseman **Olli Määttä**.

* Overall, 16 players on Team Germany's roster won silver at the 2023 World Championship including current NHLers **JJ Peterka** (UTA), **Mortiz Seider** (DET) and **Nico Sturm** (MIN).

* **JJ Peterka** (UTA) was the third and final German national selected in the 2020 NHL Draft (No. 34 by BUF), following fellow Olympians **Tim Stützle** (OTT; No. 3) and **Lukas Reichel** (No. 17 by CHI). It was the first time multiple German nationals were picked in the opening round. Stützle is the top scorer from that draft class.

* **Josh Samanski** (EDM) signed with the Oilers organization as an undrafted free agent prior to the 2025-26 season and made his NHL debut Jan. 26, 2026. Samanski has represented Team Germany twice at the World Junior Championship (2021 & 2022) and played for his country at the 2025 World Championship (2-3—5 in 7 GP).

* **Lukas Reichel**, now part of the Canucks organization, is the son of **Martin Reichel**, who represented Team Germany at the [2002 Olympic Winter Games](#). His uncle, **Robert Reichel**, skated for Team Czech Republic at both the [1998](#) and [2002](#) Olympics.

* **Wojciech Stachowiak** signed with the Lightning as an undrafted free agent prior to the 2025-26 season and has spent the entirety of the campaign with the Syracuse Crunch of the AHL. He has represented his country at the World Championship three times, helping Team Germany win silver at the 2023 World Championship (their first medal at the tournament in 70 years).

* Former NHLers **Dominik Kahun** (2018 & 2022) and **Tobias Rieder** (2022) are among the players with Olympic experience on the roster. On Dec. 1, 2014, Reider became the second player in Arizona Coyotes franchise history to score multiple shorthanded goals in a game – following **Keith Tkachuk**, the father of Team USA stars **Matthew** and **Brady Tkachuk**.

* Team Italy will compete at the Olympic Winter Games for the third time in six events involving NHL players, following 1998 and 2006. In [1998](#), the country claimed its most recent Olympic victory (against [Team Austria](#)) but did not make it past the preliminary round to compete against NHL players. As hosts in [2006](#), Team Italy finished last in Group A despite two ties, against [Team Germany](#) and [Team Switzerland](#).

* **Damian Clara** was selected by Anaheim in the second round of the 2023 NHL Draft (No. 60) and is one of four NHL draft picks on Team Italy. He is the second-youngest goaltender named to an Olympic roster this year, behind **Martin Neckar** of Team France.

* **Thomas Larkin** was selected by Columbus in the fifth round of the [2009 NHL Draft](#) (No. 137), the same year that fellow Group B players **Victor Hedman** (TBL; Team Sweden), **Oliver Ekman-Larsson** (TOR; Team Sweden), **Erik Haula** (NSH; Team Finland) and **Tomas Tatar** (Team Slovakia) were picked. Larkin scored the overtime clincher to capture a DEL championship alongside **Moritz Seider** (DET; Team Germany) with Adler Mannheim in 2018-19.

* Canadian-born forward **Matthew Bradley** was selected by Montreal in the fifth round of the [2015 NHL Draft](#) (No. 131), the same year **Connor McDavid** (EDM; Team Canada), **Jack Eichel** (VGK; Team

USA), **Mitch Marner** (VGK; Team Canada) and **Noah Hanifin** (VGK; Team USA) all went among the top five. Bradley won an ECHL championship in 2018-19 with the Newfoundland Growlers, scoring the opening goal in the Kelly Cup-clinching game.

* Hamilton-born forward **Cristiano DiGiacinto** was selected by Tampa Bay in the sixth round of the [2014 NHL Draft](#) (No. 170), the same year players like Team Sweden trio **Adrian Kempe** (LAK), **William Nylander** (TOR) and **Gustav Forsling** (FLA) were picked. DiGiacinto won the Memorial Cup in 2016-17 with the Windsor Spitfires, alongside the likes of Jets forward **Gabriel Vilardi** and Mammoth defenseman **Mikhail Sergachev**.

* **Tommy Purdeller** won an OHL championship in 2022-23 with the Peterborough Petes.

* Canadian-born forward **Daniel Mantenuto** is a two-time Italian champion who played four seasons at Robert Morris University, including one as captain, before embarking on his career in Italy.

* Canadian-born defenseman **Dylan Di Perna** broke into the OHL with the Kingston Frontenacs in 2012-13, the same season as Panthers forward **Sam Bennett**. Di Perna also skated for the Kitchener Rangers in the OHL, alongside **Radek Faksa** (DAL; Team Czechia). Di Perna [idolized](#) **Drew Doughty** (LAK; Team Canada) while growing up.

* **Alexander Petan** had 18-15—33 in 36 games as captain of the Michigan Tech Huskies during his final NCAA season in 2015-16, to finish as the WCHA scoring champion, secure WCHA Player of the Year and First Team all-conference honors, as well as being named a top 10 finalist for the Hobey Baker Award alongside **Kyle Connor** (WPG; Team USA).

* **Alexander Petan** has ties to the NHL in that his younger brother, **Nic Petan**, played parts of nine seasons with the Jets, Maple Leafs, Canucks and Wild. Nic did so after winning a gold medal at the 2015 World Junior Championship alongside Team Canada teammates **Connor McDavid** (EDM), **Josh Morrissey** (WPG), **Brayden Point** (TBL), **Sam Reinhart** (FLA) and **Shea Theodore** (VGK).

* **Nick Saracino** is a product of the St. Louis Jr. Blues minor hockey program. Saracino won an NCAA championship in 2014-15 with the Providence College Friars, tallying 1-2—3 in the Frozen Four semifinals to defeat **Jake Guentzel** (TBL; Team USA) and the University of Nebraska-Omaha Mavericks before edging **Jack Eichel** (VGK; Team USA) and the Boston University Terriers in the championship game. Saracino led Providence in regular-season scoring, tallying 14-24—38 in 40 games to finish ahead of teammates like Penguins forward **Noel Acciari**, Mammoth forward **Brandon Tanev** and Oilers defenseman **Jake Walman**.

* Toronto-born defenseman **Gregory Di Tomaso** is a two-time Italian champion who played in the OHL, QMJHL, USports and ECHL before heading overseas to play in Italy. Di Tomaso's tenure on the Canadian university circuit (USports) included three games against **Logan Thompson** (WSH; Team Canada) and the Brock Badgers ([Nov. 1, 2018](#), [Jan. 4, 2019](#) & [Feb. 8, 2019](#)).

* Michigan-born forward **Dustin Gazley** played in the USHL, NCAA, ECHL and AHL before embarking on a career in Europe. In 2011-12, he led the entire ECHL in assists (60) and points (85), securing a spot on the First All-Star and All-Rookie Teams as well as Rookie of the Year honors while skating for the Elmira Jackals. Gazley also helped the Hershey Bears reach the AHL Calder Cup Final in 2015-16, falling to a Lake Erie Monsters team that featured **Zach Werenski** (CBJ; Team USA), **Oliver Bjorkstrand** (TBL; Team Denmark) and coached by Avalanche head coach **Jared Bednar**. Gazley also is a former teammate of **Eddie Olczyk** (2006-07 Sioux City Musketeers in the USHL), whose father, **Ed Olczyk**, will be part of NBC's coverage at the tournament.

* Montreal-born defenseman **Phil Pietroniro** won a QMJHL championship with the Val-d'Or Foreurs in 2013-14 after playing for the Phoenix Jr. Coyotes minor hockey program, which also produced **Auston Matthews** (TOR; Team USA). Pietroniro's father, **Marco**, was an assistant coach with the Foreurs that season and has a hockey resume that includes playing and/or coaching stints across North America and in Italy. Pietroniro, also an Italian champion, has three brothers who play for Cortina in Italy (**Chad**, **Kris** & **Massimo**) and another who is in his fifth AHL season and first with the Syracuse Crunch (**Matteo**).

* Ottawa-born defenseman **Jason Seed** won back-to-back QMJHL championships with the Saint John Sea Dogs in 2010-11 and 2011-12, alongside Flames forward **Jonathan Huberdeau**. Seed also secured a Memorial Cup championship in 2010-11, a competition that featured Team Canada teammates **Sam Reinhart** (FLA) and **Jordan Binnington** (STL). Seed has since added an Italian championship to his resume.

- * 10 players named to Team Latvia have [played in the NHL](#), including [all three of their goaltenders](#). Two of the three Latvian-born players to win a Stanley Cup are on the roster: **Uvis Balinskis** (2025 FLA) and **Teddy Blueger** (2023 VGK); the other was **Sandis Ozolinsh** (1996 COL).
- * **Zemgus Girgensons** (TBL) is the only Latvian ever to be selected in Round 1 of the NHL Draft (No. 14 in 2012 by BUF) and is the highest-scoring active player from the country and ranks third [all-time](#) behind **Sandis Ozolinsh** and **Sergei Zholtok**. He also has the same ranks for [games played](#), [goals](#) and [assists](#). Girgensons played alongside Ozolinsh and tallied 1-1—2 at the 2014 Olympic Winter Games.
- * **Elvis Merzlikins** (CBJ) is the highest-drafted Latvian goaltender to be selected in the NHL Draft (No. 76 in 2014) and ranks second in games played and wins among the six [netminders from the country](#) to play in the NHL – behind only **Arturs Irbe**. Merzlikins also ranks second in [wins in Blue Jackets history](#), behind **Sergei Bobrovsky** (213). Before breaking into the NHL in 2019-20 – when he secured a spot on the [NHL All-Rookie Team](#) – Merzlikins twice won the Jacques Plante Trophy (2015-16 & 2017-18), awarded to the best goalie in Switzerland's National League.
- * **Arturs Silovs** (PIT) backstopped Latvia to its only medal at a major tournament during his last international appearance, posting a 7-3-0 record at the 2023 World Championship while playing in all 10 of the team's games – including six straight victories in his hometown of Riga to secure a spot in the semifinals. His 26-save effort against USA in the bronze medal game helped clinch an overtime victory. Silovs secured tournament MVP and Best Goaltender honors, as well as a spot on the All-Star Team.
- * In the 2024 Stanley Cup Playoffs, **Arturs Silovs** (then with VAN) was thrust into a starting role during the First Round and delivered by earning a 28-save shutout to clinch the series. In doing so, he became the [second goaltender in NHL history](#) to earn his first career shutout (regular season or playoffs) in a series-clinching game, joining **Steve Penney**. In 2025 he won the Calder Cup championship with the Abbotsford Canucks and was named AHL playoff MVP.
- * **Teddy Blueger** (VAN) is the fourth [highest-scoring Latvian player in NHL history](#), behind **Sandis Ozolinsh**, **Sergei Zholtok** and **Zemgus Girgensons**. He is set to make his Olympic Winter Games debut after helping his country qualify for the 2022 tournament (when he tallied 2-2—4 in three games as captain during the 2021 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification).
- * **Sandis Vilmanis** (FLA) was the [second Latvian selected in the 2022 NHL Draft](#), in the fifth round by the Panthers (No. 157). He made his NHL debut Jan. 10, 2026, and recorded his first NHL point Jan. 16, 2026 – with an assist on a goal **Uvis Balinskis** (FLA), marking the first time Latvian players have factored on the same NHL goal.
- * **Kaspars Daugavins** is one of 13 players with Olympic experience on Team Latvia, having played in both [2010](#) and [2014](#) as well as 2022. Twelve of those 13 players represented Team Latvia at the 2022 Olympics, including **Uvis Balinskis** (FLA; 0-3—3 in 4 GP) who did so before making his NHL debut.
- * 17 players named to Team Latvia were part of their bronze medal win at the 2023 World Championship, the country's first-ever IIHF medal, including **Roberts Bukarts**, **Jānis Jaks** and **Kristians Rubins** who all scored in the bronze medal game against Team USA.

* Eighteen-year-old **Alberts Smits** is a highly-regarded prospect for the 2026 NHL Draft. Smits is skating for Jukurit in Finland's top league in 2025-26 and produced at a point-per-game pace for Team Latvia at the 2026 World Junior Championship (1-4—5 in 5 GP). Smits (18 years, 71 days as of Feb. 11, 2026) can become the youngest player to play at Olympics involving NHL players – he would displace **Aleksander Barkov**, who was 18 years, 164 days old when he made his Olympic debut with Team Finland ([Feb. 13, 2014](#)).

* In addition to the six current NHL players on Team Latvia, five members of its roster are part of an NHL Reserve List: **Dans Locmelis, Eduards Tralmaks, Sandis Vilmanis, Mārtiņš Dzirkals** and **Anri Ravinskis** ([named Jan. 12](#)).

* **Dans Locmelis** (Providence Bruins, AHL) was the [first Latvian selected in the 2022 NHL Draft](#), in the fourth round by the Bruins (No. 119). Locmelis played two seasons in the NCAA (including one with **Taylor Makar**, brother of Team Canada defenseman **Cale Makar**) and is now in his first full professional season in the AHL.

* **Eduards Tralmaks** (Grand Rapids Griffins, AHL) won a USHL championship and was named Clark Cup MVP with the Chicago Steel in 2016-17. Tralmaks' experience in North America also includes four seasons in the NCAA at the University of Maine, as well as stints in the AHL and ECHL. In 2024-25, he led the Extraliga (Czechia's top pro league) in points.

* **Anri Ravinskis** (Abbotsford Canucks, AHL) was named as a replaced for **Eriks Mateiko** (Hershey Bears, AHL) on Jan. 12. Ravinskis was signed by the Canucks as an undrafted free agent in May 2025 and has yet to make his NHL debut.

* **Mārtiņš Dzirkals** was the [first Latvian selected in the 2015 NHL Draft](#), in the third round by the Maple Leafs (No. 68). He has won championships in both the QMJHL (2015-16; with Team Switzerland forward **Timo Meier**) and SHL (2023-24).

* **Kristers Gudlevskis** had a 55-save performance in the 2014 quarterfinals against Team Canada, the [highest single-game total by a goaltender](#) during Olympics involving NHL players.

* Team Slovakia returns 11 players who guided them to bronze at the 2022 Olympics, the country's first medal of any color in Olympic ice hockey, including tournament MVP **Juraj Slafkovský** (MTL). Slafkovský tallied 7-0—7 in seven games to lead all players in goals and points (tied), also securing Best Forward honors and a spot on the tournament All-Star team. His totals included the clinching goal in the bronze medal game against Sweden, one of his two tallies in that contest. Four months later at the 2022 NHL Draft, he became the highest-drafted Slovakian player in history – going first overall to the Canadiens at the event held in Montreal. He is on track to set new NHL career highs in goals, assists and points in 2025-26.

* Another returnee from the 2022 Olympics is **Šimon Nemec** (NJD), who helped make history at the 2022 NHL Draft when his name was called second overall – just after **Juraj Slafkovský** (MTL). They became the first Slovaks and second pair of countrymen born outside North America to go first and second overall in the same draft. Overall, three Slovaks were picked in [Round 1 that year](#), an NHL first. Among his other international achievements, Nemec helped Slovakia earn entry into the 2026 Olympic Winter Games during the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification. In the NHL, Nemec has become the [youngest defenseman to score a hat trick and OT goal in the same game](#) and the [second-youngest defenseman in NHL history](#) to score a playoff overtime goal.

* The third and final current NHLer who won bronze in 2022 is **Pavol Regenda** (SJS), an undrafted forward who scored in four of his first five NHL games of the 2025-26 season – highlighted by his first career hat trick Jan. 3 – less than a week before he was named to the Olympic roster. Team Canada's **Macklin Celebrini** set up the first of Regenda's three goals that night.

* **Pavol Regenda** (SJS) is joined by fellow NHL rookie **Dalibor Dvorský** (STL) on Team Slovakia. This is the third time in six Olympics that Slovakia will have multiple NHL rookies on its roster, following 2014 (**Martin Marincin & Tomas Jurco**) and 2006 (**Marek Svatos, Milan Jurcina, Andrej Meszaros & Peter Budaj**). This includes players who were with an NHL club in the final game before the Olympics.

* **Erik Cernak** (TBL) is a two-time Stanley Cup champion with the Lightning who will represent Slovakia for the first time since the 2019 World Championship. He is one of three members of Team Slovakia with a medal at the World Junior Championship (bronze in 2015 w/ **Peter Čehlák** and **Mátyás Súk**). In 2024-25, Cernak posted career highs for games played (76), assists (18) and points (21) and became the [sixth Slovakian defenseman](#) to reach 100 career NHL points.

* **Martin Fehérváry** (WSH) moved to Sweden at age 14 to pursue his hockey career and a few years later was a second-round pick by Washington in the NHL Draft. After setting NHL career highs in assists and points in 2024-25, Fehérváry is on pace to improve upon each of those this season.

* **Martin Pospisil** (CGY) notched three assists at the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification to help Slovakia secure entry into the 2026 Olympic Winter Games, including an assist on the game-winning goal that clinched their spot. Pospisil led NHL rookies with a plus-14 rating in 2023-24 and totaled 8-16—24 in his first NHL season (63 GP), before improving upon his assist and point totals in 2024-25 (4-21—25 in 81 GP). He will seek his first international medal.

* Three players on NHL Reserve Lists are part of Team Slovakia: goaltender **Adam Gajan** (No. 35 in 2023) was drafted by Chicago and is now in his second season with the University of Minnesota-Duluth, while goaltender **Samuel Hlavaj** and forward **Oliver Okuliar** signed with the Wild and Panthers, respectively, as undrafted free agents in April 2024.

* A member of the Devils when he was named to his second Olympic roster (also 2014), **Tomas Tatar** is now with EV Zug in Switzerland's National League. Tatar has 927 NHL games to his credit and is one of two returnees from Team Slovakia's squad in 2014 when NHL players last participated in the Olympics (also **Martin Marinčin**). Tatar is a seven-time 20-goal scorer in the NHL who won a silver medal with Slovakia at the 2012 World Championship and played for Team Europe at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey (leading the team and sharing third in the tournament with three goals). He had one goal in three games at the 2024 Men's Final Olympic Ice Hockey Qualification to help Slovakia secure its place at the Games in 2026.

* **Martin Marinčin** and **Tomas Tatar** are the only Team Slovakia players with at least 200 NHL games played but who are not currently in the League. Marinčin was teammates with many fellow Olympians during his NHL career, including **Leon Draisaitl** (Team Germany), **Mitch Marner** (Team Canada), **William Nylander** (Team Sweden) and **Auston Matthews** (Team USA).

* Among the 14 players on Team Slovakia's roster with NHL experience is **Marek Hrivík**, captain of its bronze medal entry at the 2022 Olympics (2-2—4 in 7 GP). Hrivík won a QMJHL championship before spending six seasons in the Rangers organization, playing alongside the likes of **J.T. Miller** (Team USA) and **Henrik Lundqvist**. He also played with **Matthew Tkachuk** (Team USA) during his time with the Flames.

- * Team Sweden returns 16 of 23 players from its 4 Nations Face-Off roster. The nine new faces are goaltenders **Jacob Markstrom** (NJD) – who was on the 4 Nations roster but missed the tournament due to injury – and **Jesper Wallstedt** (MIN), forwards **Gabriel Landeskog** (COL), **Alexander Wennberg** (SJS) and **Pontus Holmberg** (TBL), as well as defensemen **Oliver Ekman-Larsson** (TOR) and **Philip Broberg** (STL) – plus injury replacements: forward **Marcus Johansson** (MIN) and defenseman **Hampus Lindholm** (BOS).
- * The six players with Olympic experience are **Gabriel Landeskog** (COL), **Erik Karlsson** (PIT), **Oliver Ekman-Larsson** (TOR) and **Marcus Johansson** (MIN), who all claimed silver during the [2014 Olympics](#) when NHL players last participated, as well as **Rasmus Dahlin** (BUF) and **Pontus Holmberg** (TBL).
- * **Erik Karlsson** (PIT), who represented the Senators for his 2014 Olympic appearance, is the only defenseman to finish as [tournament points leader](#) in Olympics involving NHL players (tied or outright). In 2014, he tallied 4-4—8 (6 GP) to match **Phil Kessel** for the most points, securing a spot on the tournament All-Star team and Best Defender honors to go along with his silver medal. Karlsson is responsible for Team Sweden's last goal at Olympics involving NHL players – he netted the [game-winner in the semifinals against Finland that year](#).
- * **Rasmus Dahlin** (BUF) was 17 years old at the 2018 Olympics, posting one assist in two games as Team Sweden's youngest player. A few months later, he became the [first Swedish defenseman](#) ever selected with the No. 1 pick in the NHL Draft.
- * **Pontus Holmberg** (TBL) had two assists in six games at the 2022 Olympics, before making his NHL debut with the Maple Leafs the following season.
- * Minnesota's **Filip Gustavsson** and **Jesper Wallstedt** will become the first goaltenders to be NHL teammates and Olympic teammates in the same season. There has been one instance of an NHL goaltending tandem serving as teammates *at an NHL International Tournament*: Islanders duo **Jaroslav Halak** and **Thomas Greiss** with Team Europe at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey. Halak is from Slovakia and Greiss from Germany; Greiss did not dress in any games.
- * Overall, Team Sweden includes four members of the Wild: **Filip Gustavsson**, **Jesper Wallstedt**, **Joel Eriksson Ek** and **Marcus Johansson**. This will be the first time Minnesota sends four players to the same Olympic team and just one shy of the most they've ever had at a single Olympics (5 in 2006 and 2010; 4 in 2014; 0 in 2002). Across the previous five Olympics involving NHL players, there have been nine instances of one NHL team having at least four players on the same Olympic team with Detroit the only club to have more than four (5 w/ SWE in 2006 and 6 w/ SWE in 2014).
- * Team Sweden's roster includes two [Norris Trophy winners](#): **Erik Karlsson** (PIT) and **Victor Hedman** (TBL). In the history of the Norris Trophy, a player from Sweden has won the award 11 times, second only to Canada (49). Karlsson and fellow countryman **Nicklas Lidstrom** (7x) are the only European players to win the Norris Trophy multiple times.
- * Team Sweden's roster includes 11 players who were top-10 selections in the NHL Draft: **Rasmus Dahlin** (1st in 2018), **Victor Hedman** (2nd in 2009), **Gabriel Landeskog** (2nd in 2011), **Lucas Raymond** (4th in 2020), **Elias Lindholm** (5th in 2013), **Elias Pettersson** (5th in 2017), **Oliver Ekman-**

Larsson (6th in 2009), **Mika Zibanejad** (6th in 2011), **Hampus Lindholm** (6th in 2012), **William Nylander** (8th in 2014) and **Philip Broberg** (8th in 2019).

* **Gustav Forsling** (FLA) and **Oliver Ekman-Larsson** (TOR) will reunite on the same team (NHL or international) for the first time since winning a Stanley Cup together with the Panthers in 2024. Forsling's Panthers eliminated Ekman-Larsson's Maple Leafs the following year in the Second Round of the 2025 Stanley Cup Playoffs.

- * 17 players named to Team Switzerland have played in the NHL, including 10 active NHL players highlighted by **Roman Josi** (NSH) – the highest-scoring Swiss player in League history.
- * 12 players named to Team Switzerland have been part of the rosters that have helped them reach the gold medal game at both the 2024 and 2025 World Championship (claiming silver at each). Only one of its 25 players was not part of *at least one* of those teams (**Pius Suter**, STL).
- * **Roman Josi** (NSH) is the only Swiss player to win an individual award presented for on-ice accolades in the NHL, claiming the Norris Trophy in 2019-20 – the first of four straight seasons in which he led the Predators in scoring. Josi is one of three defensemen all-time to lead his team in scoring in four straight seasons, following **Erik Karlsson** (5; 2013-14 to 2017-18 w/ OTT) and **Denis Potvin** (4; 1973-74 to 1976-77 w/ NYI).
- * **Roman Josi** (NSH) has played for Switzerland at nine World Championships, helping to secure three of the four medals the country has won over the past 71 years (silver in 2013, 2018 and 2024). In 2013, he became the first Swiss player to claim MVP honors at the tournament (and was named Best Defenseman and to the All-Star Team) after leading the country to its first gold medal game at the event in more than 75 years. In 2024, he captained the club and led all defensemen in scoring (3-9—12 in 10 GP) to again earn Best Defenseman and All-Star Team honors (also 2013) – the only Swiss player to win multiple directorate awards at the Worlds. Josi ranks among the [longest tenured current NHL captains](#) (9th season) entering his second Olympic Winter Games (also 2014).
- * **Kevin Fiala** (LAK) has also won three medals and secured MVP honors at the World Championship, securing the latter distinction in 2024 – along with Best Forward and a spot on the All-Star Team – when he shared second in both goals (7) and points (13) despite missing two contests for the birth of his daughter. Fiala is the [highest-scoring Swiss forward](#) in League history and ranks second behind **Roman Josi** (NSH) among all skaters from the country.
- * The 10 players who have represented Switzerland at the Olympics: **Roman Josi** (NSH), **Nino Niederreiter** (WPG), **Pius Suter** (STL), **Sven Andrighetto**, **Reto Berra**, **Christoph Bertschy**, **Michael Fora**, **Leonardo Genoni**, **Denis Malgin** and **Calvin Thürkauf**.
- * **Nino Niederreiter** (WPG) has the most goals and games played among Swiss players in NHL history, and after being selected fifth overall at the 2010 NHL Draft was the country's highest draft pick until **Nico Hischier** (NJD) went No. 1 in 2017. Niederreiter has been part of all four Swiss rosters to medal at the World Championship over the past 71 years (silver in 2013, 2018, 2024 & 2025).
- * **Nico Hischier** (NJD), the other NHL captain on Team Switzerland, will play with two of his Devils teammates: **Timo Meier** (NJD) and **Jonas Siegenthaler** (NJD). This is the third time the club will send three players to the same Olympic team, following 2006 (Team USA: **Brian Gionta**, **Scott Gomez** & **Brian Rafalski**) and 2014 (Team Czech Republic: **Patrik Elias**, **Jaromir Jagr** & **Marek Zidlicky**).
- * Each of the top five highest [Swiss goal scorers](#) are on the roster: **Nino Niederreiter** (WPG), **Timo Meier** (NJD) and **Kevin Fiala** (LAK), **Roman Josi** (NSH) and **Nico Hischier** (NJD). Meier is the only Swiss player in League history with [three 30-goal seasons](#), holds the nation's benchmark for single-season NHL goals (40 in 2022-23) and is the only Swiss player to score five goals in an NHL game (Jan. 17, 2022).

* **Akira Schmid** (VGK) is in his second season with the Golden Knights and has taken on a lead role, appearing in twice as many games (21) than any other Vegas goaltender in 2025-26 while backstopping his team to an 11-4-5 record in those contests. Schmid was a fifth-round pick by the Devils in the 2018 NHL Draft (No. 136) who became the [fifth rookie goalie in League history](#) with a shutout in Game 7 – securing New Jersey's first playoff series win in more than a decade (2023 R1) alongside the three Devils he will soon reunite with.

* **Pius Suter** (STL) is the only Team Switzerland skater who was part of the 2018 Olympics (goaltender **Leonardo Genoni** also played). A veteran of more than 400 career NHL games, Suter is skating in his first season with the Blues after stops in Chicago, Detroit and Vancouver. In 2024-25 while playing for the Canucks, Suter set career highs for goals (25) and points (46) in a season. Suter won an OHL championship as a junior player (2013-14 w/ Guelph Storm) and a Swiss National League championship in 2017-18. Suter was Swiss National League player of the year in 2019-20 after leading the entire league with 30-23—53 (50 GP). Suter has represented Switzerland many times on the international stage, including at the World Junior Championship (2015 & 2016) World Championship (2017 & 2022) and this will mark his second Olympic Winter Games (2018).

* **Philipp Kurashev** (SJS) is skating in his sixth NHL season, and first with the Sharks, after he spent the first five campaigns with the Blackhawks who selected him in the fourth round of the 2018 NHL Draft (No. 120). Kurashev's career high for goals (18) and points (54) both came in the 2023-24 season, a campaign he capped with a silver medal at the 2024 World Championship.

* **J.J. Moser** (TBL) is in his second season with the Lightning (fifth NHL season overall) and signed an eight-year extension with the club that will start in 2026-27. Moser leads all Lightning skaters in 2025-26 in [plus-minus](#) (+30) and [time on ice per game](#) (21:50). On Jan. 1, he became the [fourth Swiss defenseman](#) to reach 100 NHL points. Moser has skated for Team Switzerland in five World Championships, helping his country earn a silver medal in 2025.

* **Tim Berni** was a sixth-round pick by the Blue Jackets in the 2018 NHL Draft (159th overall) and appeared in 59 games with the club in the 2022-23 season. He was part of Switzerland's silver medal team at the 2025 World Championship and currently skates for Geneve-Servette HC in Switzerland's National League.

* **Roman Josi** (NSH) and **Nino Niederreiter** (WPG) were teammates on Team Europe at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey, securing a second place finish.

- * Team USA returns 21 of 23 players from its 4 Nations Face-Off roster, including all three goaltenders. The four new faces are defensemen **Quinn Hughes** (MIN) – who was on the 4 Nations roster but missed the tournament due to injury – and **Jackson LaCombe** (ANA), along with forwards **Tage Thompson** (BUF) and **Clayton Keller** (UTA).
- * **Matt Boldy** (MIN) leads all Team USA skaters with 27 goals in 2025-26 (48 GP) and is on pace to join **Auston Matthews** (2021-22 & 2023-24) and **Chris Kreider** (2021-22) as the only American players with a 50-goal season since 1998-99.
- * The Tkachuks and Hughes families are set to become the first American brothers to skate together at the Winter Olympic Games since 1998 (**Derian** and **Kevin Hatcher**). It will be the first time since 1964 that Team USA has two sets of brothers on its Olympic squad (**Dave** and **Herb Brooks**; **Bill** and **Roger Christian**), and third time overall (also 1960: the Christians, as well as **Bill** and **Bob Cleary**). The last time any men's team iced two sets of brothers on its Olympic roster was 2018 (Norway).
- * The Tkachuks and Hughes brothers both have parents have also represented Team USA on the international stage: **Keith Tkachuk** played in four Olympics (1992, 1998, 2002 & 2006), while **Jim Hughes** skated for Team USA at the Spengler Cup (1989-90) and **Ellen Hughes** helped Team USA win silver at the 1992 Women's World Championship.
- * **Brock Nelson** (COL) hails from a decorated American hockey family that includes six combined appearances at the Olympics (soon to be seven). Nelson's uncle, **Dave Christian** (1x), was part of the "Miracle on Ice" at the 1980 Olympics, averaging more than a point-per-game (0-8—8 in 7 GP). Dave also competed at the Canada Cup three times (1991, 1984 & 1981). Nelson's grandfather, **Billy Christian** (2x), and great-uncle, **Roger Christian** (2x), captured a gold medal with the USA in 1960 – four years after their brother, **Gord Christian** (1x), claimed silver in 1956.
- * **Auston Matthews** (TOR) is the only U.S.-born player to score 60 goals in an NHL season (60 in 2021-22 & 69 in 2023-24) and recently displaced **Mats Sundin** (an Olympic gold medal winner with Sweden) as the Maple Leafs' all-time goals leader. Matthews is the only active skater to hold an all-tie goals, assists or points record for an Original Six franchise. Matthews is the only American to win the Maurice "Rocket" Richard Trophy (introduced in 1998-99) and one of two players from any country to claim the award at least three times (also **Alex Ovechkin**).
- * **Zach Werenski** (CBJ) led all skaters at the 4 Nations Face-Off in assists and points. He became the first defenseman in NHL International Tournament history (Canada Cup, World Cup of Hockey, 4 Nations Face-Off) to lead all players outright in points – Canadian blueliners **Bobby Orr** and **Denis Potvin** were part of a three-way tie at the 1976 Canada Cup.
- * Defensemen **Brock Faber** (MIN) and **Jake Sanderson** (OTT) are the two players with Olympic experience. Both players were 19 years old at the time and notched one assist in the tournament (Faber: 4 GP; Sanderson: 1 GP).
- * A total of 14 birth states are represented across the 25-player roster, the most for any Olympics involving NHL players (9 in 2014; 10 in 2010; 9 in 2006; 10 in 2002; 11 in 1998). Each state on the 2026 roster: Michigan (4), Minnesota (4), Arizona (3), Massachusetts (3), Florida (2), Alaska (1), California (1), Colorado (1), Missouri (1), Montana (1), Nebraska (1), New York (1), Ohio (1) and Pennsylvania (1).

* A total of 20 players named to Team USA's roster played U.S. College Hockey before starting their NHL career: Boston University (5), University of Michigan (4), Boston College (2), University of North Dakota (2), University of Minnesota (2), Colorado College (1), University of Connecticut (1), University of Maine (1), University of Massachusetts Lowell (1) and University of Nebraska Omaha (1).
